THE GIRL WITH THE GOLDEN EYES

"The Girl With the Golden Eyes" is a strange and brooding tale of perversity among a hedonistic cabal of wealthy Parisian men devoted to helping each other attain their own selfish ends. The story centers around a fashion photographer who has fallen in love with an elusive model he had tried to seduce as a bet.

In nearly all respects, the film's technique is the boldest of all the "new wave" entries: cutting is even more abrupt than that of "Breathless"; photography is exceptionally stunning, with each shot carefully composed for maximum effect; musical background is a guitar played by the composer of the "Forbidden Games" score.

PROGRAM

Sonata No. 40 in B flat, K. 454 for piano and violin W.A. MOZART

Mozart wrote forty sonatas for the violin and piano in his lifetime. This work was composed in 1784 when he was 28 years old. There is no doubt that Mozart himself performed the work at both the pianoforte and the harpsichord. True, the Mozart piano had a more subdued range of dynamics and less ability to sustain the legato sound than the present day piano. It is interesting that these sonatas were always titled "Sonatas for Pianoforte with Violin Obligato."

These three tales are entitled: "How the Whale Got His Throat," "How the Rhinoceros Got His Skin" (after Rudyard Kipling); and "The Princess on the Pea" (after Hans Andersen). Their intent is to use music not as an accompaniment to the words, but more as another equal line – in other words, as chamber music. There are times when there is only music and times when there are only words, but for the most part, words and music together form a new dimension. The result is not an old, well-known story, but a new experience with old and new materials. There is much that is descriptive in the music, but the overall development is formal and controlled.

— INTERMISSION —**Sonata No. 9 in A Major, Opus 47 for piano and violin LUDWIG VON BEETHOVEN**

The ninth sonata that Beethoven wrote for piano and violin is popularly called the "Kreutzer Sonata" and is probably one of the best known works in this genre. This work in three movements has a very interesting background.

A young violinist-virtuoso, George Augustus Polgreen Bridgetower, born of an African father and a German or Polish mother, appeared on the Viennese musical scene and was introduced to Beethoven by Prince Lichnowsky. He enlisted Beethoven's support in a public concert, and he performed the Opus 47 then for the first time. (The work was completed at 4:00 A.M. and performed at 8:00 A.M.!)

Ries writes, "the famous Sonata in A, Opus 47 with concertante violin, dedicated to Rudolph Kreutzer in Paris was originally composed for Bridgetower."

"On the morning of the concert Beethoven summoned me (Ries) at 4:30 A.M. and said, 'Copy the violin part of the first movement, all quickly.'" Ries continues, "the pianoforte part was noted down only here and there in parts. Bridgetower had to play the marvelously beautiful theme and variations in F from Beethoven's manuscript in the Ausgarten at 8:00 A.M. because there was no time to copy it. The final Allegro (Presto), however, was beautifully written since it originally belonged to the Sonata in A Major, Opus 30."

Bridgetower left these following notes on his copy after the performance. "When I accompanied him in this sonata concertante at Wien, at the repetition of the first part of the Presto, I initiated the flight at the 18th bar of the presto of this movement thus! (exactly as the piano had done except to go one octave higher at the end of the ascending arpeggio.) Beethoven jumped up, embraced me, saying, 'Once again, my dear boy.' Then he held the open pedal during this flight, the chord of C as at the ninth bar."

Beethoven's expression was so chaste, which always characterized the performance of all his slow movements that it was unanimously hailed to be repeated twice."

Bridgetower related many years later that he and Beethoven were close companions at the time of the composition of this sonata and that the first copy bore a dedication to him; but before he (Bridgetower) departed from Vienna, they had a quarrel about a girl and Beethoven then rededicated the work to Rudolph Kreutzer.

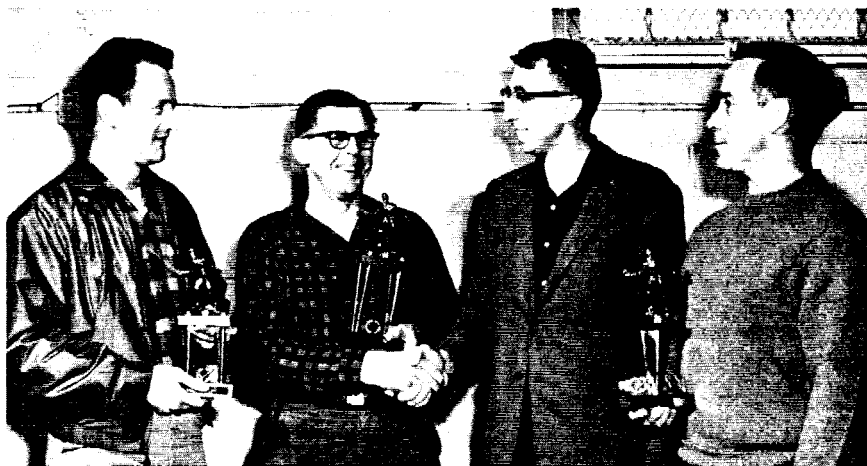

JUNIOR LIFE SAVING CLASS

Registration is now being accepted at the Recreation Office for children (ages 12 to 15) of employees interested in joining our Junior Life Saving course which will be given at the Pool on Monday evenings at 6:00 p.m. beginning February 3.

Red Cross certificates will be presented to those who meet the necessary qualifications at the conclusion of the lessons. Each lesson will be one and one-half hours long and the class will meet once a week for a twelve-week period. Registration fee for the entire course is \$8.50 per student. An American Red Cross Junior Life Saving Manual (cost included in fee) will be distributed to each class member.

Obviously, a certain degree of swimming proficiency is required to be eligible for the course. The minimum requirement is ability to swim 75 yards in reasonably good style.

The first session on February 3 will be devoted to qualifying tests. Should a student fail to meet the necessary standards, his registration fee will be refunded.

Since the size of the class will be limited, please register early. Applications must be accompanied by the \$8.50 fee. (Make checks payable to B.E.R.A.)

As in the past, there will be no credit for equipment turned in or charge for items taken out of the pool. Active use of this service will save the Laboratory substantial sums of money and time.
