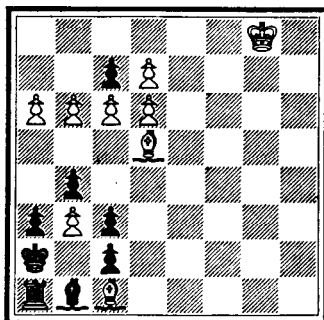

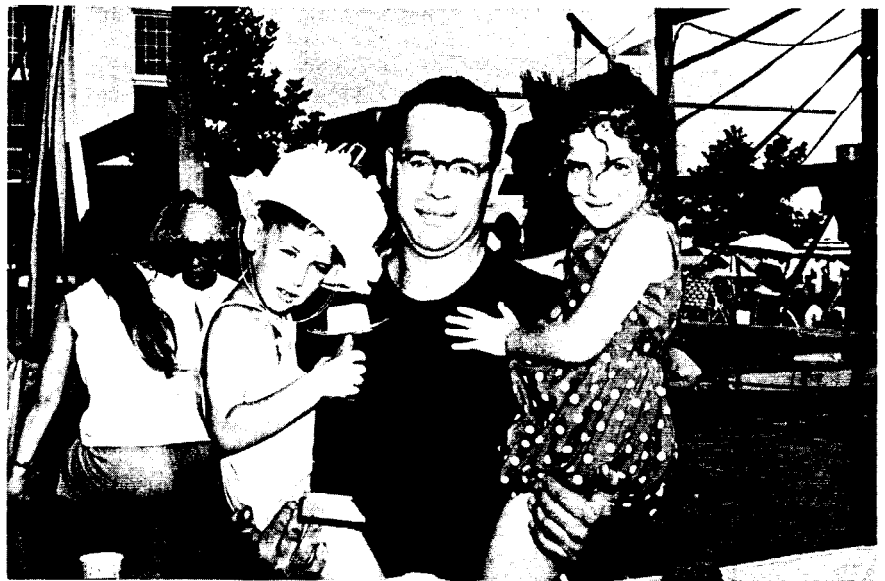
### THIS STRANGE PASSION

Thursday, August 8, 8:30 p.m., Lecture Hall

"This Strange Passion" is one of Luis Bunuel's subtlest and most surprising works. On the surface, the story is that of a girl who marries a pathologically jealous man who eventually tries to kill her. Beneath it is a deeply probing analysis of the inward obsessions of a paranoid and his distorted outlook on reality. The rich middle-class setting in which the film unfolds allows Bunuel to achieve some ironic, and sometimes withering, moments of social criticism.

## SOCIAL SECURITY

Some married women still carry the same social security cards they had before they were wed. They fail to make the necessary changes for months, or even years, after they have changed their names from Miss to Mrs.

The key to your social security record is your social security account number card. No one should have more than one social security number, yet it is possible to have more than one card under different names. In the interest of having all earnings properly credited to the proper account number, the Social Security Administration needs to know about changes in names, whether it be because of marriage, divorce, or other reasons. Women who marry and fail to report this change may experience delay when it is time to figure the social security benefits due them.

Bring your old social security card to the nearest social security office. In Patchogue the address is 38 Oak Street - GOver 5-3031. The social security office will issue you a new card with the same account number you had but under your new name.

## WINTER BOWLING LEAGUES FORMING NOW



Good exercise in a healthful atmosphere . . . good competition and good fun with good friends. That's bowling, America's most popular indoor sport, with almost thirty million men, women and children enjoying it regularly. Although bowling is a popular modern game, it is also one of the world's oldest sports. As far back as 5,000 B.C. - seven thousand years ago - the children of Egypt played a game that was quite similar to our twentieth century version. And as far back as 1946, bowlers at BNL have been bowling in league competition.

Preparations are now underway for another big bowling season. We expect as many or more teams than last year. There's plenty of room in our handicap league for new bowlers and new teams as well as for our veterans.

As is our custom, **entry priority** will be granted to teams which bowled in BNL leagues during 1962. Priority is valid for the same league only, and at least three of last year's bowlers must be on this year's roster. This priority will expire on August 23, one week before the August 30 deadline for all entries. League openings for new teams will be assigned on the basis of the date that the entry was received. Full payment of \$3.50 per bowler must accompany each team entry.

Last year there was a Monday and Wednesday League at Maggio's in Patchogue, a Tuesday and Wednesday League at Port Jefferson, and a Ladies' League on Tuesday at Port Jefferson, all starting at 6:00 p.m. If there is sufficient demand, these can be changed, or other leagues started.

**Now is the time to get busy and get a team together!** The roster can contain from five to ten bowlers (for ladies' teams, four to eight). Entry blanks are available at the Recreation Office. Remember, the earlier you enter, the better your chance of getting into the league of your choice!
