DR. DEMEREC HONORED

The National Academy of Science has awarded the Kimber Genetics Medal to Dr. Milislav Demerec of the Biology Department for his achievements in the science of genetics, the branch of biology that deals with heredity. The Academy, an honorary body of about 600 scientists from all fields, presented Dr. Demerec with the medal at a ceremony on April 23 in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Demerec compiled his extraordinary record of scientific contributions to the understanding of the heredity of corn, flowers, fruit flies, bacteria and viruses while working at Cold Spring Harbor, A native of Yugoslavia, he immigrated to the United States in 1919 and became a citizen in 1931. In 1923, immediately after receiving his doctorate from Cornell, he joined the Carnegie Institution of Washington and the Long Island Biological Association. He became director of the Long Island Biological Association in 1941 and, in 1943, director of the Carnegie Institution of Washington. Dr. Demerec came to Brookhaven in 1960 as Senior Geneticist in the Biology Department.

NEW MOWERS — NEW HAZARD

That time of year is here again – the grass is growing and the sound of lawn mowers breaks the weekend silence.


Besides being pelted by flying bits of stone (wear safety glasses), pulling the mower back over your toe (wear safety shoes), a new possibility of injury has come with the advancement of power lawn mower design.

There have already been several injuries resulting from the new springwound starters. At least one occurred when a home owner attempted to dismantle a "cocked" spring.

The more common possibility, of which all owners of this type mower shoud be aware, is the experience of having a mower stall in heavy grass, wind the spring starter, push the starter handle down and have nothing happen. Examination of the undercarriage shows that a heavy deposit of grass has wedged the blade from moving. Don't put your fingers underneath and attempt to pull the grass out - you may get the grass but may also leave your fingers. Take the mower to an already mowed area and gently bounce the mower on its rear wheels - the mower should start and clean itself of grass.
