I.A.E.C. TO SPONSOR SYMPOSIUM AT BNL

A five-day symposium on chemical exchange reactions will be held at the Laboratory beginning May 31. This is the second scientific symposium to be held in the United States under the sponsorship of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), a United Nations-affiliated organization with headquarters in Vienna, Austria. The symposium is being held in cooperation with Brookhaven and the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission. The first IAEA Symposium to be held in the United States, on the biological effects of neutron irradiations, was also held at the Laboratory.

Some 50 scientists from 11 countries are expected to attend. The following countries will be represented: Australia, Canada, France, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Switzerland, United States, and Yugoslavia.

At the symposium, scientists will present papers dealing with the mechanisms by which electrons and atoms transfer from one molecule to another. Two Australian scientists, D.R. Stranks and J.R. Yandell, will discuss electron transfer reactions induced by light; Hungarian scientists E. Koros, L. Pataki, L. Ladanyi, and M. Orban will survey the role of the medium in the exchange of iodine atoms; and a German scientist, K.H. Lieser, will discuss exchange reactions on the surface of crystals. Other papers deal with exchange reactions of aromatic molecules and electron and proton transfer reactions in biological systems. These studies shed light on a variety of fundamental chemical and biological processes. These include some aspects of chemical bonding, catalysis, and electron conduction.

Brookhaven's fame has spread far and wide. Each year, more and more groups in science clamor to see the Laboratory. BNL scientists and technical personnel are called on to explain our unique facilities to the visitors, but during the past year, they have been spared the problems of keeping the visiting groups together and on time. How? These tasks are now the responsibility of Personnel's "Girl Guides."

At present, there are four Guides. However, six additional girls are now being trained so that they also may have the opportunity to become better acquainted with Brookhaven and occasionally play hostess to our visitors. Training consists of touring with a departmental guide the various Lab facilities to gather some basic information about them, meeting the personnel in each building, going over routes to learn the best way to travel between buildings, and, finally, a few hours of instructions given by various administrative personnel.

A Guide's major function is to shepherd her flock and see that it meets its time schedule at each point to be visited (no small feat!) A group may see as many as six facilities in one day. At each, someone will be waiting to give the "high level" technical tour. The Guides must know enough about the area being shown to fill in should the departmental expert be delayed. (All the girls hope this never happens!) Should such a delay occur, however, the Guides find they have good use for their hours of schooling.

If you should see a group of visitors with a BNL Girl Guide who looks lost in spite of all her training, be kind and rush right up to help – maybe **you** can show **her** the way!

BOATERS BEWARE

Do you carry gasoline in your automobile? Perhaps you should take a look at the following item from "Safety Briefs", a New Jersey State Safety Council publication:

"One warm summer day, two safety experts tried an experiment. They placed a safety can full of gasoline in the trunk of a car--just as one might do if transporting gasoline from a service station to one's home or boat. They backed off to a safe distance and waited. Within 20 minutes, the entire back of the car exploded."

"The reason--a safety container is designed to breathe. As the experimenters waited, the inside of the trunk became warmer and this caused the gasoline in the can to expand and build up enough pressure to force vapors out past the cap. In a sealed compartment, such as an automobile trunk, the vapors would ultimately reach explosive proportions. All that is necessary to set it off is a source of ignition, which could be a short circuit in a tail light or a defect in the car's ignition."

"To safely carry gasoline in a car, put it in a container listed by a recognized testing authority, such as U.L. or F.M. (Factory Mutuals). Put the can in the back seat area and keep all of the windows open. Keep it in the car for as brief a time as possible and never carry a "spare" can of gasoline for an emergency."


