## Buyer's Son Cited For Combat Heroism

Corporal Richard A. Haeg, son of Joe Haeg, a buyer in Purchasing, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with V for valor, by Lt. Gen Krulak of the Third Marine Division. Haeg's citation reads as follows:

"For heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam while serving as a Grenadier with Company A, First Amphibian Tractor Battalion, Third Marine Division. On July 14, 1967, during Operation Hickory II, Corporal HAEG's squad was temporarily pinned down by intense enemy automatic weapons fire while conducting a search and clear mission south of Hill 31. In the initial moments of the fire fight, his unit sustained several casualties. `ealizing the seriousness of the situation,

rporal HAEG unhesitatingly exposed nself to the heavy volume of fire and deavered effective M-79 grenade fire against the enemy positions to cover the evacuation of one of the casualties. Then, continuing to disregard his own safety, he repeatedly maneuvered across the fire-swept terrain to assist other wounded Marines to positions of relative safety and supervise their evacuation. His heroic and timely actions in the face of extreme personal danger were an inspiration to all who observed him and saved the lives of several Marines. Corporal HAEG's courage, bold initiative and selfless devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and of the United States Naval

Corporal Haeg joined the Marine Corps after graduation from Mattituck High School 18 months ago. After completing basic training, Haeg was sent to Viet Nam and earned his award near Con Thien in the DMZ. Joe Haeg and his wife Christine, live in Mattituck with two other children, a n Dennis, 17 and a daughter Mary Jo, 12.


## Lab Firemen Complete Emergency Aid Course

Chief Thomas A. Newham, Captain Frederick J. Strier, and Fireman Edward F. Yost, all of the BNL Fire Department, have received the graduate certificate of the Committee on Injuries of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons for completing the "Advanced Practical Course on Emergency Care of the Sick and Injured," sponsored by the Committee, October 26, at Columbia University, College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City.

Award of the diplomas was made by Dr. Walter A. Hoyt, Jr., Akron, Ohio, Committee Chairman, at the conclusion of the three-day course of lectures and demonstrations held in cooperation with the New York City Police Department and attended by 300 registrants from New York City and 125 other cities in nine states and Canada.

The advanced training is given to imrove the skills and knowledge of persons avolved in the emergency handling of critically sick and injured persons.

Dr. Charles S. Neer II, New York orthopaedic surgeon, was chairman of the committee of physicians and police officials directing the course.

# 50-Ton Lift Sets Record

When Jimmy Winters, rigging foreman, clamped his teeth around his cigar and waved his hand in a circle, the Lab's 80-ton crane took up the slack in the cables holding the shielded room of the Whole Body Counter. As the cables tightened, the onlookers quieted down and Ed Hunter stopped puffing on his pipe. There was an audible sigh of relief when the 50-ton load was lifted clear of the ground.

The dual front wheels of the giant crane just barely touched the earth in front of the Medical Research Center as the steel cube was lifted high enough to be loaded onto the waiting 75-ton, 16-wheel trailer. When the load was finally in place, and Winters had shifted his cigar to the other side of his mouth, a flurry of hand clapping broke out amongst the several dozen spectators.

The lifting of this record load was the culmination of a series of events that started when a new computer-controlled counter was installed in Medical at the Low Level Background Facility.


After a decision was made by the Medical Department to remove the 50-ton shielded room, the Shops Division was called in to give an estimate of the cost of cutting it up and disposing of the pieces. When all of the costs were computed, the price tag came to approximately twenty thousand dollars.

Bob Lehn of Shops, Al Finn of Medical, and Ed Hunter of Plant Engineering and Planning put their heads together, and decided as an alternate plan to lift the room through a hole in the roof, and remove it in one piece. This new plan would only cost about fifteen thousand dollars and have the added advantage of less disruption to the rest of the Medical Research Center.

After removal, the chamber would then be available for further use, and the initial investment of \$35,000 for building it would not be lost. It was decided to place it in the "cow barn" to be used for whole-body counting of large animals.

After looking over the proposals for the use of the space vacated by the steel room, Al Finn noted that the removal of one wall was scheduled, and that the move of the steel room could be made without opening the roof if the chamber was slid out through an outside wall of the building. When costs were re-figured for the new proposal, it was found that with all the necessary building work and the purchase of new slings and jacks, the steel room could be removed from the building and placed in the Large Animal Facility for an expenditure of approximately seven thousand dollars, or a savings of thirteen thousand dollars over the original estimate.

According to Dr. Lewis Schiffer, the shielded room will be used in the Large Animal Facility for absorption and retention studies of pancreatic and renal functions. Others working on the bio-medical project under the direction of Dr. Eugene Cronkite are: Drs. A. Chanana and D. Joel

## 70th B'haven Lecture Is On Organic Liquids

Radiation and Organic Liquids will be the subject of the 70th Brookhaven Lecture to be presented Wednesday, November 15, by Dr. Donald Metz of the Nuclear Engineering Department.

Dr. Metz will attempt to delineate some of the problems peculiar to radiation induced chemical reactions in organic systems, with an emphasis on several experimental approaches to the problem. After a brief introduction to the question "What is an organic compound?", he will attempt to answer two interdependent questions: first, What are the reactive species produced by radiation in organic liquids; and second, Is there any correlation between the molecular structure of the starting irradiated liquid and the products that are formed?



Donald J. Metz was born in Brooklyn on May 18, 1924. His undergraduate education started in 1941, was interrupted for three years spent in the Infantry in Europe, and was completed in 1947 when he received a B.S. in Chemistry from St. Francis College, Brooklyn. Metz did his graduate work at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn in Polymer Research Institute and was granted an M.S. in Chemistry in 1949, and a Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry in 1955.

In 1954 he joined the staff of BNL in the Nuclear Engineering Department, and was recently appointed Supervisor of Radiation Research in the Radiation Division. His research effort at Brookhaven has centered mainly on radiation induced chemical reactions in organic systems, specifically in the area of graft copolymerization and polymerization of ultra-pure vinyl compounds. Since 1947 he has been a parttime member of the faculty of St. Francis College, where he is presently a Professor of Chemistry and Physics.

## Power Outage Causes Some Inconvenience

The entire Laboratory was without power for a few seconds on Friday afternoon, November 3, when a short circuit occurred on LILCO's 69,000-volt power line on Long Island Avenue in Medford. Automatic equipment in BNL's main substation responded immediately to restore power by switching from the faulted line to the standby 69,000-volt line. However, the short outage was sufficient to force shutdown of the reactors, accelerators, computers and other major equipment.

BNL's power supply comes from two high-voltage feeders that enter the property on widely separated power lines. Either line can carry the full load of BNL's electric power requirements. If power fails on the line which is in use, the other line is automatically switched into service. Switching can also be initiated remotely from LILCO's operating center at Hicksville.

Plans are now being formulated by Plant Engineering and Planning to improve the reliability of the power supply in coming years as the electric load grows. A large increase in power demand will occur when the AGS conversion project is completed. It is expected that at that time we will have a direct 138,000-volt line from LILCO's new nuclear plant at Shoreham. This will be a looped feeder with the possibility of power flow from either of two directions. Although this line will not be in service until 1973, it can be seen now under construction along Route 25A on the North Shore.

## Radar Cookery At Cafeteria

The East Room of the Cafeteria now has a radar cooking unit for fast heating of canned and prepared food. The unit, which is operated on a self-service basis, can heat the average portion of food in about 10 seconds.

Hot dogs, hamburgers, stew, goulash or ravioli are available for coins in the slot of a refrigerated case. The food is unwrapped and placed in the radar oven until a buzzer sounds. When food is removed after about 10 seconds, it is piping hot and ready to eat. Bowls, forks, spoons, and straws, as well as mustard and ketchup are available on the serving counter which is equipped with a can opener for the stew and the goulash.

A new coffee dispenser that brews only one cup of real coffee at a time has been installed. No matter what the hour, for ten cents you can get your coffee fresh – light, dark, black, sweet or not.

In conjunction with the new vending services, beginning next Monday, a new schedule for service at the cafeteria will be put in effect. On weekdays, food will be served from 7:30 a.m. until 6:30 p.m. and on Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays, the food serving counters will be opened for limited short order service.

For three periods during the day, the cafeteria will be closed while tables are cleared and food is prepared for the next serving. The new schedule appears below:
