

BERA FILM SERIES THE FACE OF WAR (BONUS FILM)

Thurs., July 2 — Lecture Hall — 8:30 p.m.

"The Face of War," by Tore Sjoberg (he made the excellent "Mein Kampf"), is a graphic indictment that shudderingly focuses not so much on the leaders who make war but on those who must pay its terrible price – the people.

Through some excellent clips, the film hammers away at man's inhumanity to man in his obedience to the imperative of war: "one man must kill another."

Beginning with World Warl (when conscription was first put into operation on a massive scale), and through to the present time, Sjoberg pursues his thesis. Onto the screen come German troops in Berlin, Mussolini strutting before a vast throng in a Roman square, Franco's troops marching down the crowded avenida, and Soviet citizens thrilling to the clump of Russian boots. Sjoberg points up the awesome weapons fashioned by man in his servitude to the war machine: Big Berthas, poison gas, the A-bombs and the H-bomb. "What will man next devise?", asks the narrator as the screen shows the H-bomb leveling solid steel and concrete structures.
