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SCIENTISTS STUDY HALF-BILLION YEAR-OLD METEORITE

WHAT TIME IS IT?

Commencing Monday, May 6, 1963, the Laboratory fire siren will sound the "All Clear" signal – two blasts of ten seconds each – at noon each day. The first blast will start at exactly 12:00 noon. This will serve to test the fire siren daily as well as to indicate official Laboratory time.

Official Laboratory time is maintained at the Laboratory telephone switchboard and on the clocks installed at the Main Gate. These clocks are checked each morning and are adjusted, as necessary, to New York telephone time.

All clocks at the Laboratory should be kept set to the correct time. The exact official time may be obtained from the BNL telephone operator, as well as by the sounding of the "All Clear" on the fire siren at noon each day.

TIAA — CREF

Participants in the Laboratory Retirement Plan may elect to have all premiums applied to TIAA, the fixed annuity, or may elect to have a percentage of premiums applied to TIAA and the remainder (up to 50%) to CREF, the variable annuity.

These percentages may be changed once a year, effective July 1. All participants who wish to change current percentages must make application at the Personnel Office **prior to June 1, 1963.**

Several scientists in the Chemistry Department have been cooperating in studies on a meteorite which fell near Bogou, Upper Volta, on August 14, 1962. These studies have been made possible through the courtesy of President Maurice Yameogo of Upper Volta, who has given permission to U.S. and French scientists to retain and study portions of the meteorite. Detailed investigations of its technical, metallurgical and radioactive properties are expected to provide valuable additonal information on its history and origin in space.

One-half of the 19-pound meteorite mounted in a display case will be returned to the Republic of Upper Volta for permanent retention. The meteorite has been in the United States since last fall. The scientific facts on the meteorite already assembled as the results of preliminary studies at Brookhaven and Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory confirm that the intensity of the cosmic radiation was constant throughout its travels in space. Its radioactivity was twice that of a fragment of a Soviet Sputnik which fell at Manitowoc, Wisconsin. This proves that the meteor had been in deep space rather than in an orbit near the earth as was Sputnik.

On the basis of preliminary studies at BNL, the meteorite is believed to have been in space for 440,000,000 years – three hundred million years before the era in which dinosaurs were most prevalent.

Research at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, Cambridge, Massachusetts, detected the presence of a rare iron mineral (Wuostite) never before found on a meteorite. It is believed to have formed on the surface during the last few seconds of the meteor's brilliantly lighted plunge through the atmosphere. Analysis shows that the meteorite consists almost entirely of an iron-nickel-cobalt alloy with only traces of other elements.

Meteorites serve as natural space probes supplementing information provided by man-made space probes. Some of the studies of the Bogou meteorite may help in identifying future fragments falling from space.

Further investigations of the Bogou meteorite will be carried out at fourteen laboratories in the United States and France. The Chemistry Department scientists who are participating in these studies are Drs. Raymond Davis, Jr., Oliver A. Schaeffer, R.W. Stoenner, James C. Cobb, and Sydney Thompson.

DR. GIAN CARLO WICK ELECTED FINAL CONCERT TO THE OI NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES A reminder tha

Dr. Gian Carlo Wick, Senior Physicist at BNL has been elected to membership in the National Academy of Sciences. The announcement was made this week by the Academy, during the Washington, D.C. meetings of the American Physical Society.



Dr. Wick, who was born in Torino, Italy, received his Ph.D. at the University of Torino in 1930. In the following year, he received a fellowship to spend a semester at the University of Gottingen and a semester at the University of Leipzig in Germany. In the years between 1932 and 1937 he was associated as a research assistant with Dr. Enrico Fermi at the University of Rome, where he later became Professor of Theoretical Physics. From 1948 to 1951 Dr. Wick was at the University of California as a Professor of Physics. In 1953 Dr. Wick conducted research at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, New Jersey.

From 1954 to 1957 he continued his studies at the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where he also served as a Professor in Physics. During this period he also served as a Consultant to the CERN Laboratory in Geneva, Switzerland. In September 1957 he joined the staff of the Physics Department at BNL. At Brookhaven, Dr. Wick has specialized in the study of quantum mechanics and high energy physics; his research has been especially concerned with the theory of nuclear reactions.

GOODBYE BROADWAY, HELLO FRANCE

In an amazing display of bridge ability, one of BNL's Teams consisting of Leslie Lawrence and Sanford Wagner, scored 100 out of a possible 100 points in the United States Industrial Bridge Championship. This, pending the outcome of scores from the rest of the country, could possibly earn them the right to represent the United States against the Industrial Bridge Champions of France and England. This contest will take place during an all-expense paid trip to Paris and London for the two winners.

The event, sponsored by the National Industrial Recreation Association, was a par contest consisting of 18 prepared hands being played simultaneously at hundreds of industrial and govermental organizations from coast to coast. On each hand there was a bidding and play problem of considerable difficulty. The winners, playing in excellent form, solved each problem correctly.

A score of 100 is rarely achieved in a par contest. The runners-up in the local competition at BNL, Lee Gaynor and Robert Bowers, earned a fine score of 84 points. This will probably place them in the top 5% of all pairs nationally.

The king of hearts was led, and Lawrence could see six obvious losers, 3 spades, 1 heart and 2 diamonds. He concluded that the only chance to make his bid was to find the clubs divided 3-3 and one of the opponents with two trump honors doubleton. He took the ace of hearts and cashed three club tricks ending up with the lead in his hand. He then led a fourth club and discarded the losing heart from dummy, West trumping with the 4 spot. The defenders could now only win 2 natural trump tricks as their three high honors had to all be played on the next two trump leads.

The winners earned a bidding and play par on the last hand of the contest by getting to 6S and fulfilling the contract. N-S vulnerable.
