Declarer won the spade opening and led the club 10 covered by the king and ace. The finesse of the diamond 10 was taken by the jack and a club returned to the queen. Declarer won the spade return, played the ace of diamonds and got the bad news. He lead a heart, the ace being taken immediately. The diamond 9 was returned, endplaying declarer. He had to give up two diamond tricks. The score of +100 earned a ½ point on the board as their teammates were -100, going down two tricks undoubled at a 5c contract.

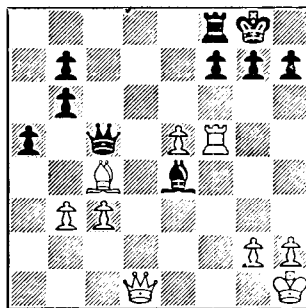

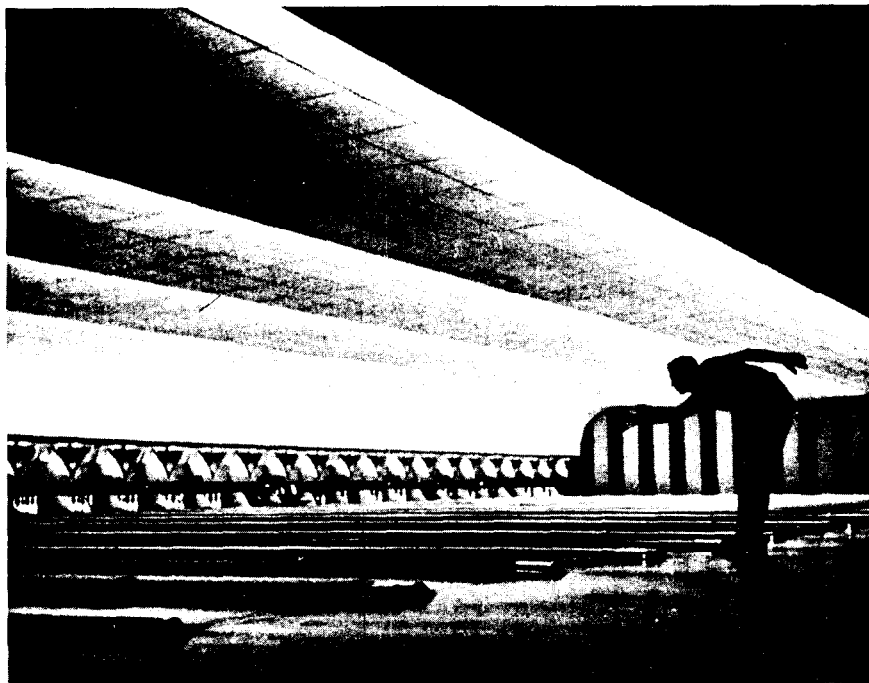
