BERA FILM SERIES THREE FABLES OF LOVE



Thursday, Aug. 6, 8:30 p.m., Lecture Hall

A frothy little meringue of a film with a pinch of Gallic salt and a good deal of Italian sweetening to make its worldly lessons delightful to chew and swallow. In his fables, La Fontaine, like Aesop, gave animals human characteristics to point out the absurdity of our unwisdom: Directors Rene Clair Alessandro Biasetti, and Herve Bromberger, in adapting the fables, have settled the responsibility for man's foolishness right back where it belongs, on the all-toofallible human beings.

In "The Hare and the Tortoise," the ravishing Monica Vitti demonstrates that the race for Rossano Brazzi's affections is not necessarily to the girl who drives her sportscar fastest or shows the most skin. In "The Fox and the Crow" a clever fellow plays upon the exaggerated self-esteem of a small-town district attorney (who has, by the way, an extraordinarily pretty wife) to exact a typically French form of revenge for his lost court case. Rene Clair gives a sly twist to the story of the "Two Pigeons' by supposing that a beautiful and sophisticated model (Leslie Caron) is accidently cooped up for a long weekend with a shy neighbor (Charles Aznavour) who really wants to go fishing.

It's possible that no great moral lesson can be educed from "Three Fables of Love," but as a witty commentary on human foibles, whipped to a foam by clever direction and sugared with several wonderful stars in uncharacteristic roles, it makes a tempting "gateau."


FISHERMAN'S NIGHT
