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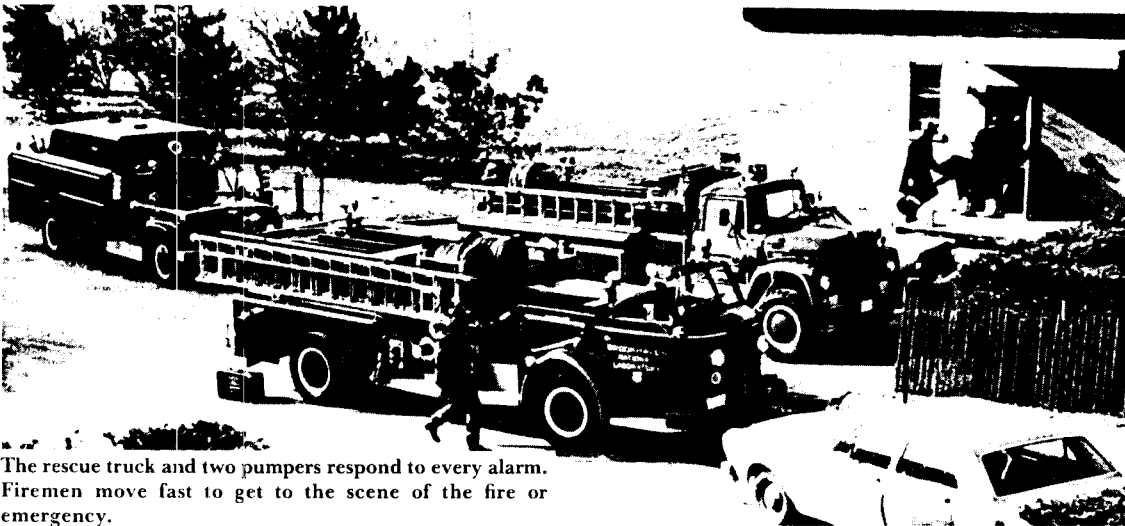
Lab Firemen Take Fast Action

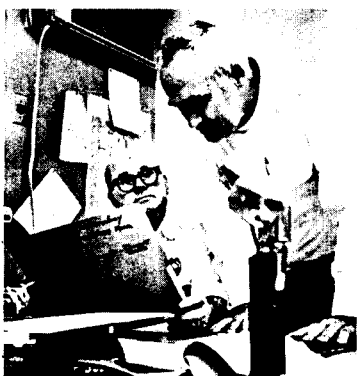

At dusk every day the firemen patrol the entire site after most of the employees have left. They check building and experimental areas all through the night as well as weekends and holidays.

Lab Firemen Prepared For All Emergencies

Late in the morning you're hard at work when you hear the Lab siren blowing. You check your watch and find it is only a few minutes past 11 a.m. and still not time for lunch.

Outside, at the corner of Railroad Street and Brookhaven Avenue, action has begun even before the siren has started to blow. The fireman on watch at the alarm telegraph has recorded the location of the alarm, and alerted the firemen in the house, before pressing the siren switch.

Three fire trucks and a chief's car move out of the fire house, and head for the building where the alarm went off. Before leaving the firehouse, the fire officer has picked up a "run card" for the building concerned which contains all necessary information about that location necessary for emergency procedures.

One of the pumpers has a key board in the cab with master keys for all of the doors in each building. Radiation detection equipment is also carried in the truck cab ready for instant use.

When the firefighters arrive at the alarm location, they move fast to put out hoses while an officer goes into the building to locate the fire.

In most instances at Brookhaven, this is where the drama ends. A sensitive alarm may have been triggered by a pipesmoker near a duct, or heat from an experiment may have temporarily raised temperatures to the alarm point.

While the firemen wait with hoses ready, the alarm cause is traced and checked, and after assurance that there is no fire or other emergency, the equipment returns to the firehouse.

To sit around the firehouse playing cards until the next alarm?

Not quite!

One fireman goes back to maintaining fire extinguishers, and another goes back to making building inspections. The other six men on the shift go back to their training program that runs almost constantly.

But - not until after they have re-rolled hose that had been pulled out, and re-packed equipment that had been made ready at the last alarm. Replace keys -

replace folder - gas trucks and re-fold coats and replace boots on the proper truck.

Brookhaven Lab firefighters must be prepared for all emergencies - not just putting water on a fire.

There are four main items of equipment at the firehouse. Two regular pumpers, a high pressure fog pumper, and an emergency truck.

The emergency truck, which can also double as ambulance, is a wonderland of special purpose tools and supplies. For injuries it carries stretchers and splints as well as first aid kits.

In the many compartments on each side of the truck are: generators, hydraulic jacks and tools, bolt cutters, power saws for both metal and wood, resuscitators and inhalators, radiation meters and explosion meters, smoke evacuators and slings, and a hundred other small tools and devices for rescuing a trapped person in almost any circumstance.

All of the firefighters are trained and updated on the latest first-aid techniques and all are trained to cope with radiation accidents. In addition, all men must be familiar with all types of firefighting equipment and techniques in use at BNL.

The 24 men and six officers of the BNL Fire Department never complain about unnecessary alarms. "If you are in doubt," says Chief Thomas Newham, "call us!" The firemen rely on quick response to all emergencies to keep their excellent record intact. Violations uncovered during building inspections are for corrective rather than punitive reasons.

In addition to Lab emergencies, BNL firemen keep a close watch on all local areas. Fire calls for Suffolk County are constantly monitored in the radio room, and technical advice is freely given to volunteer departments whenever asked. Occasionally special equipment or supplies are loaned during an emergency to a neighboring volunteer unit.

"Pull the nearest fire alarm or phone 333 when there is even a suspicion of a fire or other emergency," said Chief Newham, "Let us be the judge of the seriousness of the emergency!"

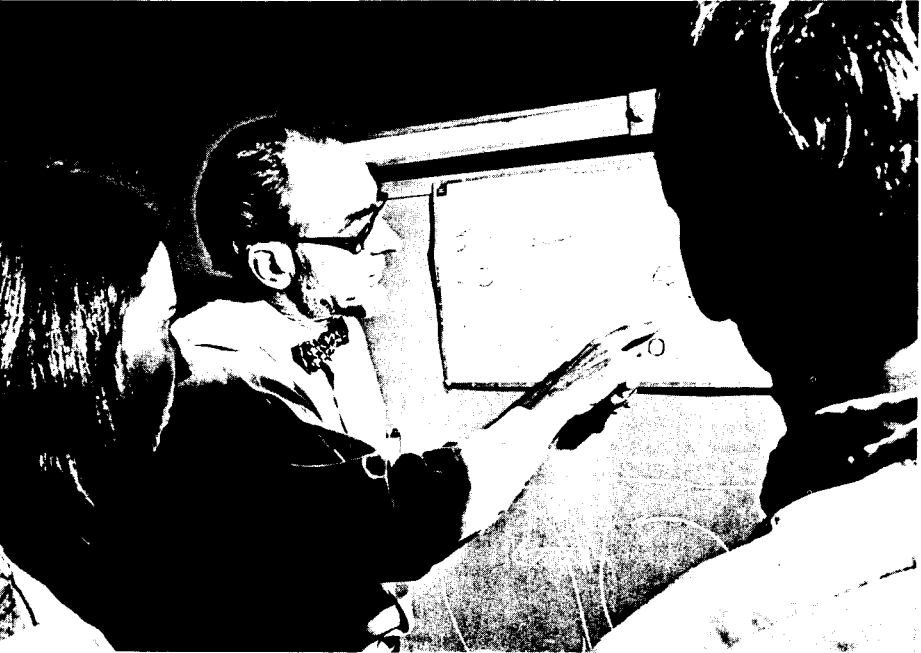
Theatre Group Elections
