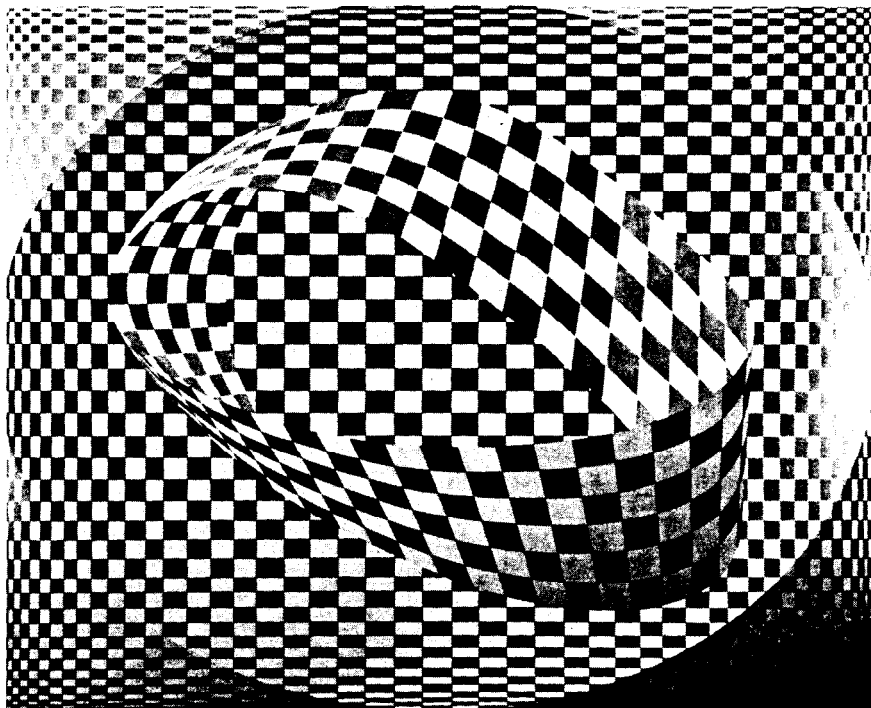
FUN AND GAMES AND STUFF WITH A MOEBIUS STRIP

The Moebius strip (pronounced mee-bus) is a very interesting topological curiosity; hard to imagine, but easy to construct. Its major property is that it is a loop with no "other side" – it has one side and one edge.

To make your very own Moebius strip and play the same games as Augustus Ferdinand Moebius, the German mathematician and astronomer who introduced it, cut a strip of paper about 18 inches long, give the strip a half twist, fasten the two ends together, and you have it.

The loop has only one side despite the looks of it. Take a pencil and draw a line the long way along the strip and you find that you return to your starting point. Cut along this line and you get, not two strips as expected, but a two-sided strip. A cut made a third of the way in from the edge produces a fresh surprise; the scissors make two complete trips around the strip, but only one continuous cut. The result of this cut is two intertwined strips: one, a two-sided hoop; the other, a fresh Moebius strip. If you're still unconvinced that a Moebius strip has one side and one edge – try coloring the "inside" of the strip one color and the "outside" another.

'COLOR-MOTION' KEYS ART EXHIBIT

For its Seventh Annual Art Exhibit, the BERA Art Committee has chosen to explore the field of op-art, especially the realm of color-motion.

Op-art, short for optical art, is the use of color and shape to create an optical illusion in the eye of the viewer. As Bruno Palmer-Proner, Director of the East Hampton Gallery in New York City, put it: "Op-art is a revolutionary form of painting because it lets the viewer do the work. Therefore, it behooves a person to stare at the painting for a full minute. One might say that the eye is teased, or deceived, by the artist into creating the effect of the work."

In discussing color-motion, Mr. Palmer-Proner said: "Color-motion reaches beyond the original experiments of the op-art group . . . (its) specializing interest is the color effects which give impressions of motion." Mr. Palmer-Proner went on to say that the mathematical direction of color-motion effects, its solid geometric forms, its logarithmic relations, and its mathematical concepts such as the Moebius strip, reflect the social implications of the age of relativity, of computers, of jet and space travel, and of automation.

The BERA Art Exhibit, showing some twenty-seven works by fourteen artists from the East Hampton Gallery, opens on Tuesday, November 16, at 8 p.m. in the Exhibit Hall. It will be open on weekdays, November 17, 18, 19, and 22, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and evenings on November 18 and 19, from 7:30.

On November 16 the first day of the exhibit, the members of the BERA Art Committee will play host to Mr. Palmer-Proner and several of the exhibiting artists at a 6 p.m., cocktails-and-buffet at Brookhaven Center. WHY SUMMER AND SMOKE?

What is Summer and Smoke all about? Simple; what could be more straightforward than two characters involved in the body versus spirit theme. This subject has been treated before. True, never by Tennessee Williams, but it is not new. So what makes this play so special? First a word about Williams may be in order here.

Tennessee Williams has been writing plays since 1947. Although recognized as one of America's foremost contemporary dramatists, he is also one of the most controversial. He has been praised for the simple beauty, spontaneity and sensitivity of his writing and damned just as vigorously for his preoccupation with sex and violence. "Summer and Smoke" finds Williams at a unique moment in his career. Written in the period between "The Glass Menagerie," and "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," "Summer and Smoke" represents a literary marriage between "Menagerie's" spiritual qualities with the lusty earthiness of "Cat." The more I thought about my personal fascination with this play, the more I was forced to conclude that this is Williams at his dramatic peak. He has probed deeply into the very souls of mere human beings groping for that elusive quality - truth.

Alma Winemiller, the frustrated daughter of the local minister, conceals her fear of men behind literary affectations. John Buchanan, her neighbor, is the local rake. The two are, as archetypes of good and evil, destined to experience a fatal attraction. They pass so close to each other, never really communicate and yet provoke irreparable change in each other.

At the final tragic irony, we can no longer remove ourselves from the personal tragedy of Alma and John. We must be shaken to our roots. Reality has triumphed. Evil has won a victory of sorts. We must share the terror of the conclusion for it is real. Alma and John are you and I.

Summer and Smoke had to be created on the stage, for the secret of its greatness is that Williams has accomplished the impossible. By creating real people on the stage, he has managed to drive home such abstract concepts as good versus evil, illusion versus reality. These characters are not symbolic characters; everyone knows someone like Alma, someone like John. We are left with Williams' startling realization that reality, the body with all its faults, and perhaps even evil itself are part of what all men seek and must acknowledge. They are intrinsic parts of the truth.
