Ecology Students Caravan to BNL

The Ecology Forest at Brookhaven was visited last week by a caravan of four station wagons carrying four faculty members, and 11 graduate students (including 2 girls) from the Botany Department of the University of Illinois.

Original plans to camp on the softball diamonds had to be altered due to a downpour of rain on the day they arrived. George M. Woodwell, of the Biology Department, invited the entire group to set up camp in his back yard, and use his garage as a headquarters.

The new arrangement turned out to be ideal, as the students were able to get together each of the two evenings of their stay, and have informal seminars in the Woodwell house.

Dr. L.C. Bliss, of the Botany Department of the University of Illinois, had contacted Woodwell earlier to arrange for the group to visit Brookhaven. All are students of Ecology, and were vitally interested in seeing the effort in this field at various research institutions in the North-east area.

After leaving Brookhaven the caravan planned to visit Yale, and if weather permitted, then to Dartmouth. The ten-day field trip was financed mostly by the students themselves, with some help from the home university.

"This is the sort of program that is most valuable," said Dr. Woodwell, "It is an excellent chance for direct contact with those who are going to devote their careers to the study of Ecology." In all, the people involved in the field trip covered more than 3000 miles during their spartan journey.

Before a capacity crowd of over 950, in the BNL Theatre last night, Sir Isaiah Berlin, Chichele Professor of Social and Political Theory in Oxford, delivered an AUI Distinguished Lecture.

AEC Appoints New Member To Safety and Licensing Panel

Chairman Glenn T. Seaborg of the Atomic Energy Commission announced the appointment of Dr. Clarke Williams, Deputy Director, Brookhaven National Laboratory, to the panel from which the Commission selects Atomic Safety and Licensing Boards.

The principal function of these boards is to conduct public hearings and make initial decisions on applications to construct nuclear power plants. Each Atomic Safety and Licensing Board consists of two technical members and one person who is qualified to conduct administrative proceedings.

Lehn to Head Central Shops

Robert Lehn has been promoted to the position of Central Shops Superintendent. Mr. Lehn will be responsible for the operations of the Central Shop.

Lehn, his wife Pat, and their three sons live on the North Shore, where Bob serves as a commissioner in the East Setauket Fire District.

Also promoted were, Peter Delmonte to Machine Shop Supervisor, Sigmund Clausen to Foreman of the Light Machine Shop, and Alexander Hanson to Foreman of the Heavy Machine Shop.

Sir Isaiah traced the roots of irrationalism to Immanuel Kant "that sane and good man," who innocently introduced the concept of man's "free will" into his essentially rational system of moral philosophy. Free will alone, according to Kant, distinguished man from his environment. Little did Kant know that the concept would spark the development it did and lead to today's beatniks and hippies.

In Germany, a society largely bypassed by High Renaissance and mortally frustrated by French superiority in the intellectual life of 18th century Europe, reaction to rationalism took the form of emphasis on "inner" life, the artistic creativity of man, and a mystical union with nature. This attitude meant also the rejection of the cold, analytical, cerebral and essentially "external" approach attributed to rationalism and her faithful servant Science. Art, born directly out of man's creative power, was suddenly noble, while science (not really blossoming in the eighteenth century!) was not. Romanticism added new appeal to this view. Whether his action was virtuous or evil, the romantic hero was one who could defy the set pattern of rational behavior and even the very constraints of man's own nature. Sincerity, devotion to purpose, willingness to sacrifice were

highly valued in man's behavior. In leaders too, artistic creativity, in the sense of moulding the masses to one purpose and ability to bring forth new political configurations, became the hallmark of greatness.

From such beginnings Sir Isaiah traced the development of irrationalism and its various manifestations: in political and social life through nationalism to later aberrations such as fascism, anarchism, etc., in the arts and literature as surrealism, tachism, existentialism, action painting, etc., up to today's forms of reaction that are apparent in beatnik and hippy attitudes. About the future he did not wish to prophesy; once the irrational element has been introduced there would probably be no return. Only fluctuations.

Berlin is an internationally known philosopher, historian, author and diplomat. He is resigning his appointment in Oxford University to become President of Wolfson College, a new graduate institution in which emphasis will be placed on the sciences. Sir Isaiah holds a Distinguished Professorship in the Humanities at the City University of New York and has lectured at Harvard, Chicago, Princeton and Bryn Mawr.

His war service began in 1941 when he was assigned to the New York office of the British Information Services, to be transferred a year later to the British Embassy in Washington, D.C. as first secretary, a post he held until 1946.

Paul Desmond With Brubeck at BNL May 6

The Dave Brubeck Trio became the Dave Brubeck Quartet in 1951 when Paul Desmond added his alto sax to the group. Since then the names Brubeck and Desmond have been synonymous, winning accolades from critics and thrilling audiences around the world. They have become recognized as the outstanding combination in the history of jazz.

Bearing testimony to this well-deserved position in the world of jazz, Desmond, who will be appearing with Brubeck at the BNL Theatre on May 6, has swept every poll, contest and award in his field, including the Down Beat Critics' Award.

Paul Desmond was born in San Francisco. His father played organ for silent movies, wrote band arrangements and played accompaniments for vaudeville acts. At age 5 Desmond moved to New Rochelle, New York, returning to San Francisco to attend Polytechnic High School. He joined the Army in 1943. By 1943 Paul had learned to play a number of instruments, including the violin, but during the war he settled on the alto sax as his instrument.

Desmond met Brubeck for the first time in the Army. "I remember the first tune we played was Rosetta," says Paul. "I was really dazzled by his (Brubeck's) harmonic approach." Dave simply says, "Paul's the greatest."

This accidental meeting in the Army is perhaps one of the most fortunate meetings in the history of jazz, attested to by the millions of Brubeck-Desmond fans around the world.
