BNL's Retirement Plan Vested Rights and Death Benefits

One of the most important features of the Brookhaven Retirement Plan is its immediate and complete vesting privileges. These privileges guarantee you total ownership of your retirement plan, including all contributions made by the Laboratory, regardless of how short a time you are in the plan. This contrasts with the vast majority of company plans which require that an employee must participate for a specified number of years before his vesting privilege includes the company contributions. Under these other plans, if the employee terminates employment early, he is returned his contributions but receives little, if any, of the employer's contributions.

Many retirement plans apply this limited esting to death benefits, whereby if an mployee dies prior to retirement, his widow recovers his contributions but seldom receives all of the employer's contributions.

At Brookhaven you own your retirement plan from the first day you begin participating. This allows you to retire at any age or to take the plan with you (including Laboratory contributions) if you leave Brookhaven for another job. In either case, the entire accumulation in your retirement fund, which could add up to many thousands of dollars, (see last week's issue of the Bulletin Board), is available to you in the form of a lifetime annuity income which commences whenever you desire.

If you decide to leave the Laboratory for other than retirement purposes, you have three major choices.

1. You may continue the plan by making your own contributions at the same rate or in reduced amounts if you so desire.

2. You may keep what you have intact, but discontinue further contributions. In his case, the amount in your name will ntinue to earn interest at the same rates

those of other TIAA-CREF participants. When you decide to begin receiving annuity payments, TIAA-CREF will advise you of the income you will receive, which will be based on the contributions you and the Laboratory made up to the time you terminated your employment plus the interest earned since termination.

3. You may begin receiving an annuity income immediately. As far as TIAA-CREF is concerned there is no minimum retirement age. An employee may "retire" from Brookhaven and begin receiving annuity payments even though he accepts employment elsewhere. (The only time an employee may not do this is when he accepts employment at another institution which has a TIAA-CREF plan.)

Those who leave the Laboratory and have been in the plan less than 5 years have still another option. They may request a refund of their contributions plus any interest their contributions have earned. In this case, the Laboratory is refunded its contributions less any administrative expenses charged by TIAA-CREF for this procedure. This is an option which allows persons in this category to discontinue participation in this retirement plan, and should not be confused with the vesting privileges which are yours as long as you keep your retirement fund intact.

Your BNL retirement plan also features fully vested death benefits. This is virtually the same as having another life insurance policy. If you die prior to retirement, the entire accumulation will be paid to the beneficiary you have named. After notification of your death, TIAA-CREF will send to your beneficiary the choice of settlements together with the incomes available under each settlement. Your beneficiary may elect a single sum settlement or may choose to have the accumulation paid as an income for a specified number of years or for life. Other special arrangements can be made to suit the particular needs of your beneficiary. The method of settlement may be designated by you when you name your beneficiary, or the choice may be left to your beneficiary.

The death benefits after retirement are somewhat different, and will depend on the type of retirement option selected by you. These will be discussed next week.




