Watch Your Wallet

According to the Security Office, thieves, working alone or with help, have apparently found a happy hunting ground here at BNL. Since the middle of June there has been a rash of petty and not so petty thefts, and employees are cautioned to be more careful when they leave their possessions lay unattended, even for a moment.

For the most part, the thefts have involved wallets, sometimes taken from purses left on or in desks, watches, and more recently a car stolen from the cafeteria parking lot while the owner was eating.

It is unfortunate that we must be so concerned about stealing at the Laboratory. While steps are being taken to catch the thieves, it is still a good idea for each and every employee and guest to take that little extra precaution to prevent theft.

The Security Division offers the following steps that can be taken:

- Keep purses, wallets, watches, or any item of value attended or locked up out of reach.

- Always remove your car keys when you park.

- Always lock the car if it contains valuables, or lock them in the glove compartment or in the trunk.

- When you or your family are using the swimming pool, check your valuables with the Life Guard.

Some people tend to be careless about wallets because not much money is involved. If you don't mind having a few bucks stolen, then think of your drivers license and the trouble it will be to replace it, or your credit cards and the trouble it will be to notify every store and get a replacement while hoping the thief doesn't use the card before you notify the store. The cards are often worth more to a thief than the cash your wallet contains.

We do not recommend that each of you turn amateur detective, but your help is required. Simply keep your eyes and ears open and report anything unusual to the BNL Security headquarters, Ext. 411.

Making it difficult for a thief to operate is often the best way of preventing a theft.

Summer Visitors Use Brookhaven Facilities

The main campus of Fordham University is in the Bronx, but during the summer, a part of the Physics Department moves to BNL for research on cryogenics.

Dr. Joseph Budnick, Professor of physics at Fordham, has just completed his third six-week staff appointment with the Brookhaven Physics Department. Budnick, who is studying the types of magnetic ordering present in dilute metallic alloys at extremely low temperatures, has been working with Tom Oversluzens of the Physics cryogenic group.

During his stay at Brookhaven, Budnick, his wife Marcelle and their three children have been living in an apartment on site. "We've had several visitors since we have been here," said Budnick, "Some of my students have come out to see what we are doing, and need a place to stay for the night."

Father Tad Burch, who is doing post-doctoral work as a student of Budnick, was

a recent visitor. Fr. Burch, who comes originally from Baltimore, will teach at one of the Jesuit colleges when he finishes his studies at Fordham.

Another frequent guest has been Father Peter Chinh, a native of South Vietnam, who is assigned to a small parish in Riverdale, near the Fordham campus. Fr. Chinh, who is also a graduate student, will return to Vietnam to teach when he finishes at Fordham.

According to Budnick, "There has been a continuing relationship between Fordham University and the Cryogenics Group at BNL. This on-going relationship is an extension of the existing studies at Fordham. We are continuing our research at BNL because the equipment and supporting facilities are not available at Fordham. While we have been here, we have had very good support and close cooperation from Tom Kitchens, Tom Oversluzens, and of course, Paul Craig."

Dear Sir:

Recently BERA raised the annual locker rental charge at the gymnasium from \$2 to \$5. The reason for the 250% increase, as far as we can gather, is that too many locker renters are not making adequate use of their lockers. The increased fee will force out these marginal users to permit more serious users presently on the waiting list to obtain lockers. We submit that the BERA reason is not valid, and only serves to separate those willing to spend \$5 for a locker from those who aren't (BERA getting the wind-fall). BERA has no way of evaluating the frequency of locker usage.

We feel BERA's actions are not in the best interest of BNL employees, and we suggest two alternative solutions to the locker room problem.

1. Purchase more lockers. (There is ample room in the men's locker room for more lockers.)
2. Do away with locker rentals entirely. (The lockers would be used for clothing storage while the employee is engaged in his activity.)

Dollars and Sense

Shopping for Life Insurance

Sooner or later, most of us get around to thinking about life insurance. If something happens to me - how does the mortgage get paid? how does Johnny go to college? how do Mary's teeth get straightened?

When we come to the decision that we do not have enough coverage, we must decide how much we need, and compare the costs with what we can afford.

Some of the deciding factors as to coverage are size of family, financial obligations and standard of living. Social Security would provide some money; the TIAA/CREF plan would provide more; Con Gen group life insurance would add to the total available. The difference between the costs and available funds indicates the area to be covered by additional life insurance.

The Laboratory has recognized the need for additional life insurance by enabling all employees to obtain, at a nominal cost,

coverage up to three times the annual base salary.

We must then find out what types of plans are available, and what they cost us in premiums. One way is to invite an insurance salesman into your home to get all the data. But remember - the man has something to sell - hopefully to you.

Well, let's make your chore a little bit easier. Some insurance plans that are available are: Whole Life, Endowment (both of these having saving features), Home Protection, and Term. Home Protection features declining coverage over the years (comparable to a home mortgage declining balance), while Term gives a level amount of coverage for a stated number of years.

We did some shopping around to try and find out where you could get the most coverage for the least premium.

The following table depicts the costs for a five year renewable term policy. In this plan you pay level premiums for five years; then, should you renew for another five years, the premiums increase based on your age at time of renewal.

To show comparative costs for this coverage from different insurance companies, let's take an average male BNL employee, 40 years old, desiring \$25,000 coverage:

As you can see, TIAA gives you the same coverage for less premiums. What do you have to do to get TIAA coverage? You have the prime requisite - you are an employee - provided, of course, that you can pass a physical examination. Just call TIAA on the phone, or write them a letter. TIAA will mail to you an analysis of the various plans available and the cost to you at your age. This service is free - and you can evaluate them in the privacy of your home.
