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CHILDREN'S SUMMER PROGRAM

On-Site Play Sessions

The morning portion of the program will be for the children of on-site residents only. Participants must be at least five years of age. The sessions will be held daily from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at the Recreation Building in the Apartment Area. Applications will be sent directly to residents.

Swimming Lessons

The afternoon segment of the program will be open to all employees' children. Classes will be conducted at the pool weekdays from 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. Each child will be scheduled for one lesson per week. Please note that this year, because of increased participation, lessons will be scheduled Monday through Friday. Only **one** classification will be scheduled per day.

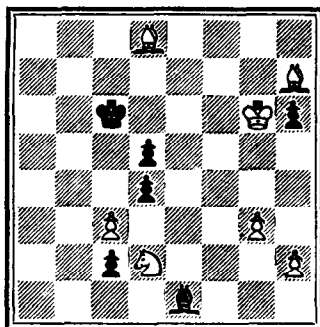

DR. G.K. GREEN RECEIVES AWARD

At the Honor Awards Convocation held by the College of Engineering, University of Illinois on May 4, Dr. G.K. Green, Chairman of BNL's Accelerator Department, received the College of Engineering Alumni Honor Award for Distinguished Service in Engineering. This is a new award to be given annually to approximately five University of Illinois alumni. The award citation reads as follows: To George Kenneth Green, physicist, engineer, research administrator, for his outstanding leadership in planning and direction of engineering work in the building of unusually unique devices for scientific research.

The award consists of a medal, to be given to alumni or former staff members who have distinguished themselves by outstanding leadership in planning and direction of engineering work, by fostering professional development of young engineers, or by their contributions to knowledge in the field of engineering.

DOUBLE FEATURE — TWO CLASSIC HORROR FILMS

DEMENTIA

Described by Downbeat Magazine as "the first foreign film made in Hollywood" and banned by the New York Censor Board as "inhuman, indecent and the quintessence of gruesomeness," "Dementia" is, to understate it, a strange film. It delves, without dialog or narration, into the clutter of reality and hallucination in the mind of a psychopathic young woman who murders her father, kills a lecherous suitor and cuts off his hand in an attempt to retrieve her necklace. George Antheil's musical score, played by Shorty Rogers and his Giants, is an integral part of the overall effect, and in itself is best described as "frightening."

FREAKS

"Freaks" is the first film of its kind, and undoubtedly the last. In Europe it has always been considered a sensation and was highly praised by critics, though its American release was confined to grind-run exploitation theatres. At the 1962 Cannes Film Festival Repertory, "Freaks" was selected to represent the horror film.

In its plot, a beautiful "normal" aerialist (Olga Baclanova) learns one of the midgets (Harry Earles) has inherited a fortune. She contrives to marry him, planning to kill him. Later, both the midget and his friends discover a poisoning attempt; and, in hair-raising climax, the freaks set upon the aerialist to maim her.

"The following year, Browning made the best film of his career, 'Freaks.' It is a surprisingly realistic drama of side-show freaks and a grotesque love affair... 'Freaks' contained some astounding scenes. One was the wedding feast at which Miss Baclanova was the only normal person present, and a scene in the 'Freaks' epilogue has been called the most horrible scene in film history."

TRIP TO THE WHITE HOUSE

Last week I was invited to attend the signing of The Arms Control and Disarmament Act Extension on Thursday morning at the White House. The invitation was issued to a number of representatives of national organizations that have been interested in disarmament, in my case The Federation of American Scientists.

The ceremony was planned for 11:30, but the President had an emergency meeting with Congressmen on the Dominican crisis, so it didn't take place until 1:00 p.m. This left a goodly time to meet people and talk. In addition to the organizational people and the press, there were a number of government officials on hand: William Foster, Director, and Herbert Sவில், Chief Scientist of The Arms Control and Disarmament Agency; Donald Hornig, Scientific Advisor to the President; and Glen Seaborg, Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The signing took place in the Rose Garden. Perhaps some of you saw it on the TV news. I was standing right under the TV cameras. President Johnson spoke on the dangers of nuclear war and the need for disarmament from the steps of the White House. He was accompanied by Secretary of State Rusk, Vice President Humphrey, and others who had been in conference with him. After the short speech, he signed his name using a pen for each letter. He handed them out first to the government officials (who must have quite a collection by now) and then the rest of us were called up, one at a time. It was a simple and rather informal ceremony on a very hot day.

This is the first time The Federation of American Scientists has been invited to such a function. As its representative, I appreciate the thoughtfulness which lay behind the invitation and am encouraged to keep working for a world that is free from fear.
