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HIGH FLUX BEAM REACTOR CRITICAL

At 8:34 p.m. last Sunday evening, BNL scientists, engineers and technicians brought the High Flux Beam Reactor to its first self-sustaining nuclear chain reaction. With the HFBR in action, researchers have at their disposal a source for one of the highest concentrations of neutrons ever produced in a research reactor. The term "flux" refers to the number of neutrons passing through one square centimeter of space in one second.

The HFBR's maximum flux at the core of more than a quadrillion neutrons, will provide scientists with one of the most powerful tools available for study in the fields of solid-state and low-energy physics, metallurgy and nuclear chemistry. Among the experiments planned for the first operating period are studies on the structure of liquids and solids; neutron bombardments of magnetic materials; and the measurement of neutron cross sections. (A neutron cross section is the measure of probability that a nuclear reaction will occur – it is the apparent area presented by a target nucleus to an onrushing particle.)

TENSION MOUNTS as the assembled personnel watch the indicators, which show the regulating rods being withdrawn. When the rods are in the proper position, the reactor's fuel cells begin a self-sustaining chain reaction and the reactor goes critical. Heavy Water Moderated

The reactor, designed to operate at 40 megawatts, is cooled and moderated by heavy water and contains a heavy water reflector. It is fueled with fully enriched uranium alloyed with aluminum and silicon and clad with wrought magnesium-silicon aluminum alloy. The core consists of 28 curved-plate fuel elements housed in the lower, spherical portion of the reactor vessel. Cool heavy water, pumped into the upper cylindrical part of the vessel, flows down between the fuel element plates, and is discharged into the bottom of the vessel. The water then flows upward outside the core and leaves from an outlet pipe at the upper part of the vessel, to dissipate its heat through exchangers before recirculation through the core.

16 Control Rods

The reactor is controlled by 16 neutron-absorbing rods, which are located

outside the core instead of penetrating the core as in other reactors. They are divided into two sets, with eight main rods operating above the core and eight auxiliary rods below the core mid-plane. The principal neutron-absorbing material in the rods is europium oxide.

Outside the core vessel is a watercooled thermal shield. This secondary vessel provides emergency containment to keep the core covered with heavy water in the event of a leak in the primary vessel.

The entire reactor system is housed in a hemispherical building with an inside diameter of 176 feet. The building shell is constructed of welded steel plates. While the reactor is in operation the air inside the building is maintained at a slight negative pressure to insure that any air leakage is inward rather than outward. Access to the building is provided by an air lock system.

Began in 1956

The first work on the HFBR began in 1956 with physics calculations by Brookhaven scientists to determine the reactor system which would best meet the Laboratory's research needs. A project group was established in 1958 to work out the preliminary engineering design. The Lummus Company was selected in early 1960 to provide architect-engineering services, with assistance from Combustion Engineering, Inc., on nuclear engineering matters.

A site report was prepared and submitted to the AEC in August, 1960. Detailed design work was started following approval of the site report by the AEC and AEC's Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards. Construction work, started in the fall of 1961, was carried out by the AEC's Brookhaven Office.
