Bonds Can Fill A Classroom

Is your big dream for your children a higher education to prepare them for a full and productive life?

If it is, you'll be interested to know that U.S. savings bonds have helped fill many a college classroom. The secret is to start saving early with safe, sure savings bonds, the investment that is guaranteed to grow in value year after year as your children approach college age.

Starting early is important because college costs have been increasing steadily. Experts predict that by 1970, the costs of tuition, books, fees, and boarding will double. Right now, an education at a state university costs from about \$4,800 to \$6,400. At a private college, expenses run between \$7,200 and \$10,000.

Foreseeing the rise in college charges, many parents have started savings programs early to make sure they'll have a good sum of money on hand when it's needed. To give you an idea of how you can use bonds for a college education fund, here's an example: If your child is now two years old and you begin setting aside \$37.50 (the purchase price of a \$50.00 bond) each month towards E bonds, you will have \$9,713 by the time he is eighteen years old.

And there's a way to buy E bonds for this purpose that may make them tax-free. The first step is to have the bonds in your child's name only, with either parent listed as a beneficiary, but **not** as co-owner. In this way, the interest credited to the E bonds would become the earnings of your child.

Then, each year, file a Federal income tax return in the child's name, reporting the bond interest accrued in that year. Unless the interest earned in any one year (or a combination of interest and earnings from summer or part-time work) exceeds the \$600 personal exemption, no tax will be due. Through this system, the child

BERA FILM SERIES SPARROWS CAN'T SING



Thursday, July 9, Lecture Hall, 8:30 p.m.

This is one of the perkier daffodils ever to bloom in London's East End, the cosmopolitan dockside district which houses Irish, Norwegians, Gypsies, Nigerians, Italians and Indians, as well as native stock in shabby but colorful style. The first film of the noted theatre personality, Joan Littlewood, it may well be the last to capture the true flavor of the East End before the London City Council razes its ramshackle buildings and replaces them with depersonalized stainless steel.

"Sparrows" is a sort of working-class Restoration comedy about the perky blond Maggie's efforts to prevent the shambles and spilled beer that would result from a meeting between her husband recently returned from the sea and the husband she is currently living with - no tiresome legalities have intervened the two weddings! Well-mixed with the above ingredients are various relatives, friends, and hangers-on, and the cheerful, earthy fulltime inhabitants of the East End. The climax - a magnificent brawl amidst the Friday night music and merrymaking in the local pub - involves the whole cast in a whirl of arms, legs, chairs, ale, and a jolly, if temporary, solution.

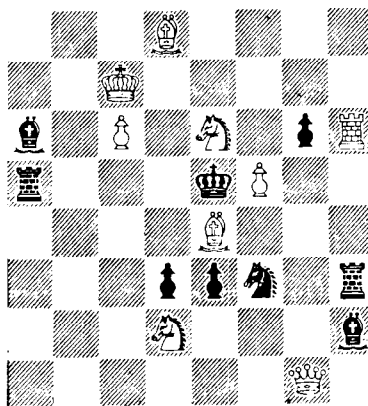

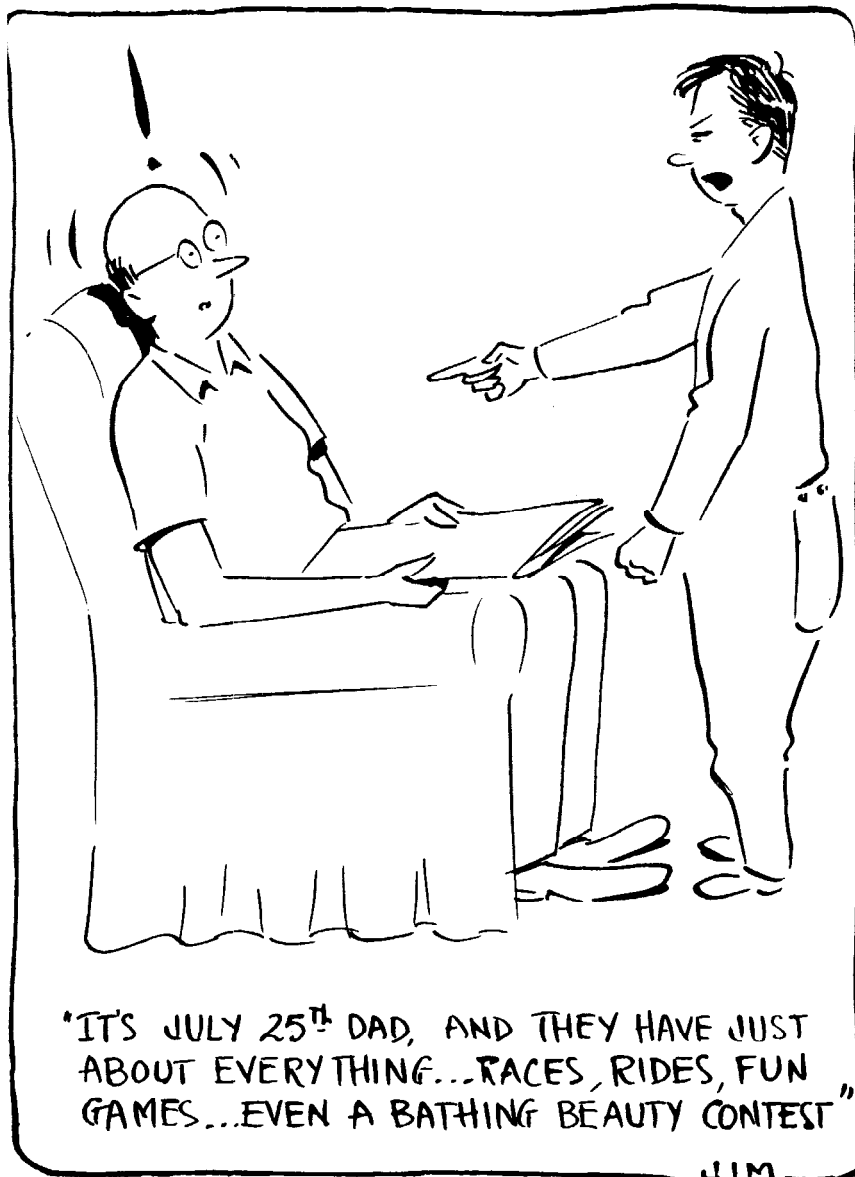

might well be able to apply the full value of the savings bonds, undiminished by tax, to his education fund when the time comes to use it.

As for the relationship between education and income, here's what the latest U.S. Census Bureau figures show: The average yearly income in 1961 for professional and technical workers in the 25-64 age group with a grammar school diploma, about \$6,000; for those with a high school diploma, about \$7,000; and for those with four or more years of college, \$10,000 and over.

If you want to help your youngsters get to college, you can make a good beginning now by enrolling in the Laboratory's Payroll Savings Plan, a tailor-made arrangement for the regular and automatic purchase of Series E bonds.

As you know, B.N.L. and other organizations throughout the country are cooperating with the Treasury Department by participating in a Freedom Bond Drive during the month of July.
