NEW SUPERCONDUCTIVITY MAGNET DEVELOPED AT BNL

In the wondrous world of cryogenics – the study of the supercold – liquid helium defies gravity and creeps up the sides of a test tube; and some metals, such as niobium-tin alloy, lose all resistance to electricity. This alloy, when cooled to the temperature of liquid helium, minus 457 degrees F., acts as a superconductor and can be used to build a pint-sized magnet requiring virtually no electricity to operate yet packing the punch of a room-sized magnet requiring millions of watts.

Studying along these lines, BNL scientists have developed a superconducting quadrupole magnetic lens which could be used to focus a beam of charged nuclear particles. Although superconducting magnets are not new, this is the first time a quadrupole magnetic lens has been designed, constructed, and tested successfully. This achievement has shown that superconducting magnetic lenses not much larger than the one pictured above and further refined and developed, could conceivably replace the conventional iron quadrupoles now used for high-energy physics experiments.

When a positive particle strikes a target in the ring of the AGS, the impact produces a splatter of nuclear fragments which must be focused and directed to the research project. This focusing is presently accomplished by iron quadrupole magnetic lenses which act on a beam of particles much the way a ground glass lens acts on a beam of light. The iron focusing magnets now in use measure up to three feet high, three feet wide by six feet long, and weigh up to fifteen tons; they require up to 150 kilowatts to operate.

The new lens is a product of the new High-Field Superconductivity Working Group whose studies range from the fundamental properties of superconductivity through to the actual design and construction of practical devices. The superconducting quadrupole lens was designed and constructed by William P. Sampson and Richard B. Britton of BNL with P.G. Kruger of the University of Illinois as consultant.

AUI GROUP INSURANCES REVISED

Effective today, several changes are being instituted in the AUI Group Medical and Long Term Disability Insurance plans. The announcement of the changes by Dr. M. Goldhaber, Director of the Laboratory, and a detailed explanation of the expanded benefits were mailed to the homes of all regular employees on August 26. Reproduced here for your information is the announcement. The detailed explanation appears on page 3.

BROOKHAVEN NATIONAL LABORATORY

MEMORANDUM

August 26, 1965

TO ALL REGULAR EMPLOYEES:

In accordance with the Laboratory's policy of providing its employees and their families with group insurance coverage that is equal to or better than that offered by similar institutions, I am pleased to announce that effective September 1st, 1965 we are again broadening the protection that these policies offer to you and to your families.

In general, the changes will be as follows:

Medical Insurance:

A new diagnostic X-ray and laboratory test benefit.

An increase in hospital services and supplies from \$280 to \$420.

An extension in the length of the major medical benefit period and in the maximum total payment from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

Long Term Disability Insurance:

An extension from the present \$500 maximum benefit per month to a new \$1,500 per month maximum benefit.

As you know, the Laboratory's policy is to pay the difference between the total cost of these insurances and the amount paid through employee premiums. The Laboratory will continue to pay the major portion of the total cost of the group insurances. Although it will be necessary to make a slight increase in the cost to employees for the Group Medical Insurance at this time, a reduction in the premium rate charged to employees participating in the Long Term Disability Insurance will offset much of this increase for employees who have both these insurances. It is this sharing of the cost between the Laboratory and the employees that enables us to provide such extensive coverage.

Enclosed is a detailed explanation of the expanded benefits that has been prepared for you by the Personnel Manager.

AUI GROUP MEDICAL AND LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE CHANGES

I. DIAGNOSTIC X-RAY AND LABORATORY TEST BENEFIT

If an insured employee or dependent undergoes diagnostic laboratory tests or x-ray examinations on or after the effective date, he will be reimbursed for expenses incurred for such tests up to a maximum of \$50 for each accident, and a maximum of \$50 for all illnesses within any 12 consecutive months. Each insured family member will have separate maximums.

Limitations: No diagnostic x-ray or laboratory test payments will be made for expenses incurred for:

- 1. or in connection with, pregnancy, childbirth or miscarriage;
- or in connection with, an eye or ear examination or for an examination of the teeth or periodontium unless the examination is made for diagnosis of an injury received as a result of an accident;
- which you or your dependents receive payment or are entitled to receive payment under the Hospital Expense Benefits.

Additional limitations applicable to laboratory and x-ray examination benefits are set forth in the general limitations under the Group Medical Insurance policy.

II. INCREASE IN THE MAXIMUM ALLOWANCE FOR HOSPITAL SERVICES AND SUPPLIES

For hospital confinements starting on or after effective date, when confinement is due to any reason other than normal pregnancy, the maximum payment for hospital charges for necessary services and supplies (hospital extras) will be increased from \$280 to \$420.

III. EXTENSION IN THE LENGTH OF THE MAJOR MEDICAL BENEFIT PERIOD

The maximum benefit period will be extended to two years of reimbursement at the rate of 80% and a third year of reimbursement at the rate of 50%.

IV. INCREASE IN THE MAXIMUM MAJOR MEDICAL PAYMENT

The maximum dollar payment for each benefit period will be increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

The changes in the Major Medical benefits in both III and IV above will apply to claims on which the first expense is incurred on or after the effective date.

V. DECREASE IN THE EMPLOYEE PREMIUM FOR THE LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE

The premium will be reduced from one-half of one per cent to one-third of one per cent of covered base weekly or monthly salary.

For salaries over \$1,600 a month, the premium rate for the Long Term Disability Insurance will be one-third of one per cent of base monthly salary up to a maximum premium of \$9.99.

VI. EXTENSION OF THE LONG TERM DIS-ABILITY MONTHLY MAXIMUM BENEFIT PAYMENTS

The monthly disability income payments of 50% of base monthly salary will be increased from a maximum of \$500 a month to \$1,500 a month. This change will apply to future claims when the first day of disability begins on or after the effective date.

Because of the increased costs of these extended benefits it will be necessary to make a slight increase in the cost to employees for the Group Medical Insurance amounting to 3¢ a week for the individual plan and 24¢ a week for the family plan. The monthly rate will be increased 13¢ for the individual plan and \$1.04 for the family plan. The premium for the employee and one family member plan will not be increased. The reduction in the employee premium rate for the Long Term Disability Insurance (V above) will offset much of this increase for those employees who have both insurances. The Laboratory will continue to pay the major portion of the total cost of the group insurances.

To illustrate the net change of the adjustments in contributions, examples are shown on the left.
