BNL Will Again Participate in Technician Scholarship Program

Brookhaven has again accepted an offer to participate in a Technician Scholarship Program sponsored by the Department of Nuclear Education and Training of the Atomic Energy Commission. The AEC scholarships were initiated last year to provide selected contractor personnel an opportunity to accelerate their comple-

Under the upcoming 1967 program, scholarship recipients will begin full-time study next fall. Each must be a U.S. citizen and a full-time Laboratory employee who can complete his Bachelor's degree in two calendar years or less. Appointments will be made for up to twelve months, to be renewable up to an additional year on full salary plus tuition and fees. The

The following additional criteria will be applied by the special BNL committee which will choose candidates for final selection by the AEC panel:

Length of Service: Candidates should have had two or more years of service with Brookhaven by September 1,

Academic Standing: Candidates should have a cumulative college grade point average of "B or better."

Educational Effort: Candidates should have graduated from a two-year program (junior college or technical institute) or have completed the sophomore year of a four-year bachelor's ⁴egree program, and must be able to

aplete the four-year program in calendar years or less. Preference all be given to candidates now actively pursuing a bachelor's degree. Recommendations: Candidates' recommendation by their division or de-

Brookhaven Lecture Series

The Cellular Basis of Radiation Death

Victor P. Bond Medical Department

When human beings and other large animals receive whole-body doses of ionizing irradiation that are in the lethal range, a short period of mild or moderate symptoms is characterically followed by several weeks of well being, the so-called "latent period." There is then a reappearance of symptoms, leading to severe illness which may have a fatal outcome.

For many years there was no good explanation for the complex phenomena observed, and many incorrect theories were proposed. Dr. Bond and his colleagues have made major contributions to a new understanding in which the lethal effects are seen to result from sequential depletion of vital components of the blood. Dr. Bond will describe the mechanism by which specific effects on certain cell lines cause radiation disease, and he will show how this knowledge leads to treatment for alleviating the disease or modifying its course.


Following the lecture, refreshments will be available in the Exhibit Hall.

Dr. Cool, Associate Director, Appointed to AEC Panel

The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission has appointed Dr. Rodney L. Cool, Associate Director for High Energy Physics at the Laboratory, as member of a newly established Advisory Panel on High Energy Physics. The Panel will provide advice and guidance to the Commission in this area of physical science research. It will consider important matters relating to high energy physics and advise the Commission concerning the best course of action, in the interest of a vigorous and productive national high energy physics program.

The Panel, under the chairmanship of Professor Victor F. Weisskopf, Head of the Department of Physics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is composed of twelve physical scientists. The members have been selected to achieve a reasonable balance of competence in theoretical and experimental research, and competence in accelerator design and utilization, and to include scientists associated with laboratories and universities. The scientists will serve in this capacity in the national interest and not as representatives of their respective organizations or geographical regions.

Use Headlights: It's The Law

State law now requires use of headlights between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before dawn. They should also be used at any other time when visibility is less than 350 feet. In rain and fog, headlights on low beam should be used to warn others of your approach.

To prevent blinding other drivers, headlights on high beam must be dropped to low beam within 500 feet of an approaching vehicle, or within 200 feet of a vehicle you are following.

documentary approach to express the idea that men will fight and die for unselfish reasons as well as for selfish ones. Unfortunately, his direction falls short insofar as the acting is not quite convincing enough. Burt Lancaster has a bit too much dash, Jeanne Moreau is too cool, and Paul Scofield as the Nazi colonel is somewhat more evil than necessary. Consequently, the film tends to overstate its message.

Although I would not rate this movie as one of the great pictures of the decade, it nevertheless makes a good attempt to combine a fine screenplay, excellent photography and plenty of fast action and suspense into a believable and entertaining picture. It is worth seeing.
