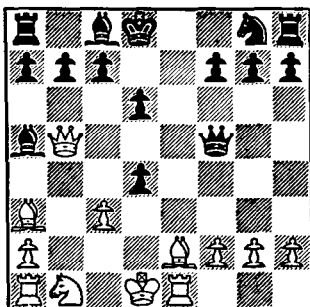

BRIDGE CLUB

First place went to Brandon Shippers and Forwarders with 33 points out of a possible 48. Last year's runner-up, Grumman Aircraft had 30½, and Brookhaven 29½. The team was composed of Les Lawrence, Sandy Wagner, Skelly Frei, Paul Michael, and Bob Dvorak (alternate).

In the first day of play the boys defeated IBM by aggressively bidding a slam on a hand in which they held but half the high cards.

Lawrence felt his hand was not good enough for 3S and temporized with 2D.

Hearing his partner's heart rebid, he knew there was an excellent fit, and bid game. Expecting only one red suit loser, Wagner went to six. When the hearts split, the slam was home, even though the diamond finesse lost.

A very rare play, a squeeze by a defender on declarer came up but Wagner was sleeping and missed it. Lawrence's psychic spade bid against Republic led to a weird 2S contract, but Les played it masterfully and won the board.

Wagner correctly read the diamond spots in a no-trump contract.

The opponents took four rounds of hearts and then switched to spades. Declarer then led a diamond to the ace, noting the fall of the eight from West and two from East. On the diamond return, East followed with the six. The only cases of interest are when West started with Q-8 or 10-8. Since West might have played the ten from the former, for deceptive reasons, Wagner concluded that Q-8 was more likely.

The entire team played well; next year the big silver trophy may return to BNL.

NIMRODS-ARCHERY CLUB

The seven-course field range, located in the woods just to the left of the present practice range, is almost completed. All members have done a tremendous job of constructing this course.

The field consists of seven targets of different ranges, each target presenting a different problem for the archer. Starting at Target 1, groups of two or three archers proceed through the course to the end. The score is obtained by adding the scores of all target positions.

The Club is pushing ahead on the next seven targets so that a fourteen-target course set to the specifications of and approved by the National Field Archery Association will be in use. Then, official tournaments with other clubs on the Island will be held.

The present seven-target course has been reviewed with the BNL Safety Office. It will be adequately posted and under strict regulations, and no one will be allowed to shoot the course unless he is familiar with these regulations. Members of the Archery Club will be permitted to shoot whenever they wish as long as they follow the rules. Anyone who is not a member, may shoot as a guest but must be accompanied by a club member. When guests shoot the course more than three times, they must become a member.
