SUPPLY AND MATERIEL READIES "EQUIPMENT CLEANUP WEEK"

Supply and Materiel is sponsoring a "Capital Equipment House-cleaning Week" designed to weed out obsolete mechanical and electronic equipment, and to cut down on the individual departments' accountability. GOLDHABER NAMED ADJUNCT PROFESSOR AT STONY BROOK

GLENNAN, AUI, URGES NEW TEACHING METHODS

T. Keith Glennan, new AUI President and for 18 years President of Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland, called for a breakthrough in methods to increase the effectiveness of the educational process.

Writing in the November 20th issue of THE SATURDAY REVIEW, Dr. Glennan mentioned three aspects of the contemporary educational processes that he termed problem areas. He listed, "Motivation, the reinforcing of the drive to learn;" he said that "we have not learned to recognize and develop creativity"; and he expressed concern over "the slow rate of progress made in developing new and better methods of teaching."

FOR STAR GAZERS

Laboratory astronomers might be interested in knowing that the library has acquired a 16" transparent celestial globe.

It is described in the brochure thusly: "This transparent star globe can be set to show star, sun and planet positions at any time and any place to demonstrate basic earth-space relationships. 200-BEV EVALUATION TEAM STUDIES LAB'S SUITABILITY

Yesterday a four-man, AEC-sponsored evaluation committee spent the day at the Lab to study the suitability of the Laboratory site as the location for the planned 200-BeV particle accelerator.

In the morning, the team was conducted on helicopter and automobile tours of the site and inspected some of the existing high-energy physics facilities. The afternoon was devoted to meetings and discussion.

Last June, in response to a general invitation issued by the AEC, Associated Universities, Inc. proposed BNL as a suitable location for the new accelerator. From the original proposals, 85 were selected for further study. AEC fact-finding teams are making visits in connection with each of these proposals. Reports of the visits will be given to the National Academy of Sciences, which is evaluating the proposals for the AEC.

The team here yesterday was headed by Howard Brown, AEC Assistant General Manager for Administration. Other members were: Dr. William A. Wallenmeyer of the AEC's Division of Research; Dr. Thomas Fields, Director of the High-Energy Physics Division, Argonne National Laboratory; and Philip J. Picario of the AEC's Division of Construction.
