JOAN OF THE ANGELS?



Thurs., Aug. 19 — Lecture Hall — 8:30 p.m.

Winner of the Special Jury Prize at the 1961 Cannes Film Festival, "Joan of the Angels?" is a remarkable film of particular fascination to the eye. It is based on the famous trial of Father Urbain Grandier, who was burned at the stake in Loudun, France in the seventeenth century, an event which also served as the source for Aldous Huxley's "The Devils of Loudun." The Mother Superior of a convent of Ursuline nuns is reportedly possessed by eight satanic demons. The local parish priest has been burned at the stake for fathering her two children, four other priests have failed to exorcise the spirits, and the other convent nuns have followed their Superior's example by allowing minor demons to enter their own bodies and souls. Father Josef Suryn, a devout and humble priest, then attempts to restore Mother Joan to her former saintliness, but he too fails. Gradually, he finds that her physical needs are becoming his own, and he is emotionally drawn to the tormented woman. In a desperate attempt to save her, he slays two innocent stable grooms. ORCHESTRA CONCERT — PICASSO EXHIBIT

A summer concert performed by the thirty-two piece Orchestra da Camera, with Arthur Weisberg conducting and Matthew Raimondo as soloist, will be presented by BERA with the support of the New York Council on the Arts at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, August 27 in the BNL Theater.

The Orchestra da Camera, now in residence at Hofstra University, is a unique virtuoso ensemble which includes musicians who played for many years in the famed NBC Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Arturo Toscanini. In the roster are concertmasters of several top orchestras and well-known string quartets; young, but exceptionally talented musicians are also represented in the group. The Orchestra plays well together, thanks to a spirit of camaraderie within its ranks that has been brought about by the practice of keeping the ensemble intact season after season. Delicate chamber music and classical symphonies are performed with equal dexterity and artistry.

Conductor Arthur Weisberg is the permanent conductor of the Contemporary Chamber Ensemble, the only touring orchestra devoted to performing masterpieces of the twentieth century and important new works. Mr. Weisberg conducts in New York, Washington, and nine other major U.S. cities. He is also Music Director of the Committee for International Composers Concerts, a group devoted to furthering international good-will through cultural exchange of composers. He is on the faculty of the Juilliard School of Music, where he conducts the orchestra and teaches Orchestral Repertoire.

Soloist Matthew Raimondo is a graduate of Juilliard, where he studied with Ivan Galamian, and holds a Master of Arts degree in musicology from Columbia University. He was a member of the New Music Quartet and has for the past three years served as an Associate of the Music Department at Princeton University. He has given many first performances of new works for violins, some of them in Europe last summer. New York audiences heard him last season as a soloist on the New School's Artist's Choice Series. Mr. Raimondo's solo and chamber recordings include those of the American Series for Columbia Records, Time Records and Composer's Recordings, Inc.

BERA is also pleased to announce an exhibit of original drawings by Picasso, Cezanne and Renoir to be shown in conjunction with the concert. This collection, lent by the Hofstra University Institute of the Arts, will be on view in the Brookhaven Center before and after the concert.

Admission to the concert and art exhibition is \$2.00 for Laboratory employees and guests. Admission for students and children under eighteen years of age is \$1.00. Tickets are now on sale at the Recreation Office, 3 Center Street, and at the Personnel Office, 58 Brookhaven Avenue.

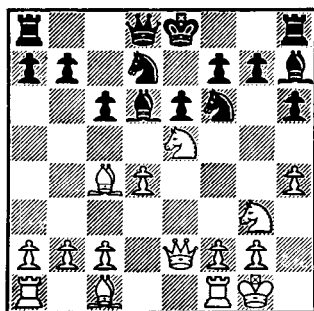

(A film by Carson Davidson, who made "Third Avenue El." Music by Gerry Mulligan. With Bob Larkin and Dian Robertson. 1964 Academy Award nominee.)

A man sits in a bathtub on a pier at the Hudson River, with a background of the New York skyline. He is typing underwater. The fact that the words go literally down the drain may mean something special to some people. The happy filmmaker refuses to comment. This, despite the torrent of symbolic interpretations enthusiastically offered for all the crazy happenings in his film. Creator and film announce open season for all who wish to dig for symbols or rationalize the absurd. But your best bet is just to let the laughs come.
