THE NEW YORK CHAMBER SOLOISTS TO PRESENT SEASONS FINAL CONCERT



The last concert of the current season will be given by members of The New York Chamber Soloists on Thursday, May 2. Members of this group have performed before BNL audiences of various ages on several occasions. This time the group will consist of oboist Melvin Kaplan, violinist Gerald Tarack, violist Ynez Lynch, and cellist Alexander Kouguell. The program will feature works by Beethoven, Britten and Ravel and will close with a performance of Mozart's oboe quartet.

The New York Chamber Soloists were formed in 1957 in order to fill the need for a group of expert chamber music artists who could perform the works which are not often heard because they are written for other than the standard existing chamber music groups. The ensemble includes two singers, two wind players, five string players, and two keyboard players. Having remained together playing this rich repertoire for so many seasons, and presenting consistently successful and interesting programs has won for the group a position of distinction and honor, with re-engagements for several years in a row by leading chamber music societies both in the United States and abroad. The New York Chamber Soloists have undertaken two European Tours in 1959 and in 1961. In connection with these trips, and as a general policy, there have been more than a dozen successful compositions written specifically for the group by American composers including Gunther Schuller, Henry Brant, Easley Blackwood, and Mel Powell.

The range of musical styles of the group's repertoire runs from early baroque through contemporary, and often features vocal chamber music for solo voice and various combinations of instruments. The repertoire is so rich that a great number of fascinating programs are possible, without any number of members participating, from three to the full complement of eleven.

Dr. James H. Wakelin, Jr., Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Research and Development, presented the Naval Research Reserve General Excellence Award to Naval Reserve Research Company 3-9 during a simple ceremony last Tuesday evening, April 16, at the Brookhaven Center. The Award, in the form of a handsome bronze plaque, was presented to the Company after a reception and dinner attended by the members, their families, and distinguished guests from the Navy and BNL.

Dr. Wakelin, in his remarks, congratulated the Company, and made special note of the fact that "Three Dash Nine" is the only one of 115 similar companies to win the two highest honors available to Naval Research Reservists. This "Clean Sweep," Dr. Wakelin pointed out, makes BNL's own Reserve Company the top unit in the United States.

The plaque will be put on permanent display in the Exhibit Hall alongside of the Navy's A. Hoyt Taylor Award, which was presented to the Company last year.



Bidding Par: E-W, for arriving at a contract of 1, 2, or 3 spades; or 1 or 2 diamonds, or 1 NT; or for passing a final contract of 3 hearts; or for passing or doubling any other final contract higher than 2 spades – 5 points. For arriving at a contract of 2 NT or 3D – 2 points.

Play Instructions: West to play at 2S. North to lead A of clubs and then to lead 9 of clubs.

Play Par: N-S. South must win the second trick with the king of clubs, cash the ace of diamonds, and then lead the six of diamonds – 4 points. Provided South has done this, he must win the first spade lead with the ace and lead a club – 2 points additional. North must ruff the club lead and return a diamond, which South must ruff – 2 points additional (8 points – total).

Play Analysis: First Things First! With only 5 tricks in sight (2 clubs, a club ruff, and two aces), South must clear his hand of diamonds before giving his partner the club ruff. The club ruff is needed later as an entry to North's hand, so South can get a diamond ruff.

It took Joe Friedes just 20 seconds after winning the second club lead to embark on the winning line of defense. He took the club, played A and another diamond, jumped in on the first trump lead, gave Monica a club ruff, who in turn gave Joe a diamond ruff.
