Hotel Paradiso

Rehearsing a farce is in some ways like explaining a complicated joke to someone with no sense of humor. By the time it is analyzed, you begin to wonder why it ever seemed funny in the first place. But with a really good farce, this doesn't happen. For in the cause of perfecting the more obviously funny situations, quite unexpected ones suddenly appear.

So it has been with "Hotel Paradiso." One's first reaction is that the plot seems outrageously corny, the characters unbelievably overdrawn, and the situation downright predictable. In fact, you would think anyone could dash off an equally good farce in a week.

But in the hands of experts, like Georges Feydeau and Maurice Desvallieres, these simple ingredients are whipped together into a dizzy confection. Each hilarious twist of the plot and each hysterical speech is carefully placed to form an essential part of the final wildly comical pattern.

It is evident that the authors succeeded. "Hotel Paradiso" has enjoyed continuing success and high critical acclaim on both sides of the Atlantic, as a musical, as a film, and most of all as the original farce we are presenting. The skillful work of these authors has been our reward and pleasure as we have been rehearsing. We hope it will be yours also, as you watch the BERA Theatre Group production on November 12, 13, 18, 19. —R. Peierls, Director

The Festival Winds

The Festival Winds are a unique combination of some of the finest woodwind players in New York City today. For many years, the basic ensemble used in the Festival Winds, including John Solum, flute, Melvin Kaplan, oboe, Morris Newman, bassoon, Charles Russo, clarinet, and Ralph Froelich, French horn, performed as the New Art Wind Quintet. From 1947 to 1957, this group performed throughout the United States, giving lectures, performances, and master classes.

Towards the end of this period, the group felt that limiting its repertoire to only woodwind quintet combinations was too restricting and so altered its format to include all the great masterworks of the woodwind repertoire. The Festival Winds was thus formed in 1958 with these same basic members to perform concerts with piano, harpsichord, and in various woodwind combinations of from three to eleven members.

The group has been honored by being asked to perform for the past six seasons at the Library of Congress, where it was greeted with great enthusiasm. Other performances have been given at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Currier Gallery in New Hampshire, the Free Concert Series in Chicago, the Washing-

ton Square Chamber Music Series in New York, and Dumbarton Oaks in Washington. The Festival Winds group has also been enthusiastically received at previous performances at Brookhaven. The program to be presented at Brookhaven this season will include:

Divertimento in E flat major, K. 289, Mozart; Sonata for two bassoons, Boismortier; Partita in F major, H II:15, Haydn; Sonata for two French horns, K. 496a, Mozart; two arias for two oboes, two horns, and two bassoons, Handel; Divertimento in F major, K. 253, Mozart.

Season tickets: adults, \$10; children (under 18 years old), \$5. Single admissions: adults, \$3; children, \$1.50; non-employee guests, \$3.50. Refreshments will be served at the Center following the concert.

Indian Classical Music

A program of Indian classical music will be presented on November 6 at 8 p.m. at SUNY in Stony Brook in the gymnasium.

Ali Akbar Khan will play the sarode, an instrument resembling a 25-string banjo. Mrs. Rajdulari Khan will play a tamboura, a long-necked background instrument, and Mahapurush Misra will play the tabla — a pair of small drums.

Dr. Rau Appointed Physics Chairman

Dr. R. Ronald Rau has been appointed Chairman of the Physics Department. He succeeds Dr. George Vineyard, who has retained the Chairmanship pro tempore since his appointment as Associate Director of the Laboratory last August. 6-597-66

A member of the Physics Department since 1956, Dr. Rau has been working in the development, construction and use of bubble chambers. In 1964, following a year as BNL representative at CERN — the European center for high energy physics research in Switzerland — he was appointed the Physics Department's Deputy Chairman for high energy physics.

Prior to coming to BNL, Dr. Rau was Assistant Professor of Physics at Princeton University. He spent a year at France's famous Ecole Polytechnique as a Fulbright Professor of Physics in 1954.

Rifle Club Wins Two
