ALIEN ADDRESS REPORTS DUE IN JANUARY

The U.S. Government requires that aliens who are in the United States on January 1 of each year shall report their addresses **during the month of January**. This is required even though the alien has not changed his address since the last report.

The parent or legal guardian of alien children under fourteen years of age must report for these children.

Any alien who is temporarily absent from the country on January 1 must report his address within ten days after his return to the U.S.A.

What To Do

Aliens may go to any U.S. Post Office or to any Immigration and Naturalization Service Office and ask for the Address Report Card, Form I-53. When the card has been completely filled in and signed, it should be handed to an employee in any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Office. The card **should not** be folded or torn and **should not be mailed**.

Information Needed

In addition to his address, an alien reports the date and place of entry into the United States, the date and place of birth, nationality, and most important—his alien registration number.

Alien Registration Number

An alien's registration number is the number preceded by the letter "A" appearing on his alien registration receipt card.

Aliens admitted temporarily to the U.S. should write "NONIMMIGRANT" in the space provided on the report form for showing the registration number.

If the alien is a newly-arrived immigrant who has not yet received his alien registration receipt, he should write "NOT RECEIVED" in that space.

If an alien has lost his receipt, he should write "LOST" in the space and immediately apply for a new receipt at the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Penalties

Remember that severe penalties may be imposed upon those persons who willfully or inexcusably fail to report

NO EXIT



Thurs., Jan. 7 - Lecture Hall - 8:30 p.m.

Based on Jean-Paul Sartre's play, "No Exit" offers a vision of an existential Hell. Hell is other people. JUNIOR LIFE SAVING CLASS

Registration is now being accepted at the Recreation Office for children (ages 12 to 15) of employees interested in joining our Junior Life Saving course which will be given at the Pool on Monday evenings at 6:00 p.m. beginning on February 1.

Red Cross certificates will be presented to those who meet the necessary qualifications at the conclusion of the lessons. Each lesson will be one and one-half hour long and the class will meet once a week for a twelve-week period. Registration fee for the entire course is \$9.00 per student. An American Red Cross Junior Life Saving Manual (cost included in fee) will be distributed to each class member.

Obviously, a certain degree of swimming proficiency is required to be eligible for the course. The minimum requirement is ability to swim 75 yards in reasonably good style.

The first session on February 1 will be devoted to qualifying tests. Should a student fail to meet the necessary standards, his registration fee will be refunded.

Since the size of the class will be limited, please register early. Applications must be accompanied by the \$9.00 fee. (Make checks payable to B.E.R.A.)
