BARBARA WARD OPENS PEGRAM LECTURESHIP THIS WEEK

Starting Friday, November 6, Barbara Ward (Lady Jackson) will present at the Laboratory Theatre a series of three public lectures under the general title, "World Affairs: A Sense of Direction."

This is the sixth in the Pegram Lectureship series, a program of annual lectures established at Brookhaven to honor an individual for his accomplishments and provide a forum for his discussion of his own major area of experience and interests. The Lectureship is established in the name of the late George B. Pegram, the eminent Columbia University nuclear physicist who played a key role in the founding of Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Miss Ward's three lectures will be given at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, November 6; Monday, November 9; and Wednesday, November 11. They are entitled, respectively, "The Balance of Power," "The Balance of Wealth," and "The Balance of Ideology."

Barbara Ward – economist, philosopher, writer and lecturer – is one of the most striking women of her generation. She has gained a wide reputation for her interpretation of problems in international economics and is a frequent contribution leading newspapers and magazines with articles on current world affairs. Bor in Yorkshire, England in 1914, she studied at the Sorbonne in France, in Germany, and then at Somerville College, Oxford, where she took first class honors degreein philosophy, politics and economics. In 1939, she became assistant editor of THE ECONOMIST, and a few years later was elected to a membership of the Royal Institute of International Affairs. In the United States, Miss Ward has addressed such important audiences as that of the New York Herald Tribune Forum, and she ha. received honorary degrees from Smith College and Columbia and Harvard Universities. Her latest books are "India and the West" and "The Rich Nations and the Poor Nations."
