A Feis is a festival of Irish culture. Everyone is invited to attend this unique event. It is sponsored by Div. 8 of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, and should provide a full day of family entertainment. The main theme of the day is competition. Children dressed in traditional Irish costumes will seek prizes given to them for the best performance in their particular category of Irish step dancing. It is estimated that 400 dancers will participate in this event.

Numerous pipe bands will pit their skills against each other in Class A, B and Slo March competitions. At the end of the day they will join each other for the mass band parade.

Additional competition will be held in art, solo bagpiping and tug-of-war.

Admission tickets are available to employees at the Recreation Office for \$1.50. Children under twelve will be admitted free.

The Feis starts at 11 a.m. and will close at 6 p.m. For those who do not wish to pack a picnic basket, beer, soda, hot dogs, hamburgers and ice cream will be sold on the field at reasonable prices. It is recommended that folding chairs be brought.

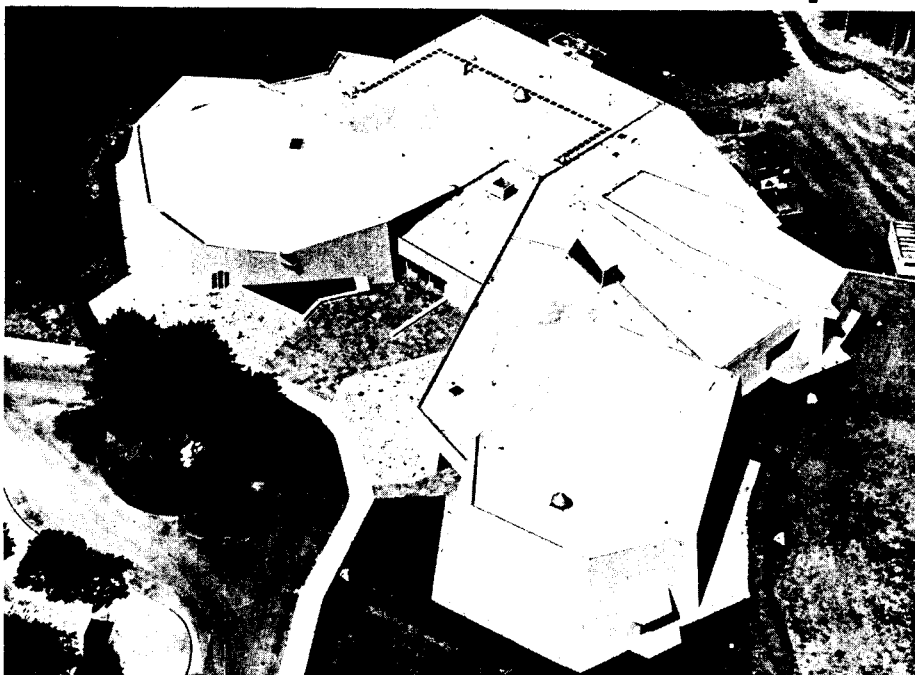

New Cafeteria Opening Set For Sept. 9

BNL's new Cafeteria will open its doors for business at 7:30 a.m., Monday, September 9. To celebrate the long-awaited opening, free coffee will be served all day.

The sectional dining area is attractive and spacious, with a seating capacity of 750 as compared with a seating capacity of 400 in the old cafeteria.

Main dishes will be served from several counters, thus eliminating the one long line for service. There are separate areas for

sandwiches and beverages, and a counter area is reserved for "take-out" orders. There will be no trouble paying for meals as four cashier stations have been provided.

Regardless of the weather outside, the weather inside the Cafeteria will be pleasant as it is completely air-conditioned.

Unfortunately, the new parking lots are not yet completed so the continued use of the old parking lot will be necessary for the present.

Brookhaven Avenue Closed

As has been painfully evident for the past few days, much roadwork is going on in the center of the Laboratory site. This has necessitated closing Brookhaven Avenue from Johns Hopkins Street to Pennsylvania Street. The work is scheduled for completion about September 12.

When finished, the hump at the intersection of Center and Brookhaven Streets will be gone, eliminating a potentially serious accident hazard.

Additional work is scheduled at the north end of the Research Library which will cause the temporary closing of Lewis Road. It is hoped that this work will be completed by September 16 or 17.

Men's Doubles Championship To Rosenberg and Stein

The Championship Match in the Men's Doubles of the BERA tennis tournament was won by Alan Rosenberg and Leonard Stein in two sets, 7-5, 6-2. The aggressive net play, blistering serving and all around court coverage of the team of Rosenberg and Stein was just too much for Andy Kevey and Allen Auskern. Where the net play of the losers was good, that of Rosenberg and Stein was better. The greatest disparity was in return of service. Rosenberg and Stein had too much artillery; their opponents were out-gunned.

The match started with Auskern serving, and failing to hold service. Stein held service in the second game after recovering from ad-out. Both sides held service for the 3rd and 4th games. The 5th game went to deuce 7 times before service was broken. With Stein holding service in the 6th game, the score became a lop-sided 5-1. At this point the team of Kevey and Auskern rallied strongly; Kevey took the 7th game at love, Rosenberg lost his service in the next game. Auskern then went to deuce 3 times before winning his service. A service break in the next game tied it up at 5-5. The set was won by Rosenberg and Stein when they took the next two games.

The second set seemed to be a replay of the first set for the first 7 games; once again the score was 5-2. However, this time Kevey and Auskern could not sustain their rally and Rosenberg held service to win the 8th and last game of the match after 3 times at deuce.

BERA Concert Series

The BERA Concert Series for 1968-69 will present six distinguished events of chamber and solo artists. The world-renowned Juilliard String Quartet which previously has performed at Brookhaven to enthusiastic response, will open the series on October 22nd.

Joy Kim, a lyric soprano, who has received wide acclaim in opera and concert in Europe, South America, the Far East, as well as in the United States, will present a song recital on March 6th.

The series will close on April 1st with a piano recital by Jerome Rose - one of the brilliant young pianists on the musical horizon.

All of the concerts will be presented at 8:30 p.m. in the beautiful new Berkner Hall. Season tickets are on sale at \$10.00 for adults and \$5.00 for children. Single tickets may also be purchased for each event at \$3.00 for adults, \$1.50 for children, and \$3.50 for non-employee guests. Season tickets are available from ticket sellers in each department.
