HS Co-Op Program Reaches 36 Students

This past May marked the completion of the Laboratory's second participating year in the High School Cooperative Education Program, sponsored through the Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES). The Laboratory has, as part of its total training program, given basic skills training and guidance to 36 students from Longwood, Bellport, William Floyd, and Center Moriches High Schools.

The opportunity to earn while learning is a new approach to providing goal direction at the high school level. This work-study concept permits participating juniors and seniors to attend curriculum classes for half-day and then work part-time during the afternoon in work-training experiences. Here at BNL, students have participated in a variety of clerical and technical training situations. Many of the students have since graduated from high school and now hold full-time jobs in the community or have plans for attending college. Three co-op graduates are currently regular employees at the Laboratory, holding jobs for which they received training during their high school days.

Schrafft's To Operate Food Services At BNL

"After extended negotiations and discussions," Mr. Webster stated, "we have selected Schrafft's in the firm belief that their products, services and skills will prove beneficial to our entire community. Schrafft's has agreed to add many improvements to our present services. . . all of which are designed to create greater dining pleasure for our staff. During the change-over period, which will begin July 12, we intend that there will be no interruption in dining services," Mr. Webster said.

Commenting on the contract award, Mr. Frank Raethle, vice president-Schrafft's service sales in expressing his delight at the opportunity to provide the food service at Brookhaven stated: "We are very proud of many years of experience in operating company, hospital, college and governmental food service installations throughout the country. We now look forward with great pleasure to performing similar services at such an important facility as Brookhaven National Laboratory.

"Schrafft's quality ice cream, coffee, and food products will be featured at Brookhaven," Mr. Raethle continued, "with the principal intent being to satisfy the needs and requirements of all employees of the Lab. We hope you will convey to us any ways and means by which we can further fulfill Brookhaven's dining needs."

Manager of the new food service operations will be Anthony Leandro, a Schrafft's veteran of over 35 years service. Mr. Leandro's experience with the Company includes management of several of Schrafft's largest public restaurants in New York. . . as well as major food service installations for the U.S. Government. In July 1966, O'Leary became Budget Officer, and on July 1, 1968, was appointed Assistant Director for Financial Planning.

Mr. O'Leary received his BBA from St. John's University, Brooklyn, and a MBA from New York University. He is a former member of the faculty (evening session) of C. W. Post College, having taught Management and Business Mathematics there for four years. He is an active member of the American Management Association.

O'Leary saw service with the U.S. Army in the Counter Intelligence Corps, Vienna, Austria.

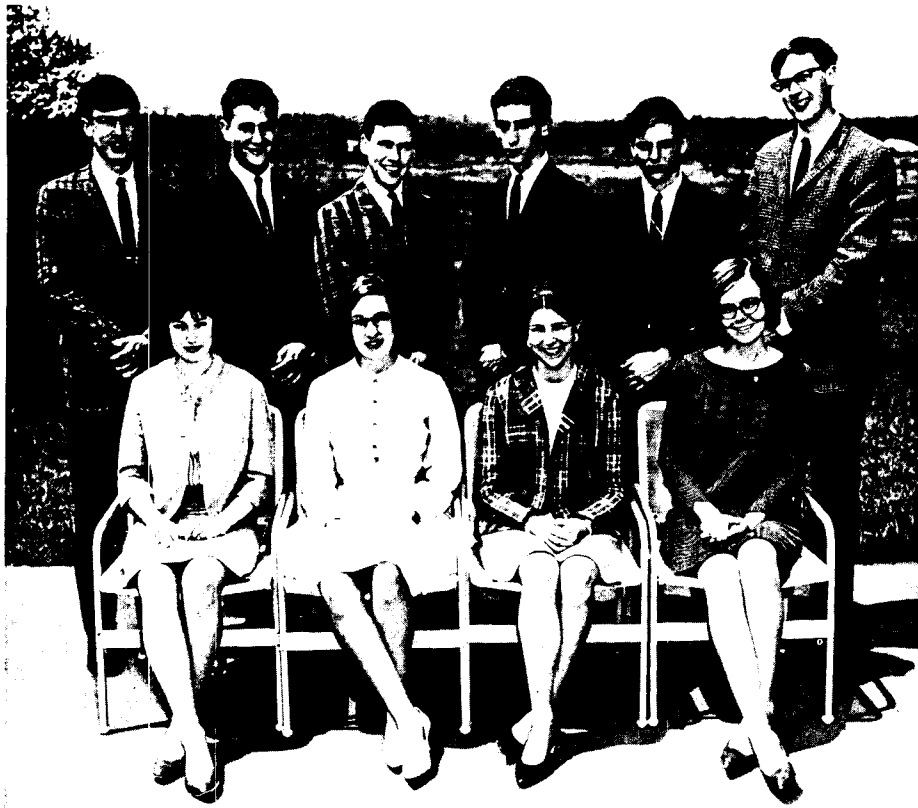
In addition to the operation of the cafeteria and the snack bar, the Schrafft's people will cater the Brookhaven Center and the Coffee Truck.

Ten Children Of Employees Receive A.U.I. Scholarships

This headline appeared in the May 12, 1965 issue of the Bulletin Board and made AUI history. These ten young people were the winners of the first AUI Trustee Scholarships to be offered to children of regular employees of BNL and NRAO.

Today, these same young people, four years older and wiser, hold undergraduate degrees and the future is at their fingertips.

Carol Barton attended Middlebury College in Vermont. While there, she was a member and treasurer of Sigma Kappa. She was an active member of the Women's Service Organization and Chairman of Middlebury's Girl Scout Council. She graduated with high honors from the history department.

Carol is currently doing graduate work at the University of Illinois where she hopes to obtain her Masters in education.

Eleanor Olson was a member of the 89th graduating class of Grove City College in Pennsylvania. She received honors in her major field, Elementary Education, and graduated Cum Laude, receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree.

While at Grove City, she was a staff member of the student newspaper; a member of the Pennsylvania State Education Association; vice president of Theta Alpha Pi. She achieved standing on the Dean's List for each of the 8 semesters while she was enrolled as an AUI Scholarship student.

Eleanor was married on June 8 to Clark Rechkemmer and is temporarily residing at Tempe, Arizona.

Laraine Rathvon, a student of romance languages, graduated Magna Cum Laude from Jackson College, Tufts University in Massachusetts. She will start graduate school this fall under a fellowship awarded to her by Georgetown University.

Laraine is presently taking summer courses at the University of Mexico in Mexico City.

Robert Stehn graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree from the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse. He majored in Zoology.

While at Syracuse, he was a member of the Biology Club, and he participated in several research studies of animal behavior. Robert has been awarded a National Science Foundation grant which will assist him as he starts graduate work in vertebrate neurobiology at Cornell in September.

Linda Dexter graduated from Douglass College, Rutgers University in New Jersey with General Honors. She received a Bachelor of Arts degree, with English Literature as her major field of studies.

While at Douglass, Linda served on the Government Association Secretariat, as Assistant Housechairman in her dormitory and later becoming Housechairman; as a Junior Guide for visitors; and co-chairman of the Student-Faculty Coordinating Committee. As a Senior, she was elected a candidate for the Honors Program in English, and served on the Freshman Orientation Committee.

Linda maintained her status on the Dean's List throughout her four years at Douglass, and was elected to New Jersey's Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. She has received a Fellowship from the Johns Hopkins University where she will participate in the Masters Program in Teaching with English as her major field.

Jonathan Skret spent his first year at Wesleyan College and then transferred to Royalton College of International Affairs, a new educational venture in South Royalton, Vermont. He finished at Royalton this year.

His plans for the future are nebulous, though they include spending this summer in Vermont, a state he loves and of which he hopes to own a few acres some day.

Paul Semplicino has been attending Brown University for the past four years. To fulfill his requirements toward a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry and also Navy Science courses toward his NROTC Scholarship, he will spend one more year at Brown, graduating in June of 1970.

Aside from his academic studies, most of his activities have been in connection with Reserve Officer Training cruises. He spent a summer on a destroyer; went to Corpus Christi, Texas, Air Base for training on Navy jets; trained with Marines at Little Creek, North Carolina; and spent last summer at a submarine base in San Diego. Training is diversified so he can decide for which branch of the Navy he is best suited.

On completion of his undergraduate studies, Paul will become an Ensign in the U.S. Navy.

Robert Schaeffer entered MIT as a pre-med student, but transferred to Political Science in his sophomore year. Extending his interest in politics beyond theory, he held various offices in his house and student government, was campaign manager for several successful candidates for class office, and was active in Students for McCarthy during the last presidential campaign. He was Senior Marshall at Commencement. During all four years he was a member of the yearbook staff, and in his senior year he became Editor-in-Chief.

Because of the draft, Robert's plans for the future are uncertain. He has had to decline a two-year graduate Woodrow Wilson Fellowship at Princeton, and has applied for Peace Corps and Vista. Until September he will be working at MIT as Special Assistant to the Vice President for Special Problems.

John Vineyard graduated this June from the Arts and Science Branch of Oberlin College. He majored in English and was editor of Oberlin's literary magazine.

David Sparrow graduated from Princeton University, having majored in Physics.

Since these first scholarships were offered, forty more scholarships have been awarded to children of BNL employees. Each scholarship is in an amount up to \$900 per year, applicable against college expenses, renewable for an additional three years or until requirements for the bachelor's degree are completed.

Count Basie is best known for his loyalty to the Blues as a basic form, and his ability to produce, year after year, a series of best selling records. In 1954, when the band made its first tour of Europe, and 1955, when the Count completed his 20th year as a leader, the band featured many new stars. Among them Thad Jones, Joe Wilder, and Joe Newman on trumpets, Benny Powell and Henry Coker on trombones, Frank Foster and Frank Wess on Tenor Saxes. Most of the arrangements were by Neal Hefti and Ernie Wilkins. The Count was heard on the organ, an instrument whose rudiments he had picked up a long time ago from Fats Waller.

Count Basie has definitely established himself as a Modern Music Immortal during his 25 years as a bandleader. Now he has been rediscovered by another generation of young Americans. A measure of the esteem in which Count Basie is held by his fellow musicians can be gathered by a partial listing of the 62 who voted his band the "Greatest Ever" in the Musicals Poll in the Encyclopedia Yearbook of Jazz. Louis Armstrong, Bobby Hackett, Woody Herman, Stan Getz, Dizzy Gillespie,



Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey, Benny Carter, Eddie Condon, Nat Cole, Lee Konitz, Sonny Stitt, Errol Gardner, Andre Previn, Pete Rogolo, Bill Harris and Horace Silver are just some of the names.
