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75 Years of Realism In French Cinema

Monsieur Charles Ford, distinguished French film critic, will discuss "Seventy-five Years of Realism in French Motion Pictures" on January 31 at 8:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall. His lecture will be given in French and will be illustrated with film excerpts.

M. Ford has had wide experience in the film arts, both as creator and critic. Presently a member of the International Council of Cinema and Television, he also teaches film history at the University of Toronto and at the Paris Conservatory of the Cinema. He has written film scripts as well as numerous books, including "Histoire du Western," "Hollywood Story," and a six-volume historical encyclopedia of the cinema. M. Ford has produced TV programs for both the French and Canadian broadcasting services, and has served as a judge at many international film festivals.

Woodwell replaces Donald Squires, director of the Marine Sciences Research Center at Stony Brook, who resigned because of what he described as an overwhelming workload at the Center. The council, which is unpaid, was created by the county legislature to advise Suffolk County on all decisions affecting the environment.

The council will issue advisory environmental impact statements on all governmental projects and zoning changes based on a set of guidelines already formulated by the council and submitted to the county executive.

Painting Exchange In Eighth Year

Started eight years ago by the wives of two scientists from Brookhaven National Laboratory, the annual exchange of paintings to be displayed in the Medical Research Center, has just completed its annual appeal for the loan of works of art.

Mrs. Hertha Kouts and Mrs. Lewis Dahl collected the original group of paintings to brighten up the austere atmosphere of the rooms and corridors of the hospital where patients stay an average of about six weeks.

Working with the supervisor of nurses, formerly Mrs. Ruth Korsos, and now Mrs. Veronica Brooks, the ladies sort and hang the paintings each year. This year 110 paintings are hung in patients rooms and corridors.

All of the donated pictures are framed and ready for hanging, and range in size from 8 by 10 inches to 24 by 30 inches. The paintings are insured by the Lab to protect the artist in case of loss or damage.

Some pictures have been loaned on a permanent basis, and others are kept at the hospital for only a year. A number of paintings have been sold each year, and several have been donated to the hospital.

Dr. Lewis Dahl, chief of staff of the hospital is enthusiastic about the program. "We are very grateful to the artists and to those who help in the selection of what goes where," he said. "We have set November as the month for the receipt and exchange of the paintings, but that doesn't mean we won't accept a picture any other time. We are always grateful to receive them."

IRS Tax Booklet Available Now At Lab Post Office

A booklet that gives information on how to fill out federal tax returns is being sold at the Upton Post Office, Postmaster Steve Garrett announced on Monday.

"Your Federal Income Tax 1972 Edition" was written by the Internal Revenue Service and contains many examples to illustrate how the tax law applies in many situations. A special feature included is a sample, filled-in copy of Form 1040, keyed to pages where detailed explanations can be found for each entry on the return.

The 160-page booklet is now on sale at 75 cents a copy.

"By selling this booklet at the Upton Post Office, we are saving taxpayers the expense and inconvenience of ordering it by mail," said Garrett.

The Best Time to File Says IRS — EARLY!

Refund checks are less likely to be delayed when tax returns are filed early, the Internal Revenue Service says.

IRS urges taxpayers to send their tax returns in now if they have not already done so. It will help taxpayers to get their refunds sooner.

The IRS refunded over \$857 million to New York area taxpayers last year.

IRS reminds taxpayers to use the pre-addressed name label which came with the tax package containing the Form 1040. By placing this label on the 1040 form which is filed, it will expedite processing.

Returns for New Yorkers should be sent to the Service Center, Andover, Mass. in the envelope provided.

Breeder Reactor To Be Constructed

On Friday, January 14, AEC Chairman James R. Schlesinger made the following announcement to the press:

"The Atomic Energy Commission has accepted, as a basis for detailed negotiation a joint submission of the Commonwealth Edison Company of Chicago and the Tennessee Valley Authority for the construction and operation of the nation's first demonstration Liquid Metal Fast Breeder Reactor plant.

"I am gratified to report that the selection of this arrangement from among four submissions represents the unanimous view of two senior utility advisory committees as well as the Commission, and reflects the strong interest of the nation's utility industry in the breeder demonstration program.

"The project, estimated to cost on the order of a half billion dollars, is a joint industry-government effort. Subject to acceptance of the final arrangements, it is expected that the utility industry will make a significant financial contribution to the project. In an unprecedented cooperative endeavor, conditional pledges amounting to about \$240 million — to be paid over 10 years — have been made to date by all segments of the utility industry, including privately, publicly, and cooperatively owned companies.

"I am very enthusiastic about this project because of the inherent advantages in the breeder, which will produce more nuclear fuel than it consumes. The President referred to these advantages in his energy message last June 4. He said 'Our best hope today for meeting the nation's growing demand for economical clean energy lies with the Fast Breeder Reactor. Because of its highly efficient use of nuclear fuel, the breeder reactor could extend the life of our natural uranium fuel supply from decades to centuries, with far less impact on the environment than the power plants which are operating today.'

"Under the plan we are announcing today, the demonstration reactor would be located on the TVA system, and would be operated by TVA. Additional studies are under way to determine the location, plant size and other characteristics. The capacity will be in the range of 300 to 500 megawatts. Preliminary arrangements provide that Commonwealth will supply the Project Manager and the Manager of Engineering, and TVA will be in charge of constructing the plant.

"We are gratified by the fact that this initial plant brings together the resources of a major investor-owned utility as well as a major publicly-owned power supplier. While the details remain to be determined, the program will be heavily dependent upon the management and engineering talent available within these two utility organizations, as well as the resources of the AEC, its contractors and the Commission's laboratories. In addition, we expect active participation by the nation's utilities and equipment companies, including the assignment of personnel.

"Immediate steps will be taken to establish a Breeder Reactor Corporation to pro-

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Reminder On W-4's

Those employees planning on submitting a new W-4 are encouraged to return their form to the Payroll Section as soon as possible. Any questions regarding the new form should be referred to B. McAlary on Ext. 7482.

Below are some typical questions raised by the new W-4 form:

Q - Am I required to file a new form?
A - No, failure to do so, however, will result in a higher withholding tax taken from your payroll check each week or month.

Q - How much extra tax would be withheld from my check if I do not file a new W-4?

A - For weekly employees with salaries ranging between \$100 and \$300 per week, the additional tax withheld approximates \$3 to \$5 per week. For monthly employees with salaries ranging between \$800 to \$2,000, the additional tax would approximate \$13 to \$22.

Q - What should I do if I'm the only wage earner in the family and I want my withholding taxes to stay about the same as last year?

A - On line 3 of your W-4 insert a I, this is for the 'Special Withholding Allowance' you are entitled to. This in effect will increase your exemptions by one over last year.

Q - Does the 'Special Withholding Allowance' affect the number of exemptions I will claim at the end of the year when I file my tax return?

A - No, on your tax return you will claim the actual number of exemptions to which you are entitled.

The 'Special Withholding Allowance' is merely a device used by the Internal Revenue Service to adjust the amount of withholding tax taken from your payroll check if you have a second job, or if there is another wage earner in the family.

vide liaison between the utility industry and the project.

"In addition to Commonwealth-TVA, submittals were made by a group of major utilities from New England and The Pennsylvania-New Jersey-Maryland Interconnection, Empire State Atomic Development Associates, and The Southern Company-Middle South Utilities.

"I feel that the progress we have made thus far toward a breeder demonstration plant is due largely to the interest, effort and support of senior utility management from all parts of the nation. We shall continue to look to them for counsel and support as the project progresses.

"Throughout the planning for this project, the AEC has had the strong support not only of the President but of the Congress - particularly the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy and the Appropriations Committee."

Scenes From American Life

First produced in April, 1971 at Lincoln Center, this is the first amateur performance of A.R. Gurney's two-act play. Mr. Gurney, a professor at MIT, seems to have chosen his scenes at random while rooting through his own memories.

The form of the play is elusive, by comparison to traditional theatre, but right in style with contemporary presentations. Instead of being annoyed at shuttling back and forth in time, the audience is intrigued at the parallels and differences brought forth.

Is the play funny? Yes. Is it a comedy? No. Does it take place in the present? Yes. Does it take place in the past and the future? Yes.

It is nostalgic and provocative, and only occasionally shocking. There are about 100 characters in the play, but only a cast of 10! It is this because of a shortage of actors? No. There is music galore in this absolutely non-musical play.

Everything that can be said about the play is correct - it is a series of contradictions and similarities that adds up to an evening of top-flight entertainment.

Like Mother used to say about a new dish she cooked up - So - Try it! You'll like it!

Director Ron Peierls has put together a competent cast and stage crew to make this first major production in Berkner Hall a memorable event. The scenery is sparse but extremely effective. The lighting is professional, and the music is timely and well played.

Tickets may be purchased at the door, as well as in the cafeteria and at the Recreation Office. Adult employees and family members are admitted for \$2.00 each except for those under 18 who only pay \$1.00. Guests and the general public will pay \$2.50 for general admission. There are no reserved seats, so it is wise to arrive before the curtain goes up at 8:30 p.m.
