

# FORTY-FIFTH BROOKHAVEN LECTURE

lonizing radiation is one of many factors potentially affecting the distribution, abundance, and behavior of plants and animals. It is of particular interest because of its very fundamental and far-reaching effects on living systems. Since 1961 Dr. Woodwell and his associates have been studying the effects of ionizing radiation on plant and animal populations under natural conditions. Their studies have involved, among other experiments, the irradiation of a native oak-pine forest on the Brookhaven Laboratory site. Dr. Woodwell will discuss this work, showing how ionizing radiation affects natural communities and how radiation effects are related to ecologists' understanding of the natural patterns of structure and function of these communities.

# **COST REDUCTION GETS A BOOST**

Only part of the silver in photographic film is used in forming the image, the remainder being dissolved in the fixing solution. The Photography group is now recovering this silver with recently installed plating equipment.

After refining, the amount of silver in the wheelbarrow should be worth some \$1,200. According to John, the only cloud on the horizon is the plan of the Bubble Chamber Group to convert to bright field illumination which will use more silver in the image: "It seems a pity to waste all that lovely silver just taking pictures!"
