

Inaugurate Scientific Lecture-Visit Series

Professor Francis Low of MIT will be the first invited lecturer of the newlycreated Brookhaven Distinguished Lectureships. Through the medium of the lectures, important scientists will come to the Laboratory from time to time for productive interactions with the BNL staff.

Professor Low, who will be visiting the Physics Department on January 8 through 10, 15 through 17, and 27 through 31, will deliver a series of lectures entitled "High Energy Scattering - A New Approach.' In addition to his lectures, Professor Low will be available for informal discussions with members of the Physics Department Staff.

Professor Low is extremely well known in the field of theoretical high energy physics. His contributions to the theory of elementary particle interactions have been fundamental.


After getting his PhD at Columbia in 1949, he subsequently held appointments at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, and the University of Illinois, Urbana. Since 1957 he has been a Professor in the Physics Department at MIT. He has previously given the Loeb Lectures at Harvard University.

Halo Photograph **Gains Wide Fame**

The halo photographed by Mort Rosen of Photography, at the request of the Meteorology Group, which appeared in the Bulletin Board this spring has aroused much interest among atmospheric physicists.

Dr. R.S. Scorer of the Imperial College, London, plans to use it in his monumental cloud atlas, to be released soon, and Dr. R.A.R. Tricker from England will include the photo in his forthcoming book, Meteorological Optics. Dr. Hans Neuberger of the Pennsylvania State University, commenting on the phenomenon in the latest issue of the Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society, describes it as "an excellent picture of a circumscribed halo," and Dr. Tricker in a private communication to J.A. Frizzola of the BNL Meteorology Group, has indicated that it is the only photo he has ever seen of the phenomenon.

According to physicians in Hong Kong, the influenza strain known as A/2Hong Kong/68 originated in central China and was brought to Hong Kong in July. Four months later travelers from Hong Kong carried the disease to the United States.

A Hong Kong city councilor has denounced foreign newspapers and foreign health authorities for tagging the flu with the colony's name. He has proposed that the proper name for the disease should be China Flu.

A/2 Hong Kong/68 **Still Going Strong**

The latest visitor from the Far East, named A/2 Hong Kong/68, is in the same family as the more familiar Asian Flu. Expected to reach its peak in the east by the second week in January, the "bug" is expected to make its effect felt in all departments of BNL.

If you are wondering about how it feels to get the Hong Kong Flu, here are the symptoms that you should watch for.

The typical influenza infection comes on abruptly with headache, muscle aches, chills and fever. The patient usually has a flushed face and the eyes are red, the throat is dry, and there is a slight cough as well as a temperature usually over 101°. The uncomplicated disease which is similar to a bad cold, lasts from 2 to 5 days.

The most common complication is bacterial pneumonia which occurs in a relatively small percent of cases.

Treatment for the flu consists of aspirin, rest, and lots of fluids. Antibiotics are not of value in the primary disease, but should be used if pneumonia or other bacterial complications develop.

Although our best available preventives of influenza, inactivated vaccines, are among the least satisfactory immunizing agents in general use today, they often have been marginally effective, offering rather brief periods of protection. They also produce local and systemic reactions with relatively high frequency. Public health recommendations in recent years have acknowledged these limitations and have encouraged only selective influenza vaccination. Annual influenza vaccination has not been recommended for the entire population.

Optimally constituted influenza vaccines have achieved 60 percent or greater protection against the same or closely related viral strains. However, vaccines in general civilian use often have not appeared to achieve this degree of protection.

Protection through vaccination depends both upon the antigenic similarity of the vaccine strain to the virus prevalent in the community and upon the amount of antigen administered. When A2 influenza virus appeared in the United States in 1957, vaccines containing only A1 antigen gave very little protection.

Current vaccines may provide only limited protection against A/2 Hong Kong/68. Better protection against A/2 Hong Kong/68 will require a newly formulated vaccine.

The development and manufacture of a monovalent influenza vaccine containing a Hong Kong strain will take a considerable period of time, and only a limited number of doses will be initially available.

It is therefore recommended by the Public Health Service Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices that currently available bivalent and polyvalent influenza vaccine be given only to persons at highest risk or mortality or severe complications as a result of influenza, such as the chronically ill or the aged. When monovalent vaccine becomes available the same groups should be vaccinated or revaccinated with it.

If there is any doubt in your mind about treatment of symptoms, consult with your family physician, and follow his recommendations.

Deck The Halls

Christmas trees are a joy to behold but sometimes can cause a lot of trouble if not handled properly. Trees that are bought late in December have usually been cut early in November, and tend to become dried out soon after they are brought into the house.

When buying a tree, bounce the butt of the tree on the ground and see if any of the needles fall off. If the needles pull off easily or will break when you bend them, pick another, fresher tree.

When you get the tree home, cut off an inch or so of the trunk and put the tree in a bucket of water until you are ready to set it up.

Before setting the tree up in the house, check the lights and replace any with frayed cords or loose sockets. If you buy new strings, make sure the underwriters label applies to the whole assembly, and not just the cord.

Use a plastic tinsel instead of the metal type, and put the tree away from heat sources like a radiator or a television set. Choose a location that does not block a

Don't forget to put the tree in a sturdy holder that has a reservoir for water. And, don't forget to refill the water every day.

Watch the tree for signs of drying, and move any bulbs that are so near the needles that they cause them to brown. When Christmas and the Holiday season is done, remove the tree as soon as possible.

With an artificial tree, choose one that is fire and shock resistant, and free of sharp metal projections. Turn off all tree lights when going to bed, or when leaving the

Make sure that all the family knows how to get out of the house in case of a fire, and by all means remember that the local Fire Department should be the first to know if even a minor fire occurs.

Medical Insurance For College Students

Children of full-time regular employees are covered for medical insurance benefits under the employee's family medical plan until the December 31st following their 19th birthday.

Their coverage may be extended beyond that date if they are not married and are attending school on a full-time basis. This may be done by applying for student medical coverage for each eligible child.

Application for student medical coverage should be made at Personnel Services within 90 days from the date the child becomes eligible. The premium for this extended coverage is an additional \$.57 per week or \$2.47 per month.

Employees whose children are no longer eligible for student medical coverage should notify Personnel Services immediately.

Casualty Losses by Frank Bloom

The Long Island area has just been subjected to the first real winter frost of the current season. For BNL homeowners, there's a good chance that this winter's freezing temperatures and storms will leave their mark (or perhaps already have). There's a good chance of damage to trees. shrubs and broken windows, pipes, etc. However, there is a possible consolation where the loss per occurrence exceeds \$100. the Internal Revenue Code allows the taxpayer a deduction for the amount of the excess.

The measure of the loss is the drop in value of the property as a whole. In other words, the difference between its value immediately before and after the casualty - reduced by a \$100 per occurrence deductible. Of course, any portion of the loss that is compensated for by insurance, or otherwise recovered, is not deductible.

There are a number of ways to prove the loss, such as "before" and "after" pictures, or the cost of replacement or repairs that do no more than restore the property to its former condition. The best way to prove the extent of loss is to have a real estate appraiser look over the property and provide a written report, while the damage is fresh.

In addition, you can deduct the costs of the post-storm clean up as part of the casualty, and the appraisal fee can be separately itemized and deducted.
