'Dynamic Structure of Liquids'

To what degree are the atoms in a liquid held in some kind of an arrangement, and what causes this arrangement or structure? How does the structure enter into melting and crystallization? Dr. Arthur Paskin, Nuclear Engineering, will explore these questions in Brookhaven Lecture Series No. 59.

Dr. Paskin will describe some of his computer experiments in liquid metal structure studies, which give more insight into the answers for these questions.

Those attending will have the opportunity to view an unusual movie — a stereoscopic film, to be viewed through special glasses, showing the three-dimensional movement of molecules in a liquid.

Dr. Paskin joined the Lab in 1963, working most recently in the fields of superconductivity and liquid metals. As an outgrowth of this interest in superconductivity, he now heads a cooperative effort in superconductivity which covers the range from basic research through to high-field magnet development. In the field of liquids, he has recently become coeditor of the international journal: *Physics and Chemistry of Liquids*.

ORNL's New Isotope Reactor Hits 100 Mw, Its Design Power

Oak Ridge's High-Flux Isotope Reactor reached design power of 100 megawatts producing a neutron flux of 5×10^{15} neutrons per square centimeter per second.

This production reactor was designed to create significant quantities man-made transuranium elements — californium, berkelium, einsteinium, and fermium.

BNL's HFBR, a research reactor, has a neutron flux of 1.6×10^{15} and hits design power at 40 megawatts.

AGS Money Bill Has Long Road

Last week, a bill containing almost \$47 million for BNL, was approved by the House Appropriations Committee and sent to the floor for a vote. Most of the money is earmarked for the program to raise the operating potential of the AGS.

Despite the optimistic tone taken by the local press, this move by the House Committee is only one of several steps to be taken before the AGS gets the money. Next comes a vote by the full House, not considered a real obstacle since the House traditionally votes for bills recommended by this committee. Then comes the Senate which may or may not accept the House-passed version. If the Senate does not approve the bill, it will be referred to a joint committee where a compromise will be hammered out.

Once the Appropriations Bill is passed by both Houses, it goes to the President for signature; he then may direct the Bureau of the Budget to release all, part, or none of the \$47 million, depending on his economic plans.

An informed guess as to when the Bureau of the Budget will act on the appropriation is November 1.

AEC, Contractors Provided 1000 Jobs In Youth Program

Figures released by the AEC say that more than 1000 young people were employed by the Commission and its contractors this summer under the Administration's Youth Opportunity Campaign.

Here at BNL, 20 were employed in this program to find jobs for students who needed money to return to school in the fall. These 20 were in addition to the 161 students and graduate students here for summer employment and research in the scientific disciplines, and the normal summer temporary additions which totaled 105 this year.

The Youth Opportunity Campaign aimed at providing a million summer jobs for young people 16 to 21 with a preference to those who were economically disadvantaged.

Firemen Stage A 'Happening'



Some weeks ago a TV special showed a "happening" wherein a machine covered an area the size of a football field waist deep with detergent suds, while hordes of the faithful frolicked through the foam like so many sea sprites.

Last Friday, BNL's Fire Chief Tom Newham gave a demonstration of what the foam machine was designed for — putting out fires. A flow of detergent suds extinguishes the blaze. The shack in the top picture was

doused with fuel oil and set ablaze; the foam expanding at a rate of 1000 to one snuffed out the fire in 23 seconds. The foam generator, to the right of the picture, delivers foam at a rate of 3000 cubic feet per minute. The machine's selling point is that water damage is inconsequential; the stuff just dissipates like suds.

The Safety Office is studying the possibility of fixed extinguishing systems using the high-expansion foam.
