Holiday Schedules

The Laboratory will observe Monday and Tuesday, December 26 and 27, as Christmas holidays. In addition, the last four hours of scheduled work on Friday, December 23, will be observed as a pre-Christmas half-holiday.

The New Year holiday, the first in the 1967 schedule, will be observed on Monday, January 2.

Payroll

Due to the limited number of work days for computation and delivery of pay checks, the following schedule must be adhered to for the submission of time cards and monthly leave reports: time cards for the week ending December 25 must be received in Payroll no later than 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, December 28. All monthly leave reports must be received in Payroll no later than 10 a.m. Friday, December 23.

All pay checks will be distributed on Friday, December 30.

Cafeteria and Center

The Brookhaven Center will be closed Friday through Monday, December 23 through 26, and will reopen at 5 p.m. on Tuesday, December 27. The Center will also close after lunch on Friday, December 30, and reopen for dinner on Monday, January 2.

The Cafeteria will close at 2 p.m. on Friday, December 23, and reopen on Wednesday, December 28. It will also be closed on Monday, January 2.

The Snack Bar will be open from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on December 26, 27, 31, and January 1 and 2. Only the vending machine service in the East Room will be available on December 24 and 25.

Recreation Facilities

The Recreation Building, swimming pool, and gymnasium will remain open on their normal schedules throughout the month of December, with the following exceptions: the Recreation Building closed from December 26 through 29 and on January 1 and the swimming pool closed on December 23 and 27.

The Peoples National Bank branch will be closed on December 26 and January 2. On December 23, banking hours are from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Vacation Policy Extended For 20-Year Employees

Early next year Brookhaven will observe its twentieth anniversary. Throughout 1967, there will be approximately 275 employees realizing twenty years of service to the Laboratory.

Our present vacation policy allows a maximum accrual rate of 1 1/4 days per month for weekly employees with 15-19 years of service.

After January 1, 1967, all weekly employees with twenty or more years of service will be entitled to vacation credit which will accrue at the rate of two working days per month. For computation purposes, this new accrual will apply for each full month of service after the twentieth anniversary of employment.

'OK, Everybody Out of the Mall!'

While additional parking facilities were under construction, parking was temporarily permitted at the southwest corner of the grass mall at the junction of Brookhaven Avenue and Center Street. Now that the new parking lots have been completed, however, parking on the mall must be prohibited once again.

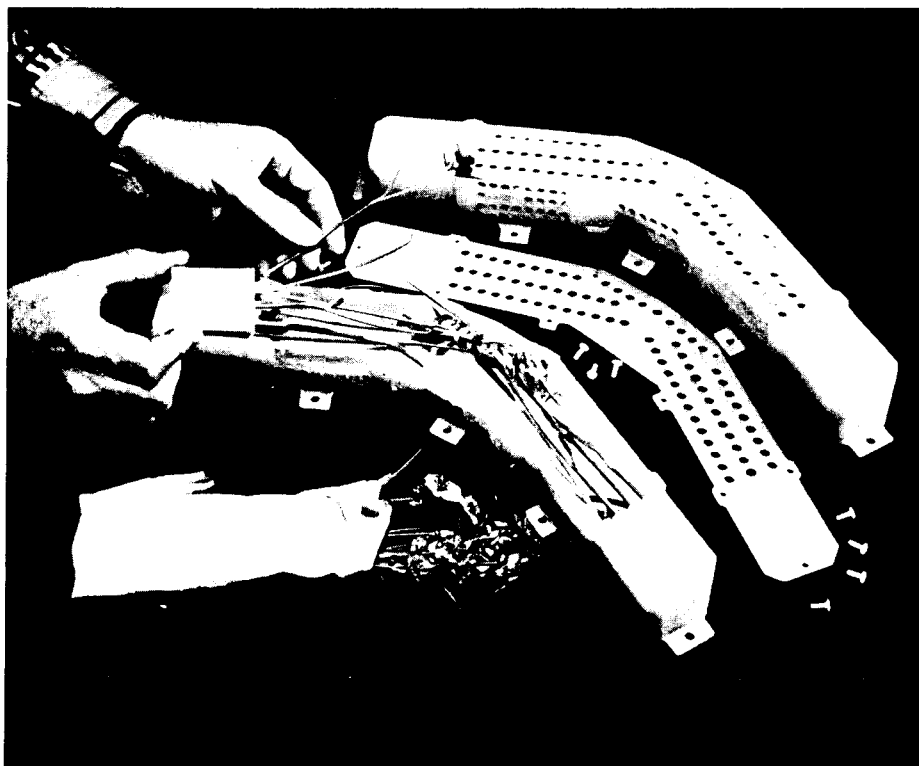

BNL Experiment To Be Flown In NASA's First Biosatellite

A Brookhaven biology experiment is being carried by the National Aeronautics & Space Administration's first biosatellite which is slated to be launched momentarily. The BNL experiment is designed to determine whether ionizing radiation combined with weightlessness will produce a different frequency of mutations in plant cells than that produced by radiation alone.

The plant selected for the experiment is a special strain of a blue-flowering roadside plant native to many parts of southern and central U.S. where it is commonly known as the spiderwort. This plant was chosen by the Brookhaven biologists because it is easy to handle experimentally, has a small number (12) of large chromosomes suitable for detailed studies of radiation injury, and has a high mutation rate of a gene determining flower color. There is a large backlog of data concerning its response to ionizing radiation, and mutations are easy to count. It has about the same radiosensitivity as mammalian cells.

In the experiment, roots of young *Tradescantia* plants will be sealed in tubes filled with nutrient solution, and the flower buds arranged in a single tier for uniform exposure to the gamma radiation from a small radioactive source. Radiation-induced effects will appear as color changes in the flowers a few days after retrieval. These changes are caused by mutations in some of the somatic cells in the petals and stamen hairs in such a way that the normal blue coloration fails to develop and is replaced by pink. Successive divisions of the pink mutant cell then produce a row or cluster of pink cells. The number of pink mutant spots can be counted with the aid of a microscope and from these a mutation rate can be calculated. A control sample of *Tradescantia* on board the biosatellite will be exposed to the same effects of weightlessness, but will be in a special compartment shielded from the radioactive source. Comparisons will be made with the ground-based specimens. Any differences in mutation frequencies observed can then be attributed to weightlessness, decreased gravity, or other environmental stresses associated with the flight.

NASA Biosatellite

Each experiment package consists of 32 small plants growing in nutrient solution in small vials maintained in a plastic housing. One package holds the plants at an appropriate distance from the gamma ray source. The plants will not be illuminated but can tolerate darkness for the duration of the flight. Temperature and humidity will be in the range considered normal for this plant. A total radiation exposure of about 300 Roentgens is expected in the forward compartment and at most only a few Roentgens in the shielded area where the second package will be. The gamma ray source is being sent with the satellite to insure that the specimens will receive enough radiation to make the experiment a success. The amount of naturally occurring space radiation received in an average 3-day flight would not be sufficient for easy analysis of most of the experiments.

The experiment, with Dr. Arnold H. Sparrow and Lloyd A. Schairer of the Biology Department as principal investigators, is one of thirteen to be flown in the first NASA biosatellite. All experiments in the six-flight Biosatellite Program are designed to study the effects of environmental factors which can be tested only in space on a variety of living organisms, ranging from single cells to higher plants and animals. As progress is made in the manned exploration of space, the biological effects of a space environment become of greater importance. It is essential to determine these effects on man's ability to perform physical and mental tasks, and to develop systems that are required for his survival and for his physiological and psychological well-being in space. His subsequent resumption of normal life patterns on earth must also be considered as well as possible genetic effects.

Cape Kennedy is the launch site for the satellite, which was developed by General Electric Company's Reentry Systems Department. The 165-mile circular orbit flight will last for three days. At the end of the flight, the 940-lb. craft will drop a 500-lb. reentry package somewhere near Hawaii. Once through the heat of atmospheric reentry, the 260-lb. experimental capsule will be cast loose. It will then deploy a parachute, and aircraft will attempt to catch it in mid-air. If the catch misses and the capsule lands in the ocean, dye markers and radioequipment will be used to locate it in the water. The recovered specimens will then be rushed to the laboratory for analysis.

The Biosatellite Project is managed by NASA's Ames Research Center, Moffett Field, California.
