## BERA FILM SERIES L'AVVENTURA

Thurs., Feb. 20, Lecture Hall, 8:30 p.m.

The plot of L'Avventura is deceptively simple: during a yachting trip off Sicily, a young woman disappears. Her lover searches for her unsuccessfully, meanwhile falling in love with her best friend. The latter, at the end of the picture, discovers him in the arms of another woman, and in the film's last lingering shot, she is seen touching him in a gesture of pity.

It is safe to say that L'Avventura is a landmark in the history of the cinema. Not only is it an acknowledged masterpiece in itself, but it has had an extraordinary influence in creating a new language of the cinema as well as in developing new film horizons through its profoundly modern technique. Since the 1960 Cannes Film Festival, L'Avventura has been recognized as one of the most important films of modern times, and in a recent survey of 110 film critics throughout the world, it was second only to Citizen Kane as the finest motion picture ever made.

During the film's shooting, Director Antonioni wrote: "I want the audience to work. I ask them to see the film from the beginning and devote their full attention to it, treating it with the same respect they would give any other work of art. The picture develops like a mosaic. Not until the last piece is in place can you see what the whole thing is about."

The rigor and complexity of L'Avventura require the closest attention on the part of the audience and should not be missed by anyone interested in the enormous future of the modern cinema.

## **RUSSIAN PHYSICISTS VISIT BNL**

Seven Soviet nuclear scientists toured the Laboratory on Wednesday, February 12, and met with Brookhaven scientists working in research areas of mutual interest. The seven visitors are experts in the field of solid state physics and are in the United States as part of the overall U.S.-U.S.S.R. agreement on exchange in the scientific, technical, educational, cultural and other fields.

Ten U.S. specialists in plasma physics and controlled thermonuclear reactions are now visiting Soviet facilities. The first official exchange of scientists between the two countries took place in 1960 under the provisions of a memorandum of cooperation in the peaceful uses of atomic energy signed in Washington on November 24, 1959.

The Soviet scientists arrived in New York on February 10, and on the afternoon of the following day came to Brookhaven, where they spent the night. Following their visit here, they left to tour a number of other U.S. research facilities. At all of these, their technical discussions will be confined to unclassified research in solid state physics and related problems. They are scheduled to depart for Moscow on February 25.

Three other exchanges of scientists in the peaceful uses of atomic energy are being planned with the U.S.S.R. for later this year.
