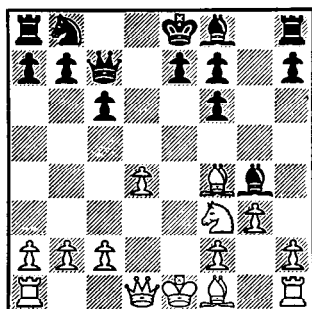
For President: LEN BAKER

BERA Film Series Double Feature

OUR MAN IN HAVANA

and

THE REST IS SILENCE

Our Man in Havana



Alec Guinness heads a brilliant cast in this spy comedy based on Graham Greene's novel. Director Carol Reed, who collaborated with Greene to make "The Fallen Idol" and "The Third Man," here satirizes the devious operations of secret agents. Selected by the British Secret Service to be their "man in Havana," vacuum-cleaner salesman Guinness is told he must set up a network of espionage. At a loss to know how, he benignly invents his sub-agents and sends false reports and a counterfeit set of secret plans to impress his boss (Noel Coward) and the London headquarters. The fun mounts as the web of deceit grows more intricate and finally leads to dramatic consequences and the candid admission of fraud.

"Guinness' performance is not altogether a spoof. There is a trace of wistfulness in it that suggests a shadow of pain. The fact that his salesman has to traffic with espionage in order to make enough money to send his daughter to school may be taken as a sad commentary on the pressures one must balance in this world. Called upon to run fools' errands, he treats his employers as fools. All of which is more contemplative and shrewd than most stuff you get in pictures these days. It makes us wish we'd get more collaborations from Messrs. Greene and Reed."

Men's Singles

Quarter-finalists thus far include J. Elmore, who has defeated R. Collins (6-1, 6-0) and Y.Y. Chu (6-2, 6-3); R. Stearns, who has defeated L. Pessel (6-1, 6-1) and S. Feldberg (6-3, 6-0); W. THE REST IS SILENCE



The versatile Helmut Kautner has used "Hamlet" as the inspiration for an intriguing contemporary Freudian drama set in Germany. The central plot and characters have been retained, although there has been some modernization in presentation. Some of the enjoyment lies in not only tracing the parallels to "Hamlet," but in speculating on Kautner's changes. Crime and retribution, for him as for Shakespeare, are only half the story.

In Kautner's film, John Claudius (Hardy Kruger) is "Hamlet" — an American-educated German who spent the war years here. He is teaching philosophy at Harvard when he is summoned home to Dusseldorf by his uncle, on problems of family business. Before going home, he is notified of his father's death and his mother's marriage to his uncle. In Germany, John is obsessed by the same suspicions that tortured Hamlet. A number of familiar events occur: an eavesdropper is accidentally killed; the hero receives mysterious phone calls from what he believes to be his father's ghost; a ballet depicting a murder of passion is put on to catch the conscience of the uncle. But John Claudius, unlike Hamlet, does not die. He avenges his father's death and remains, friendless and alone, in a country he cannot think of as his own.

FIRST BNL GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP!

An elimination-type match play tournament will start the week of August 15, with survivors playing second and third rounds during each of the two following weeks. Contestants will be divided into flights and will play (full handicap difference) against opponents of similar skill.

There will be one prize winner in each flight, with the individual flight winners competing against each other (80% of handicap) in a medal play **scheduled** playoff for the 1965 BNL Championship.

No entry fee will be charged, but a completed entry application **must** be in the hands of the Tournament Chairman by August 9. All members who have established BGA handicaps (by submitting scores for 72 holes or more) are eligible. Members who do not yet have handicaps still may have time to play and submit the remaining number of scores to bring their total to 72 holes. If in doubt, check with the Handicap Chairman, Frank Walsh.

Pairings for the first round will be posted in the Recreation Office and at the Middle Island Pro Shop by August 11. You then arrange a mutually convenient date* with your opponent (8/15 through 8/21). You play any two of the three Middle Island nine hole courses, utilizing the difference in handicaps taken on the holes indicated on the score card. The one who wins the greatest number of holes goes on to the second round the next week.
