SYNOPSIS

Pierre Etaix, "The Suitor", lives immured from the world in his parents' home in Paris, snowed in by his books, charts, and impedimenta of his scientific hobbies. Papa and Mama, who have charming foibles of their own, are concerned about Pierre's bachelorhood. One day Papa is able to persuade Pierre to go out into the world to find a wife.

With characteristic abandonment to the new idea, Pierre sallies forth, dressed like a boulevardier, to try to discover and woo a mate.

He is involved in fantastic gaucheries in the park, on the street, in a nightclub. He eventually becomes enamoured of Stella, a television star, and embarks on a fantastic rampage to make her his own. After a series of wildly funny misadventures, he arrives backstage in Stella's dressing room. Result? Disillusionment! Catastrophe!!

Pierre Etaix, the writer, director and star of "The Suitor", has sky-rocketed to popularity as a comedian and has been described as the heir to the tradition of the golden age of comedy. His chain gags build and build. His story is made up of funny touches and wry social observations, with dialog reduced to a minimum. He keeps his audiences wondering what the next surprise will be. Writes the New Yorker, "Étaix has judiciously ransacked the archives of early American comedy, plucking what he fancies from the work of such founding fathers as Chaplin, Lloyd, Langdon, and Keaton, and, thanks to his being of a much later generation, to his being French, and to his own undoubted talent, he has made something wholly new and delightful out of his magpie gleeanings.

MARVIN FOX DIES

Marvin Fox, former Chairman of the Reactor Department, died suddenly on March 19 of a heart attack. For the past five years he had been a senior scientist and manager of the Arms Control Programs of Hughes Aircraft Company in Culver City, California.



Dr. Fox was born February 1, 1910, in Cleveland. After obtaining a B.S. degree (1931) at Carnegie Institute of Technology, he was awarded an M.A. (1932) and a Ph.D. (1936) in Physics by Columbia University for studies on nuclear moments and atomic beams. He remained at Columbia until 1937, collaborating with Prof. Harold Urey in isotope separation studies. In 1942, he joined the Radiation Laboratory at MIT, then subsequently returned to Columbia in 1944 where he worked in the S.A.M. laboratories.

Dr. Fox joined the BNL staff as a Senior Scientist in early 1947, soon after the Laboratory was founded. As an Assistant Chairman of the Reactor Science and Engineering Department, he bore major responsibility in the design, construction and startup of the graphite reactor. From 1952 to 1957, he was Chairman of the Reactor Department. During his years at Brookhaven, Dr. Fox was a strong and outspoken advocate

of the peaceful applications of nuclear technology, and was instrumental in achieving the sweeping declassification of the non-military aspects of atomic energy which took place in 1955. He also made important contributions towards bringing private enterprise into nuclear sciences by organizing oneweek seminars for business executives in connection with the National Industrial Conference Board, In 1956, he led a U.S.A.E.C. investigation committee that surveyed nuclear research needs and capabilities in Asian countries of the Colombo Plan, a program for technical aid.

After leaving BNL in 1957, Dr. Fox became vice president of Internuclear Company and served in Rome for two years. In 1959, he directed the Sodium Reactor Department of Atomics International, a division of North American Aviation.

The fishing contest caters to the Average Fisherman, with a bi-monthly award for the average fish caught during the two-month period. The average will be arrived at by tabulating all the points for the period and dividing by the number of entries. Anyone who enters a fish has a chance of winning a prize. Of course, there are other prizes, including awards for surf, boat and fresh water fishing.

The rules follow. Please read, cut out the entry blank, enter and win! Extra copies of entry blanks, rules and fish weights are available at the Recreation Office. See George Sabine or this year's committee chairman, John McCafferty, Ext. 482.

1964 BNL FISHING CONTEST RULES

- 1. Any fresh or salt water fish contained in the BNL 1964 List of Species is eligible for entry.
- 2. All entries must be caught by rod and reel.
- All entries must be submitted within one week after the fish is caught.
- 4. Each entry must be weighed on a scale which is calibrated in ounces. This type of scale is available at any grocery or meat market.
- Decisions of the contest committee are final.
- The contest begins April 1, 1965, and ends on November 30, 1965.
- 7. To compute the point value of a fish, the weight of the fish will be divided by the 1965 BNL Listed Weight for that species, and multiplied by 1,000.

8. Awards

- a. One award for the highest entry for every two month period starting April 1.
- b. One award for the average entry for every two month period.
- c. An annual award to the person who achieves the greatest accumulation of points as follows: each person's largest single entry in each species will be totaled toward his accumulation of points. - Fisherman of the year. An individual cannot win two consecutive years.
- d. One annual award for each of the following:
 - 1. Highest saltwater entry caught trolling or bait fishing.
 - 2. Highest saltwater entry caught casting artificial lure.
 - Highest freshwater entry.
- e. Annual awards limited to one per employee.
- f. Bi-monthly awards limited to two per employee, not both in the same two month period.
- 9. To be eligible for an Average Fish award, a total of at least three entries is required (not by the same person) in each two month period. The same applies to the highest entry if each of the fish entered is under 200 points. Only the largest fish per species, per person, counts toward the Average Fish award.
