SOCIAL SECURITY DEDUCTIONS INCREASE

Effective January 1, 1963, the Social Security Law requires an increase in your Social Security deductions, to 3%% of the first \$4,800 earned. This will mean an annual deduction of up to \$174, instead of \$150 under last year's maximum rate. The Laboratory, of course, must increase its contribution to match its employees', dollar for dollar.

The change in the Social Security Law was passed by Congress in the summer of 1961, when taxes on both employees and employers were raised in order to make increased Social Security benefits possible.

"THE RULES OF THE GAME"

Thurs., Jan. 3 8:30 p.m. Lecture Hall

Jean Renoir, second son of the impressionist painter Auguste Renoir, has two masterpieces to his credit, each considered among the greatest films ever made - GRAND ILLUSION and RULES OF THE GAME. The latter has one of the most unfortunate histories of any film far over budget, shot under exasperating conditions of mobilization among employees, disastrously received at its premiere (1939) by a Parisian audience in no mood to be told it was decadent and on the verge of collapse, drastically cut in an effort to make it more acceptable, and finally the negative utterly destroyed by bombs. In 1956, two young French cinema enthusiasts discovered 200 boxes of film, literally in thousands of pieces, miraculously untouched in a warehouse. With infinite patience and several years of painstaking work, they managed to reconstitute the original version with only one small piece of less than a minute missing. This is the film we are now able to see - mordant, sophisticated, brilliantly funny, the tragedy of a man of feeling in a society that has no use for it.

Demonstration and class organization will be held on Wednesday, January 16, at 8:30 p.m., in the Recreation Building.



West's lead of the jack of hearts was ducked in dummy and won by East's king. Knowing that declarer had to hold almost all the missing high cards, East realized that the only chance of defeating the contract lay in the club suit. He returned a small club, declarer's 9 holding the trick. Declarer played a heart to the ace and finessed the diamonds.

West won and returned a club through the king, enabling East to take three club tricks and defeat the contract

The principle of losing the first trick to the opponents, in a suit where one trick must be lost in any event, has many applications for both declarer and defenders.

A similar problem for declarer from a recent game will be discussed next week.
