BERA Concert Review

Some nice results were heard from the combinations of East with West and old with new at the opening concert of the Brookhaven Concert Series on October 11. Tokyo-born cellist Tsuyoshi Tsutsumi gave a recital of Valentini, Beethoven, Schubert, and two modern pieces from the United States and Japan with the accompaniment of Stephen Swedish at the piano.

Mr. Tsutsumi sounded immediately at ease in the opening piece, the Valentini Sonata No. 10, which he played effortlessly. The trills and arpeggios were cleanly executed and the work was done with flare. The fine Beethoven Sonata No. 3 which followed made one wish for a better pianist to match the cellist's skill. Mr. Swedish had his hands full playing all of the notes and therefore could listen little to the cello and match his playing to it. The two contemporary pieces, Ushioi-uta, a Japanese folk-tune, and Siena by Heiden, followed the intermission and the program was rounded out by the pleasing Schubert "Per Arpeggione" Sonata.

Mr. Tsutsumi's playing was always pleasing and always in keeping with the style of the music. The artist is not a relentless technician; he makes a few mistakes as nearly all musicians do. But his playing is sonorous, clean, and beautifully phrased, and the artist makes skillful use of the different registers of his instrument. In summary, his playing was a genuine treat.

The Festival Winds will give the next concert on Thursday, Nov. 3.

Seaborg Calls Chemistry Building 'A Symbol of Accomplishment'



An audience that filled the Theatre's 980 seats and spilled out into the aisles and the lobby last Friday heard AEC Chairman Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg dedicate the new Chemistry Building, calling it "a symbol of accomplishment, a recognition of all the excellent chemical research that has been done here at Brookhaven since the Chemistry Department first got started in 1947."

Sharing the platform with Keynote Speaker Seaborg were AEC Commissioner Dr. Gerald Tape; Lab Director Dr. Maurice Goldhaber; Dr. Richard Dodson, Chairman of the Chemistry Department; Dr. Jacob Bigeleisen, Chairman of the Chemistry Department's Building Committee; and Mr. Emery L. Van Horn, Manager of the Brookhaven AEC Office.

In his speech, Dr. Seaborg outlined the work done by the Chemistry Department since 1947, touching on some of the major accomplishments and commenting on the diversity of the research projects. He called modern chemistry "protean" - capable of taking many different roles, and said that "chemistry can serve,

Another BNL Mixed Doubles Bowling Tournament is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 19, at the Port Jeff Bowl. All new bowlers are welcome. You don't have to be a league bowler to enter the tournament. Hurry with your entries; only 64 teams can be accommodated. Here are the rules:

Applications for the mixed doubles tournament must be in by 3 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 11. Only 64 teams can be accommodated.

A team shall consist of two bowlers, one male and one female. At least one member of the team must be a BNL employee (per BERA definition).

The tournament shall consist of three games per bowler, bowled across six lanes.

Handicap (per bowler per game) shall be arrived at by using the standard BNL bowling rule which is 80% of the difference between the bowler's average and 200.

1. Bowlers in BNL leagues this season use BNL average as of 10/21/66. Bowlers must have bowled at least twelve games to use this average.

2. Bowlers not in BNL leagues this season, but who bowl in other leagues this season, use highest current sanctioned average as of 10/21/66. Bowlers must have bowled at least twelve games to use this average.

3. If no current average is available, bowlers in sanctioned leagues last winter season use final average. 1966 final sanctioned summer league average will be accepted if none of the above apply. Bowlers must have bowled at least 12 games to use these averages.

4. All others use score of first

game for first game average; use scores of first two games divided by 2 for second game average; use scores of first games divided by 3 for third game average.

5. Maximum handicap allowed per game for men is 70 pins; there is no maximum handicap for ladies.

Prizes will be based on scores plus handicaps, and awards will be given to 1st, 2nd and 3rd place teams plus ladies' and men's individual high gross game. Awards will consist of baskets and bottles of cheer.

The above prizes are guaranteed for the minimum number of tournament entries (30). Additional prizes will be awarded based on the number of entries in excess of 30, e.g., fourth and fifth place teams, second place ladies' and men's individual games. No ABC or WIBC prizes!

Team entry fee, including cost of bowling is \$5.30. Entry blank and fee must be presented at the Recreation Office not later than 3 p.m. on Friday November 11. No entries will be accepted after the first 64 have been received. The fee is non-refundable; only in the event that the minimum number of entries is not reached will the fee be refunded and the tournament called off. Teams not present and ready to bowl at the start of the tournament will forfeit the team fee.

The rules of the American Bowling Congress are adopted for this tournament except as otherwise stated herein.

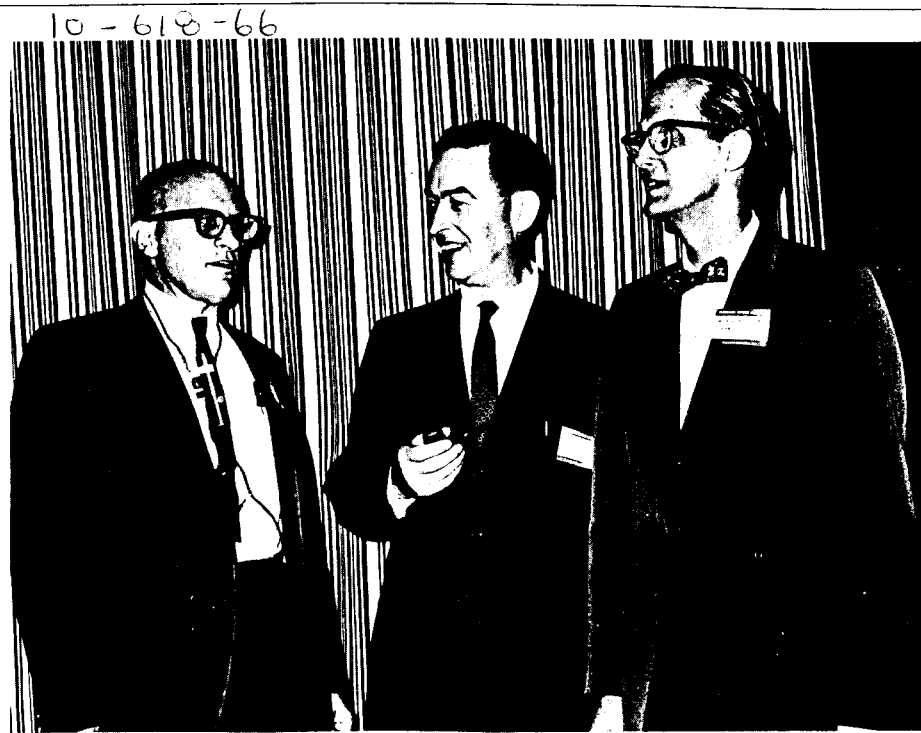

in a way, as a common meeting ground for nearly all the other sciences."

"There have been a great many changes in the science and scope of chemistry in our own lifetimes, changes that perhaps have not been fully recognized or understood, either by the general public, or sometimes by scientists in other areas, or even by all chemists themselves.

"Chemists of today are successfully probing the enormous complexities of living matter. They are speculating on the way that life may have first originated here on earth, and even on its possible existence elsewhere in the universe.

"Our world of contemporary abundance is filled with objects newly constructed of the chemist's atoms and molecules - medicine, vitamins, and synthetic substances in great profusion. Chemists are struggling with urgent problems of conservation and purification of water, air, minerals, and our other natural resources.

"They are helping to solve the problems of food production and preservation that will be ever more urgent in the years to come. In just a few years, chemists will be carrying out detailed analyses of samples from the surface of the moon, to get new clues on the origin of the solar system. Chemists have truly moved out of the laboratory into the universe."

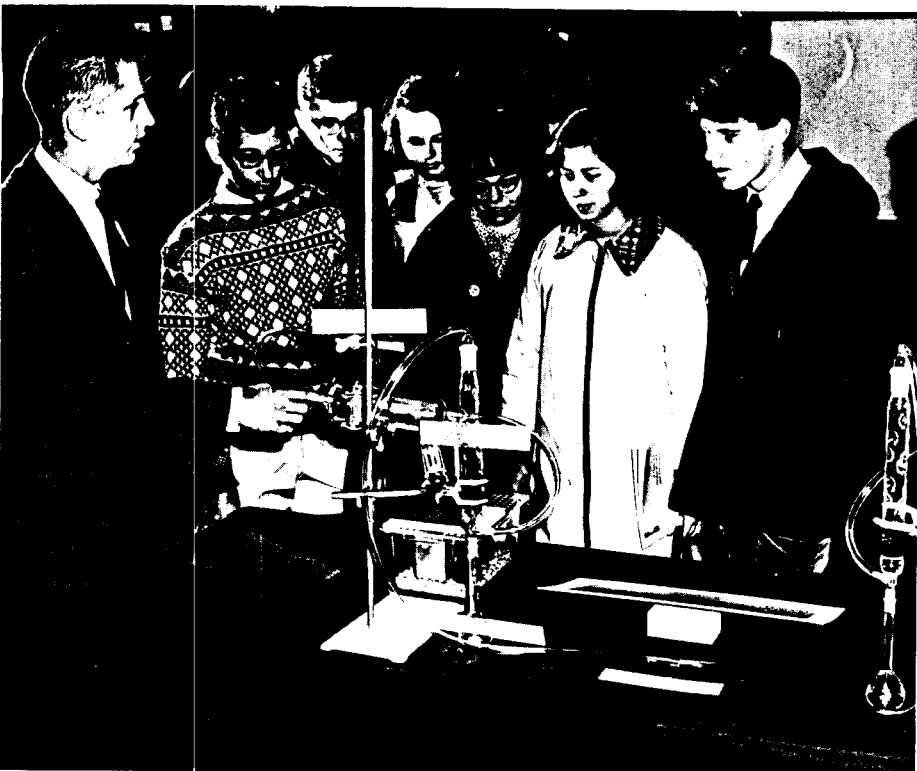
