BERA FILM SERIES PURPLE NOON

Rene Clement ("Forbidden Games," "Gervaise") has here fashioned a highly entertaining murder thriller, beautifully photographed in color by Henri Decae ("400 Blows," "The Cousins," "Sundays and Cybele"). Maurice Ronet plays a rich American playboy vacationing in Italy, accompanied by Alain Delon who has been offered a reward by Ronet's father to cure his son of decadent idling. Delon soon realizes it is a futile cause and murders his companion to assume his identity and wealth.

The methods by which this plan is carried out are a marvel of intricate detail, all chronicled in a fast-paced expose that even includes quite a good lesson in successful forgery. The murder sequence is extremely well done, and if the ending is not entirely plausible, it is, nevertheless, a "shocker."

A.U.I. TRUSTEE SCHOLARSHIPS ARE ESTABLISHED

A scholarship program for the children of regular employees of Brookhaven National Laboratory and the National Radio Astronomy Observatory has been established by the Board of Trustees of Associated Universities, Inc.

Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director, announced the creation of the A.U.I. Trustee Scholarships to all Brookhaven employees on January 18.

Under the new program, up to ten scholarships each year will be made available to the children of regular BNL employees. They will carry a stipend of up to \$900 per year. For those who maintain satisfactory progress in school, the scholarships will be renewable for up to three additional years.

Winners of the awards may attend any accredited college or university in the United States and may select any course of study leading to a bachelor's degree.

The scholarships will be granted on a strictly competitive basis, independent of financial need and the existence of other forms of aid to the student. Winners will be selected on the basis of their secondary school academic records and general aptitude for college work as indicated by achievement and aptitude tests.

The Laboratory will not be involved in the processing of applications or the determination of scholarship winners. The entire selection procedure will be handled for Associated Universities by an independent organization, the Educational Testing Service.

The first A.U.I. Trustee Scholarships will be available to current secondary school seniors entering an accredited college or university this coming fall (1965), whether on regular or advanced standing. Application forms, together with a schedule of critical dates for completing required tests, etc., may be obtained now at the Office of Scientific Personnel, Second Floor, Administration Building. The completed applications **must** be received by the Educational Testing Service **no later than Friday, January 29, 1965**. It should be emphasized that this date constitutes an absolute deadline.

B.E.R.A. GOLF CLUB FORMING!

Charter membership will close on March 1, 1965, and memberships after that date will cost an additional \$2.00 initiation fee.

B.E.R.A. Golf Association members will be entitled to a special group rate* for greens fees at the new Lustgarten Golf Course on Yaphank Road, just south of Longwood. Additional club privileges are still being negotiated. This course, scheduled for a March 15, 1965 opening, features both an eighteen and a nine hole course, all championship size. A clubhouse, complete with restaurant, bar, lockers, showers, pro shop, etc., is to open about the same time. The nursery plantings on the 27 holes make it the prettiest layout ever seen by the B.E.R.A. committee members who recently inspected it.
