AEC CHAIRMAN SEABORG'S STATEMENT ON HAWORTH AND TAPE APPOINTMENTS

BNL employees were informed by memo last Friday that the White House has announced the appointment of Drs. Haworth and Tape to high-level government posts.

In connection with this announcement, Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, Chairman of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, said that Commissioner Haworth's resignation to accept appointment as Director of the National Science Foundation represents a real loss to the Commission. "We depend heavily on Dr. Haworth's sound judgement in all matters as well as his extensive experience and outstanding competence as a scientist. I feel the Government is most fortunate," Dr. Seaborg continued, "in that an individual of such ability is willing to continue to serve by accepting this important position which Dr. Waterman is vacatina.

Of Dr. Gerald F. Tape, whom the President is nominating to replace Dr. Haworth, Dr. Seaborg said, "We look forward to having Dr. Tape as a Member of the Commission. He is a man of demonstrated competence. He will bring to the Commission a wealth of scientific and administrative experience gained over many years of service as a member of the Brookhaven National Laboratory staff and, more recently, as President of Associated Universities, Inc., the operator of the Laboratory.'



HARVARD-RADCLIFFE SYMPHONY DR. VAN SLYKE HONORED AT **BROOKHAVEN MEDICAL SYMPOSIUM**



On March 28 and 29, Brookhaven National Laboratory is holding a Symposium on Chemistry in Medicine, At this Symposium, distinguished scientists working in this field are presenting papers under the two general headings "Relation of Chemical Structure to Biological Function" and "The Physiological Basis of Clinical Medicine.

During the course of the Symposium, a special tribute is being paid to Dr. Donald D. Van Slyke, who will celebrate his eightieth birthday on March 29.

Dr. Van Slyke, who is Senior Medical Scientist (Emeritus) on Brookhaven's Medical Department staff, is recognized as one of the outstanding pioneers in the field of chemistry in medicine, and is the father of modern quantitative clinical chemistry. He is a Member (Emeritus) of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, with which he has been associated since 1907. Dr. Van Slyke has combined a rigorous devotion to accurate measurements and unusual technical skill (as perhaps best exemplified in the ubiquitous "Van Slyke machine" for gas analysis) with a broad knowledge of physical and physiological concepts. His important contributions to knowledge have ranged from (continued on page 2)

amino acid chemistry and physiology to the physical chemistry of blood gases and electrolytes; the acid base balance of the body; and the physiology of the kidney. In these studies he has always been aware of their implications in disease, and some of his best-known research has been on oxygen-lack in pneumonia and emphysema, on acidosis and on Bright's disease. Many of his clinical procedures are in daily use in hospital laboratories all over the world.

Dr. Van Slyke has been the recipient of honorary degrees from the following universities: Yale, Michigan, Northwestern, Chicago, London, Oslo and Amsterdam. On June 26, 1962, at the annual meeting of the Americal Medical Association, Dr. Van Slyke received the first Scientific Achievement award of the American Medical Association. This award is established to recognize outstanding contributions to medicine by non-physician scientists.

The average will be arrived at by tabulating all the points for the period and dividing by the number of entries. Anyone who enters a fish has a chance of winning a prize. Of course there are other awards including prizes for surf, boat and fresh water fishing.

The rules follow; please read, cut out the entry blank, enter and win. Copies of entry blanks, rules and listed specie's weights are available at the Recreation Office. See George Sabine, or this year's Committee Chairman, Kurt Jellet, Ext. 2188.

BNL 1963 FISHING CONTEST RULES

- Any fresh or salt water fish contained in the BNL 1963 List of Species is eligible for entry.
- 2. All entries must be caught by rod and reel.
- 3. All entries must be submitted within one week after the fish is caught.
- 4. Each entry must be weighed on a scale which is calibrated in ounces. This type of scale is available at any grocery or meat market.
- 5. Decisions of the contest committee are final.
- 6. The contest begins April 1, 1963, and ends on November 30, 1963.
- 7. To compute the point value of a fish, the weight of the fish will be divided by the 1963 BNL Listed Weight for that species, and multiplied by 1,000.
- 8. AWARDS
 - a. One award for the highest entry for every two month period starting April 1.
 - b. One award for the average entry for every two month period.
 - c. An annual award to the person who achieves the greatest accumulation of points as follows: each person's largest single entry in each species will be totaled toward his accumulation of points. Fisherman of the Year.
 - d. One annual award for each of the following:
 - 1. Highest saltwater entry caught from a boat.
 - 2. Highest saltwater entry caught from the surf.
 - 3. Highest freshwater entry.
 - e. Annual awards limited to one per employee.
 - f. Bi-monthly awards limited to two per employee, not both in the same two month period.
- 9. To be eligible for an AVERAGE FISH award, a total of at least three entries is required (not by the same person) in each two month period. The same applies to the highest entry if each of the fish entered is under 200 points. Only the largest fish per species, per person, counts toward the Average Fish award.
