# FORTY-EIGHTH BROOKHAVEN LECTURE



By: Eugene P. Cronkite Medical Department Title: "Extracorporeal Irradiation of the Blood and Lymph in the Study of Normal and Leukemic Cell Proliferation"

### Lecture Hall — Wed., June 23 — 8:00 p.m.

"Steady state" cell proliferation throughout life is a characteristic of various mammalian organ systems. This general problem will be considered specifically by Dr. Cronkite in respect to the ubiquitous, migratory lymphocyte, a member of the white blood cell family. This cell is closely related to the development of immunity and types of leukėmia. Its migratory habit produces a ceaseless traffic of lymphocytes between blood and the lymphocytic organs. Thus the technique of extracorporeal irradiation of the blood or lymph permits the killing of the radiosensitive, migratory cells while in transit through the blood or lymph, disturbing the steady state equilibrium between production and death of the lymphocytes. The capability of this technique to deplete the body of lymphocytes, suppress the immune reactions of

chine, is the subject of Ermanno Olmi's first full-length film, "The Sound of Trumpets." It is a marvel of understated commentary, betraying Olmi's origins as a maker of documentaries only in its firm delineation of the exterior world.

We follow Domenico from his predawn awakening in a remote suburban apartment to his first encounter with the giant corporation that is to become his waking life. We see the vast impersonality of the unnamed corporation and its meaningless exams and psychotechnical tests. During one of the tests he meets another nervous applicant, the girl Antonietta, and hopes for their friendship flare immediately. At the moment the only job for Domenico is messenaer boy, but it is a vantage point from which he can observe all the petty politics, the rigid pecking-order, of his new world.

Thoughts of Antonietta rise once more at the staff dance on New Year's Eve, but she does not appear amid the tinny sound of trumpets, the clattery drums, that welcome in the future. And finally, the future shows itself in Olmi's vision of mechanized twentieth century futility.
