
PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT CAFETERIA

SOCIAL SECURITY

Question: Can I file my application for Social Security benefits before I actually retire?

Answer: Yes, you can file three months prior to actual retirement. In fact, the Social Security Office recommends that the application be filed at least several weeks before retirement, so that there will be less chance of a delay in receiving benefit checks.

Question: How often should I check my Social Security earnings record? Answer: It is suggested that you check your earnings record every three years. Form OAR-7004 is available at your Social Security Office at 38 Oak Street, Patchogue, for this purpose.




