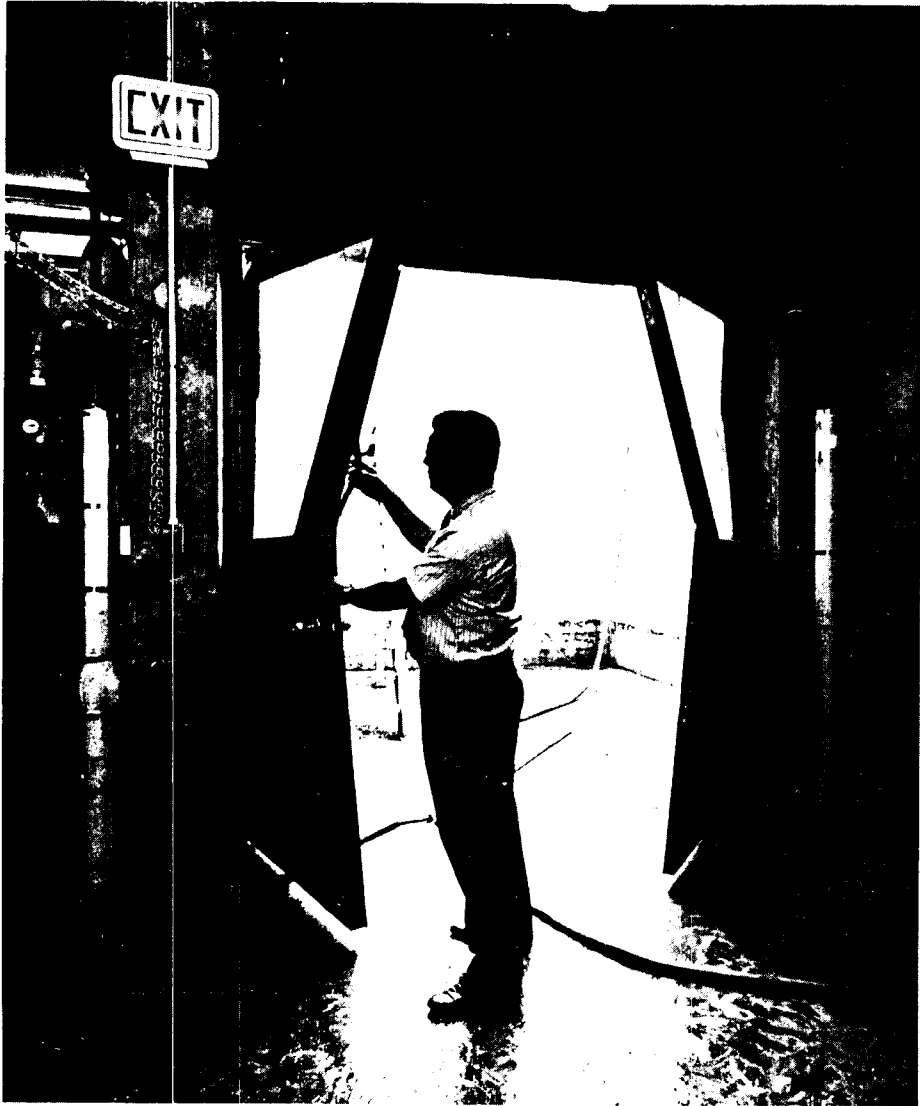




The Rains Came — With A Vengeance

Monday Downpour Sets New Record Most Rainfall In Hour Since 1954

At 3:38 a.m. on Monday, things were far from quiet on the Lab site. The overriding sound was that of rain pounding down, almost drowning out the sound of transformers blowing and alarm systems sounding.

For the Lab Security force, the radio and the switchboard suddenly became overactive on a normally quiet morning as a record 2.49 inches of rain fell during a one hour period.

The ground had already been saturated with water since July 17, after a total of 8.62 inches of rain had fallen. As the rain continued to pelt down, flash flooding occurred in many areas throughout BNL.

By 4:40 a.m., reports from all patrol cars coming in to Captain Stafford indicated that serious floods were threatening Metallurgy, the AGS Office Building, Applied Mathematics, the warehouse area, and several other buildings.

Fire Captain Strier, sent men and equipment to Metallurgy first, and while there, was called to the AGS for a massive flood to the rear of the new office wing.

At 4:50 a.m. the water had filled a stairwell leading to the mechanical equipment room under the AGS Office wing. In a few minutes, the water had reached a depth of over 8 feet, and with a roar, the pressure ruptured the two steel doors leading to the transformers that supply power to the building above. Fuses blew, water engulfed, and power went out in the entire building.

Meanwhile, back at Police Headquarters, George Stoll, Henry Boomer and Bob Mulcahy of Plant Engineering and Planning were called to come in and cope with the troubles the water had caused. Max

Small and Edward Shelton were informed of the situation as were the Fire and Police Chiefs.

By 5 a.m. crews were at work starting to clean and repair damage that had been done, even though the rain was still continuing.

By 8:30 a.m. when most of the Lab people reported to work, some of the minor damage had been corrected, and cleanup work had been underway for three hours.

An emergency generator was brought to the AGS building and power for the sump pumps was restored. The electrical crew had started to work on stringing wires so that there would be lights in the offices and hallways. By 3 p.m. on Monday, electrical service was restored to the AGS Office

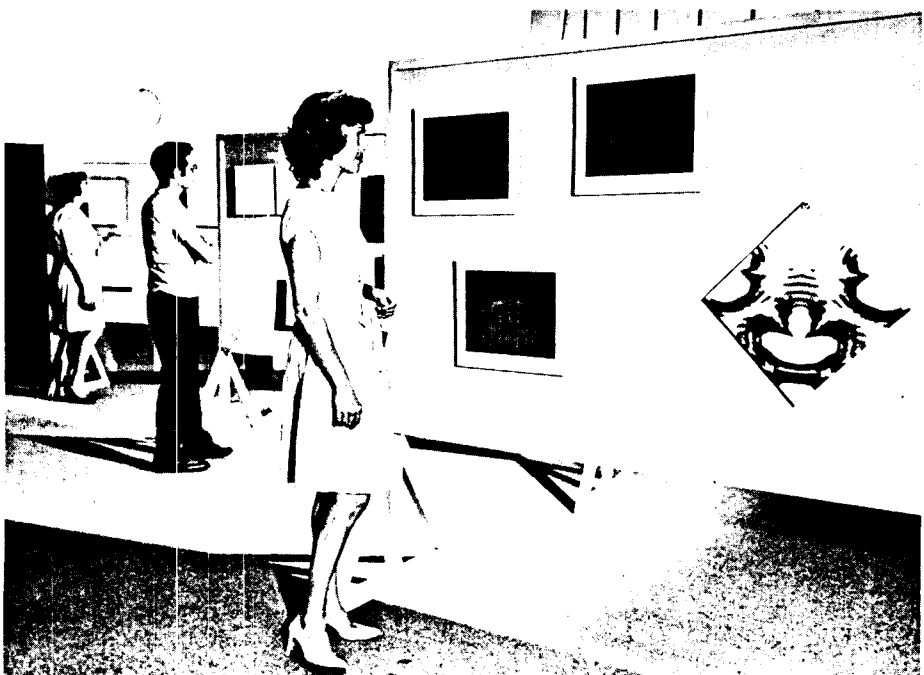

The show is open during the week from 11 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. It will be open through the evening of Thursday, August 14.

All members of the Brookhaven Community are urged to see this unique exhibition. Do not compare the products of the computer with those of an artist who has oil and canvas. What is being presented here are not aesthetic objects; they are aesthetic forms. Look at these forms naively, as art should be enjoyed. Look at them intellectually, as science should be enjoyed. Then wonder why they can succeed as both.

Computer-Art Show

Building for everything but the air conditioning.

At the very start of the storm there were two power drops in the mains coming in to the site which caused the alarms to sound in some areas, and put the water treatment plant out of business temporarily.

During the height of the storm, the electric crew was called because of an overhead 2400-volt transformer that was blown out. Later, when the doors to the mechanical equipment room ruptured, the water shorted out a 13,800-volt transformer under the AGS building. After the water had subsided, all motors that had been flooded had to be dried out, some were taken to ovens large enough to fit them.

In spite of the record rain, the cafeteria entrance, which used to flood at regular intervals, remained dry. The new sump installed last week did its job of keeping water out of the building.

The Meteorology Section of Instrumentation and Health Physics reported that a total of 2.68 inches of rain fell during the short-lived storm. Rainfall occurred on 19 days in July for a total of 8.62 inches. Based on 22 years of record keeping, this is 5 inches above normal at BNL.

So far in August, up to Tuesday morning, 3.49 inches of rain have fallen. Of that total, almost 2 inches fell during a half hour period on Monday morning. During hurricane Edna (remember her?) in 1954, a record 2.10 inches fell during a one-hour period. On Monday a new record was established - 2.49 inches during a one hour period!

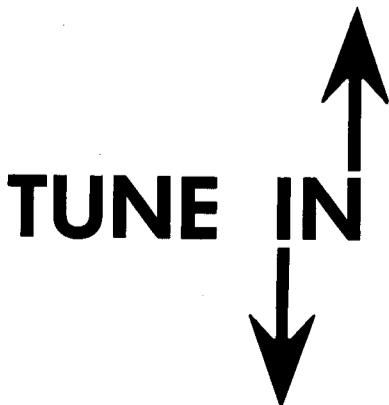
Applications for BERA Bowling Leagues are available now at the Recreation Office. Season starts the week of September 8. All leagues are handicap - and new bowlers are welcome.

BERA Special a Sellout Smash — Basie's Band Bedazzles BNL

It wasn't necessary to Guess Who last Saturday night. There was no doubt in any mind about who was playing the music that filtered out of the Gym from 9 p.m. till 1 a.m.

Count Basie and his crew lived up to the expectations of the entire crowd that made up the night-club-like scene at BERA's Summer Special. Brass was the order for the evening, with just a touch of strings and percussion to fill out the sound.

There were four trumpets, four trombones and four saxes. Drums, a bass and a guitar and of course the 88 keys of the piano under the hands of the Count. It was Glenn Miller, Tommy Dorsey, Duke Ellington all wrapped into one for the kind of music that either was danceable or just for listening according to the mood at the time.

528 people fitted comfortably into the gym and still left enough room for a dance floor about ten times as large as any night club ever had to offer.

transformation of the gym into a club for the night, and the rest of the committee did a yeoman job of getting decorations and furnishings set up in an orderly manner. John Binnington, BERA president, was as cool as could be as MC when he announced the start of the dance.
