Get in the Swim . . . But Come Home Safe

The first swim in the ocean can be a harrowing experience for those who have previously been only to lakes and pools. Ocean swimming can be a lot of fun if some basic safety rules are followed. At Smith Point Park, the nearest ocean beach to BNL, the sun, the sand, and the waves make possible a complete day of sport.

Ocean waves are a joy to the surfer, a challenge to the bather, and a haven for the fish that feed on the churned-up bottom. Waves fascinate children and adults like, and are always good for the background for a summer TV commercial. In a storm, the breakers terrorize beachfront cottage owners, and cause boatmen anguish and fear.

Is the seventh wave of a series larger? According to investigators this is one of the myths of the sea. The average wave in the Atlantic ocean has a period of ten seconds between waves, and travels at a speed of about 35 miles per hour.

The height of waves, and the consequent depth of water can be estimated quite easily. Walk towards the water until the crest of the breaking wave is seen aligned with the horizon. The vertical distance between the eye and the lowest point to which the water retreats on the face of the beach is then equal to the height of the wave. The depth of the water at the breaking point is 1.3 times the height of the wave.

Never let a wave break over your head. Serious injury can result due to the churning action of the water, and the crushing reight as it falls. Always dive into a large breaker so that you come to the surface on the calm side to seaward.

An undertow, a sea puss, or a backwash, is created as the water washed up on the beach shelf by a breaker runs back to the sea. If caught in an undertow, swim parallel to the shore before trying to turn in to

Old Guest House To Be Replaced

the beach again. If you find that you are tired, relax by floating on your back for a while or slowly treading water before swimming back to shore. Floating in salt water, incidentally, is much easier than in fresh water.

The prime rule for ocean swimming is to never swim alone, and never at a beach without lifeguard protection. Speaking of protection, don't forget the sun-tan oil even though the day is cloudy or overcast. The ultraviolet rays of the sun penetrate the haze on a chilly day, and a serious burn can result if proper precautions are not taken

Q & A ...

The following questions were received for this week's benefit column.

Q. Can the Bulletin Board explain the automatic increases included in the new wage system?

A. The purpose of automatic increases is the same under the new system as it was under the old one, that is, to provide a guaranteed rate of progression for newly hired or newly promoted employees who are satisfactorily progressing toward the proficiency (or standard) rate of their wage level.

The increases may be accelerated for an exceptional employee, and for the employee who has not yet measured up to expected performance, they may be decelerated. However, any action of this type would be taken only if recommended by the supervisor or supervisors most directly acquainted with the work of the employee involved. If no such action is taken, the increases are processed automatically.

The automatic increases occur at six month intervals based on the entry date into the particular wage level. In the past, the increases were always given in January or July and it could take anywhere up to nine months to get the first increase.

Q. I am a veteran and your BNL tuition refund article in the June 29 *Bulletin Board* did not mention the G.I. Bill. Can I obtain tuition benefits from both?

A. It depends upon what you mean by the word "both." According to a communication received from the Veterans Administration, they will disqualify you from receiving any G.I. Bill educational benefits concurrently with BNL tuition refunds. In other words, you can't collect from both for the same course. However, there is no reason why you can't use the BNL and the G.I. Bill benefits one at a time. Since the G.I. Bill may provide varying benefits at different times, you should look into both benefit programs and pick the one most beneficial to your current needs. For those veterans at BNL who have not used their G.I. Bill education benefits and are not sure whether or not they qualify, here are the current eligibility requirements: an honorable discharge or release, and active duty for more than 180 days, any part of which occurred after January 31, 1955, or if less than 181 days, the discharge after January 31, 1955, was for a service connected disability.

The service period of 181 days does not include periods when the veteran was assigned to a civilian school by the Armed
