"Sundays and Cybele" is a lyric tragedy, the delicate story of a magical relationship between a lonely girl of twelve and a war veteran suffering from amnesia. The lives of both are enriched and exalted by their Sunday meetings; even the amnesiac's mistress comes to understand their need for each other, until convention-bound townsfolk interfere to destroy both child and man.

Hardy Kruger plays the veteran, and extraordinarily-gifted Patricia Gozzi is the tender Cybele. The picture was photographed by Henri Decae who filmed such other French productions as "The 400 Blows," "The Cousins" and "The Lovers." The music was written by Maurice Jarre, himself an Academy Award winner for his "Lawrence of Arabia" soundtrack.

A graduate of France's famed Cinema Institute, Serge Bourguignon's first official recognition of his work as a master motion picture craftsman came in 1960 when his Cambodia short, "The Smile," won the Golden Palm Award at the Cannes Film Festival as Best Documentary Film. In 1962, "Sundays and Cybele," his first feature film, won the Hollywood Academy Award as Best Foreign Film of the Year, and numerous other national and international honors. ### **CLARKE WILLIAMS RECEIVES HONARY DEGREE**

At the 176th commencement exercises on June 13 at Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts, Dr. Clarke Williams, BNL's Deputy Director, received the honary degree of Doctor of Science.

The commencement address was delivered by Adlai E. Stevenson, head of the U.S. Delegation to the United Nations. Dr. John E. Sawyer, President of the College, made the award to Dr. Williams, whose citation reads as follows:

"Eminent physicist, nuclear engineer, teacher and exceptionally gifted science administrator, your work in nuclear science and technology has led to appointments as Chairman of the Nuclear Engineering Department and Deputy Director of Brookhaven National Laboratory and, more recently, to your election as President of the American Nuclear Society. Your contributions to the peacetime uses of nuclear energy, both in advanced technical concepts of reactor design and in international conferences, particularly the Third Geneva Conference in 1964, have been matched by services to your immediate community, including responsibility for the planning of a whole new campus. May your flair for scientific leadership, enthusiasm, and understanding of people long sustain your drive to make nuclear energy serve the human future."

Ann Scott Webster was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. She received her B.A. degree with a major in music from Newcomb College, Tulane University, and a Master of Music degree from Washington University, St. Louis.

She has appeared with the New Orleans Opera House Association, the New Orleans Philharmonic Symphony as soloist in performances of the Mozart Requiem, the St. Louis Symphony Pop Concerts, the Little Symphony, the Belleville Philharmonic Orchestra, and as guest singer on the Springfield, Illinois Community Concert Series. In St. Louis, she sang the roles of Zerbinetta in Strauss' **Ariadne auf Noxos**, Musetta in **La Boheme**, and the title role of Susannah in Carlysle Floyd's opera.

Mrs. Webster was a voice student of Leslie Chabay at Washington University as well as the Aspen Music School. For two seasons she was a Young Artist of Aspen, appearing in solo recital as well as giving numerous Opera Studio performances in the Aspen Music Festival. In 1959, she was winner of the Southern Regional Auditions for the Metropolitan Opera and was selected as one of the winners of the Metropolitan finals in New York.

In private life, she is the wife of BNL physicist Medford Webster and the mother of two daughters. In addition to continuing her voice training with Marinka Gurewich and members of the Metropolitan staff, Mrs. Webster has appeared with the Sayville Musical Workshop as Pitti-Sing in the **Mikado**, Anna in **The King and I**, and Lady Larkin in **Once Upon A Mattress**. She was also accompanist for the Sayville production of **West Side Story**. She has given two recitals for the benefit of the Sayville Workshop building fund and has made guest appearances for the benefit of Brookhaven Memorial Hospital. Most recently, she was soprano soloist for the Suffolk Symphony Orchestra's performance of the **Messiah**. Aside from her singing activities, Mrs. Webster teaches voice and piano for the Arthur Browne Music Store in Smithtown and at her home in Bayport.
