ARBORETUM TOUR FOR STAFF WIVES



NEW WATER TREATMENT PLANT FOR BNL



On Tuesday, March 9, the Laboratory's new water treatment plant went "on stream." The need for such a facility had been apparent for the past several years: BNL, like other Long Island communities, is plagued with iron-bearing water. Disagreeable taste; brown stains on sinks, glassware and kitchen utensils; plugged heat exchange equipment and scientific apparatus - all have given eloquent testimony to the nuisance value of iron in our well water.

The new plant is located on Upton Road just north of Cornell Avenue. As shown in the photograph, it is composed of (clockwise, from lower right); an aerator; three gravity filters; clearwell, or storage reservoir; and a service building which houses pumps, chemical feed equipment and the control center.

Briefly, the treatment process consists of aeration to oxidize the iron from the soluble ferrous state to the relatively insoluble ferric state. Hydrated lime is fed to the raw water to neutralize CO₂ and raise the PH. Following the aeration and chemical addition, about thirty minutes' retention time is provided for the reaction to go to completion. Gravity filtration through a sand bed removes the precipitated ferric oxide. As the water leaves the filter and passes to the clearwell, or storage reservoir, chlorine is added as insurance against bacterial contamination. The final step in the treatment is to add a very small amount of polyphosphate in order to keep in solution any trace amounts of remaining iron.

During 1960, the domestic water consumption at the Laboratory averaged 1,150,000 gallons per day, with a peak of 1,800,000 gallons. The average daily consumption figure during 1964 was 2,600,000 gallons, with a peak of 3,960,000 gallons. It is anticipated that the consumption figures for 1965 will be even greater. (In addition to the domestic water supply system, the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron and Medical Department research facilities are serviced by separate cooling water systems from separate wells.)

Before the start-up of the water treatment plant, BNL's domestic system was supplied by four well pumps directly connected to the distribution system at four widely separated points. Now, all water enters the distribution system at the (Continued on page 4)

corner of Cornell Avenue and Upton Road. The change in flow pattern has stirred up sand that has accumulated over the years in the system. It is possible that some of this, along with bits of Oakum, will find its way into pump suction strainers, valves and other equipment using water. This condition may persist for another two to three weeks. A program of hydrant flushing is now underway in order to shorten the time required to completely rid the system of sand and Oakum.
