Ingmar Bergman's



WINTERLIGHT

Thurs., Aug. 27 — 8:30 p.m. — Lecture Hall

In this second film of his trilogy, Bergman has taken his characters' relationship with God a step further back — into the arid wilderness where God's voice no longer reaches man, but a wilderness survived by some of the greatest saints. Against a country parish laboring in jewel hard-cold and the pale light of mid-winter, he shows us a pastor who has lost his faith and cannot

ROBERT F. SMITH, PHOTOMICROSCOPIST TO RECEIVE AWARDS

Mr. Robert F. Smith, Senior Technical Photographer at Brookhaven National Laboratory, has won several of the 1964 Biological Photographic Association awards for excellence in biomedical photography. The presentations will be made at the Association's annual awards banquet on August 27, during the course of its 34th annual meeting at the Hotel Roosevelt in New York City, August 24-27.

Mr. Smith's photomicrograph showing "Obelia Hydroid Generation" receives first award in the Color Photomicrography Class; he has also won the Charles Foster Memorial Citation with this entry. In addition, his color photomicrograph of "Mutant Stamen Hairs" receives honorable mention.

The Biological Photographic Association is the only professional society in North America dedicated to progress in the visual disciplines of biomedical communications. Its awards are, therefore, of international stature.

give comfort to a despairing parishioner whose numb fear of the bomb covers his having no reason to live. The man commits suicide, and as the pastor and his schoolteacher-mistress bring the news to the dead man's family and prepare for evening service, Bergman shows us that the pastor has gone yet a step farther — he cannot forget his late wife, he cannot love his mistress, he cannot even accept her love. In a scene of lacerating cruelty the pastor lays bare his frozen soul and flays the spirit of his mistress, yet the tiny spark of the human unwillingness to give up life or to consent to the loss of God forces him to start the evening service in a church empty except for the schoolteacher and the crippled churchwarden, whose own physical sufferings have taught him that Christ's torment on the cross was as nothing compared with His agony when He thought God had forsaken Him. Life continues no matter how much one fears and doubts. God continues though man is temporarily estranged from Him, the priesthood continues though the pastor suffers as if he were damned. 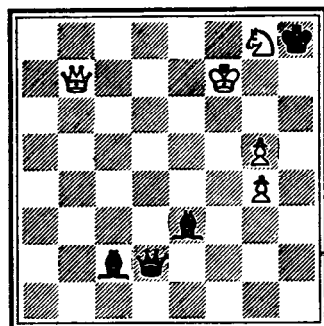

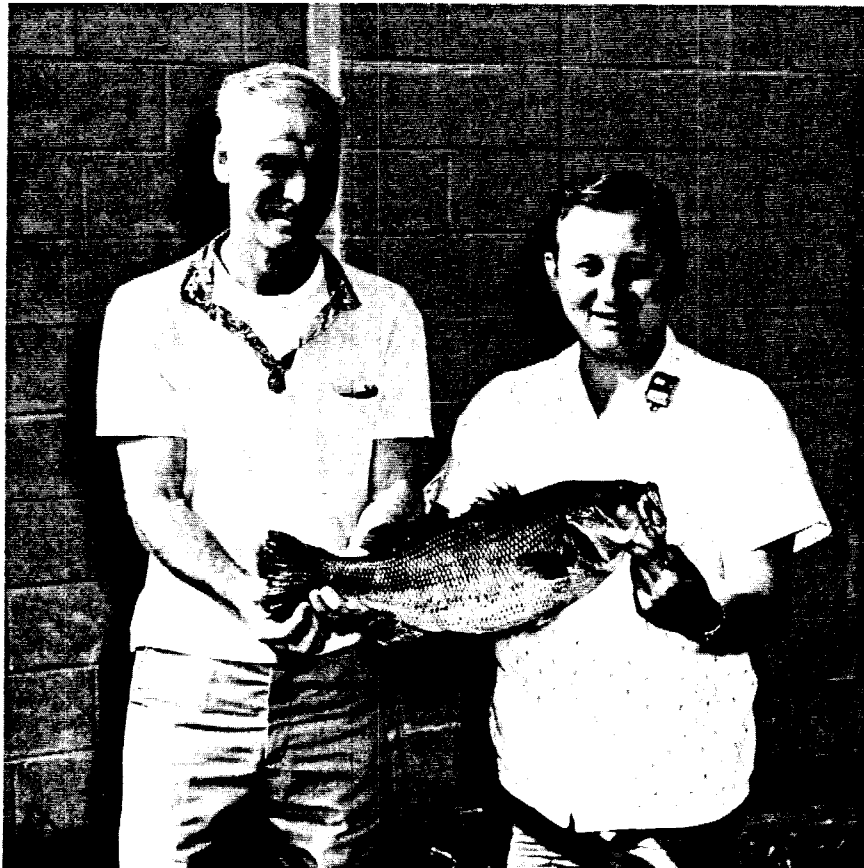
