# DR. G. NORRIS GLASOE RECEIVES AWARD

At the annual alumni dinner at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota on May 29, Dr. G. Norris Glasoe, one of BNL's Assistant Directors, received a Distinguished Alumnus Award. This award is made annually to several outstanding alumni, at a ceremony connected with St. Olaf College's commencement exercises.

In Dr. Glasoe's citation, reference was made to his responsibilities as one of three students building and operating WCAL in 1922. This was one of the first college radio stations to be licensed; it has since become one of the most important broadcasting stations in southern Minnesota. The citation continues: "At the University of Wisconsin, where he earned his advanced degrees, Dr. Glasoe distinguished himself as an exceedingly able experimenter in the field of photoelectricity. As a member of the staff and associate group leader at the Radiation Laboratory at MIT during World War II, he worked in the field of pulse generators and is a co-author and co-editor of a book on that subject." The citation concludes with mention of Dr. Glasoe's current position at Brookhaven and his responsibilities in connection with low energy accelerators.

# U.S.S.R. SPECIALISTS VISIT BNL



Ten Soviet specialists in radioactive waste disposal visited the Laboratory on June 2 and 3, as part of their tour of unclassified waste disposal facilities in the United States. This visit completes the fourth in a series of technical exchanges of groups of nuclear specialists between the United States and Russia established under the overall U.S.-U.S.S.R. Scientific, Technical, Educational and Cultural Agreement.

The Soviet scientists will also visit the Yankee Atomic Power Plant, Rowe, Massachusetts; Argonne National Laboratory, Argonne, Illinois; Dresden Nuclear Power Station, Morris, Illinois; and Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

# **NEW MEN'S RESIDENCE COMPLETED**



On Friday, May 28, BNL's new Men's Residence on Upton Road was officially opened by S.M. Tucker (right), Assistant Director of Plant Engineering and Operations, presenting the "Official Key" to R.C. Anderson, Assistant Director of Scientific Personnel.

The building is another renovation completed by the Architectural and Engineering Personnel attached to the Plant Maintenance Office. It is composed of what were originally three separate "World War II" barracks located between Cavendish Lane and Johns Hopkins Street. In October, 1964, these buildings were moved to their present location in order to make way for the new Cafeteria and Lecture Hall and to provide better living conditions for our transcient personnel.

At their present location, the buildings were set on the site in the form of a "Z," using the corners of new construction to form the "utility cores" where all of the toilet and kitchen facilities could be installed with the minimum of cost.

The building consists of eighty-three individual bedrooms, with furniture specifically designed for the space. All rooms are tastefully decorated in various pastel colors, with lamps, drapes and pictures included – everything to make a "home away from home" more comfortable. Each room also has a television antenna receptacle, and the entire building is protected from fire by an automatic sprinkler system and manual alarms.

There are four kitchens and dining rooms so that each occupant may prepare his own "snacks." Each kitchen provides a unique system of individually locked refrigerator and dry food compartments. Dish cabinets, electric cooking units, and an ice cube maker are also provided.

To provide additional soundproofing and comfort for the occupants, the building has carpeting throughout its corridors, stairs and lobby. Exterior walls are insulated, and all interior walls and ceilings are soundproofed. A comfortable lobby is centrally located where a person may watch his favorite television program or play cards with friends.

Immediately adjacent to the rear of the building is a flagstone patio where, on a summer evening, occupants may sit in the cool shade and sip their favorite liquid refreshment, and really enjoy it! There are parking facilities at the rear of the building to provide for approximately seventy-five cars.





He was especially grateful that his eyes were protected since he had previously lost the vision of his right eye.
