### Californium Shipped . . .

One half (50 micrograms) of the Californium produced in the High Flux Isotope Reactor at Oak Ridge National Laboratory to date, has been shipped to Argonne National Laboratory for chemical research.

The remaining half has been shipped to Savannah River Laboratory for further processing before being sent to Brookhaven National Laboratory to be used in medical research.

### Quiet Neighbors Proposed . . .

Representative Seymour Halpern, (R-NY) proposed last week that "thousands of acres of government-owned land at the former Camp Upton be used for the expansion of the nearby National Cemetery at Pinelawn."

Halpern said, "We have heard many warnings during the past several years about the need for a long-term plan to establish adequate grave-sites for veterans. Each time legislation has been introduced it has been buried in committee."

"The time to plan for such expansion is now" he warned, after pointing out that Pinelawn will not be available beyond 1970 without expansion.

## Americans at Ulm Dedication See Chancellor Kiesinger

### Brookhaven Scores Twice In Scientific American

The March 1967 issue of *Scientific American* includes two articles by BNL staff members. The lead article of the Issue is "Toxic Substances and Ecological Cycles" by George M. Woodwell of the Biology Department.

William B. Sampson, of the Accelerator Department, with Paul P. Craig and Myron Strongin of the Physics Department, authored an article titled "Advances in Superconducting Magnets."

Woodwell, an ecologist, has done much field work in the area surrounding Brookhaven Laboratory. In his article he tells of the effects of DDT spray on marsh land along the south shore.

Sampson traces the history of superconducting magnets from their status as a laboratory curiosity to their present exotic state.

### Scientists Visit Greece, Israel

On February 22, Gertrude Scharff-Goldhaber presented a paper "Recent Results on Properties of Deformed Nuclei" at the Democritus Center in Athens, Greece.

On March 3, Maurice Goldhaber gave a summary talk at the Second International Conference on High Energy Physics and Nuclear Structure at The Weizmann Institute of Science, Rehovoth, Israel.

The only Americans attending the dedication ceremonies for the new university at Ulm, Germany, were Dr. Victor P. Bond, Associate Director and Chairman of the Medical Department, and Dr. Eugene P. Cronkite, Senior Scientist at BNL.

Cronkite, who had been a Visiting Professor at Freiburg a year ago, and Bond, who delivered an address at the dedication ceremony, are neighbors in the Strongs Neck section of Setauket.

The major address at the dedication was given by Raymond Appleyard, Head of the BioMed section of Euratom.

The dedication address was given by Chancellor Kurt Kiesinger of the German Federal Republic who said, "In many areas Germany could not expect to be the first in the world because of its size, but certainly we could be first in science and technology."

In his address, Dr. Bond emphasized the importance of individuals working together in the interdisciplinary approach.

In private conversations with Bond and Cronkite after the ceremonies, Kiesinger indicated that he would back the new university "all the way."

According to Bond, Kiesinger was pleasant and affable, but very firm in

his backing of Ulm. This new approach to German higher education is one of the prime interests of the German Head of State.

The University at Ulm will specialize in natural science and medicine, with the initial research effort at the Ulm city hospital.

Bond and Cronkite, who have maintained professional contact with many German scientists over the years, feel that the new university will be an exciting departure from the present system for higher education in Germany.

On a side trip from Ulm, the two Brookhaven men visited the new quarters for the International Institute for Scientific Cooperation, in Günzberg, Bavaria, formed by a private foundation. An old castle, Schloss Reisenburg, high above the Danube, will be used as a center for study and meetings. After renovation, the picturesque old castle will have a library and study rooms as well as several large areas for meetings and group discussions, and living quarters.

Dr. Cronkite was the first honorary foreign member of this Institute.

Two former Brookhaven staff members present at the dedication were Dr. Theodore Fliedner, one of the founding professors at Ulm, and Dr. Ludwig Reinendegen, who is slated to be Chairman of the Medical Department at Jülich.

Talking shop and renewing old friendships was the order of business on a trip to Freiburg, where Dr. Cronkite had spent a year as Visiting Professor. This town in the southwest corner of Germany, in the Black Forest region, is also a center for good eating.

Regular bill of fare at the hotels includes such items as fresh trout, venison and wild boar, which go well with the Kaiserstuhl and Bädische wines that are native to this region.

Since their last visit, both Bond and Cronkite agreed that a change is apparent in the German economy. Money is tighter, and no longer do the tourists have a great exchange advantage.

Dr. Bond, a member of the Board of Education of the Three Village Central School District, found time to speak to several German teachers. He noted that although teacher organizations are not as fully developed as they are in the United States, they are asking for a part in curriculum planning.

According to Dr. Cronkite, there is a growing awareness on the part of the German people of the problems of education. PTA groups, formerly unheard of in Germany, are being talked of in many areas.

## Unesco Official Sees Linac and Bubble Chamber

Professor A.N. Matveyev, Assistant Director General of Unesco for science programs, visited BNL on Friday, March 10.

Before coming to the Lab, Matveyev delivered an address at the annual meeting of the National Research Council in Washington, D.C.

Matveyev, who is described as "a good international civil servant," visited with other physicists and dis-

cussed operations and programs at the AGS. G.K. Green, Chairman of the Accelerator Department, with J.P. Blewett and J.R. Sanford showed the Russian scientist the Linac and the 80" Bubble Chamber as well as experimental areas.

Professor Matveyev, the author of numerous scientific papers and two books, was Professor of Theoretical Physics at Moscow State University before joining Unesco in 1964.

### The Colt

The theme of the Cossack and his horse - a vital myth of Russian art - is treated with careful attention to the details of local setting (Southern Russia during the Civil War) in this film from the story by Mikhail Sholokov. Trofim, a cavalryman, is ordered to destroy a new-born colt, but he cannot bring himself to do it. The colt trails along when the squadron goes into battle and wanders into the battle lines. Trofim tries to save it. Sholokov's message, the salvage of life in the midst of holocaust, is clearly stated.

### Short: Potemkin

Potemkin is universally considered to be one of the most important films in the history of the silent cinema and is regarded as the greatest work Eisenstein produced. It is a display of his theories of cinema art: emphasis on montage, stress of intellectual contact, and his treatment of the mass instead of the individual as protagonist. Potemkin is based on the uprising of the sailors of the ship Prince Potemkin in 1905. The battle on the steps of Odessa is probably the prototype for most mass scenes in films since then.

**Green** - Believe it or not, Len Baker rolled his 226 game and put himself in line for an award with a 686 series for the night. Nice, Len.

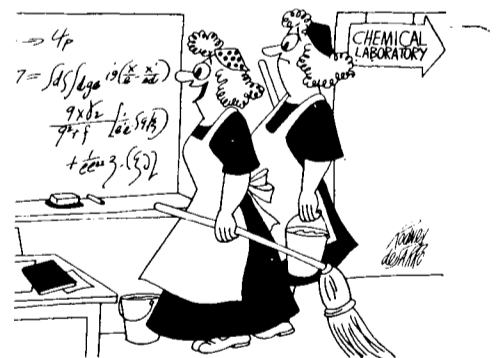
**Blue** - High games reign again. J. Svoboda 226, R. Dobert 227 and G. Speidel 233.
