BROOKHAVEN RESERVISTS WIN NATIONAL AWARD

Rear Admiral J.K. Leydon, U.S.N., Chief of Naval Research, will make a special trip to the Laboratory on February 18. His purpose will be to present personally to a group of Brookhaven Reserve officers the Award for General Excellence. This group, Naval Reserve Research Company 3-9, has won the fourth national competition for General Excellence as conducted by the Office of Naval Research. These same reservists also took top honors in 1962, the second national competition.

All aspects of a research company's normal activities plus any special projects undertaken are considered by a special board of ranking naval officers which last year reviewed 118 such reserve companies. The winning company received high grades not only on inspections, on participation in active duty for training, on correspondence course competition, on drill attendence and other normal factors, but also for conceiving and conducting the Tenth Annual Research Reserve Seminar in Health Physics at Brookhaven Laboratory last March.

LCDR S.J. Tassinari, USNR, Commanding Officer of NRRC 3-9 will receive the award at a presentation dinner to be given at the Brookhaven Center.

BERA BOARD ELECTION

The following slate of candidates has been selected by the BERA nominating committee for election to the Board:



PRESIDENT'S BUDGET CONTAINS ITEMS FOR B.N.L.

President Lyndon Johnson's budget, released last Monday, contains a request for funds for possible land acquisition and the support of research programs at the Laboratory.

The budget requests \$47,000,000 for the operation of the Laboratory in.FY 1966 and about \$11,000,000 for capital equipment. In addition, \$3,000,000 was requested for design work on conversion of the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron to produce a greater beam intensity and provide for increased experimental capabilities and flexibility, and more than \$1,000,000 was requested for an addition to the existing AGS Service Building. Also requested was about \$1,000,000 for an animal laboratory for the Medical Research program at Brookhaven.




Proposed additions to the Laboratory site are shown in black.

The budget, as approved by the President, contains over \$2,500,000 for the acquisition of land on the present north, east, and south boundaries of the Laboratory. This area, totaling about 1,700 acres, is unoccupied except for a few homes and summer cottages close to B.N.L.'s northern boundary. If authorized and appropriated, the funds would be used to move the Laboratory's boundary to approximately Deer Leap Road on the north; nearly to the north-south Brookhaven-Riverhead town line on the east; and to the edge of the proposed L.I. Expressway extension on the south. The additional land could accommodate future Laboratory growth and, in any event, would provide flexibility for B.N.L.'s programs and facilities.

The current budget requests for Brookhaven's operating and equipment funds are slightly above the FY 1965 amounts of \$44,000,000 and \$8,500,000, respectively.

NEW B.N.L. ACQUISITION: A PERIPATETIC COMPUTER

Pate with the BNL Physics Department's newest addition to its on-line data processing facility, a large-scale PDP-6 computer housed in a forty-foot trailer. Designed for use in advanced particle and nuclear physics research, the computer on wheels will never leave its stainless steel headquarters, but will roll from location to location on site as it is needed. The new facility arrived at Brookhaven a week ago after a nine-hour drive from Maynard, Massachusetts, where it was constructed by the Digital Equipment Corporation. Truck driver Kenny Dykeman claims he made the trip unaided by what might rate as the world's most calculating backseat driver!

B.E.R.A. GOLF CLUB FORMING!

The nursery plantings on the 27 holes make it the prettiest layout ever seen by the B.E.R.A. committee members who recently inspected it.

Golf instructions are also being contemplated for those members who desire them – perhaps toward the end of this winter. Members can also look forward to a variety of equipment and golf ball purchase discounts offered to the Association by several suppliers.
